


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2nd VDG Message

We hope that you had a wonderful **Thanksgiving**. Lions can be very thankful for their many blessings and the blessings that have been given to others because of the Lions - **WE SERVE**. Many families were given food and winter clothing during this holiday thanks to our Lions.

Soon we will be celebrating **Christmas**. Already, many Lions Clubs have provided food, clothing, and toys to those in need in their communities. The **LIONS MAGAZINE** mentioned the **DNA of Lions**. Serving is truly in the genes of Lions. What a great feeling it is to help someone in need. Thanks to all Lions for what you do in your communities and around the world. The world is truly a better place thanks to Lions.

We often get the question: why do you want to become District Governor? We have had a wonderful time visiting over 40 Lions Clubs, meeting great Lions. inducting new members, presenting much deserved awards, and learning about fantastic club service and fundraising projects. I have been reviewing reports on the lionsclubs.org website before visiting clubs and have been amazed at what the Lions Clubs in District 22-W have been doing. One club reported 60 service and fundraising activities. And, they have done many of those activities several times during the year. Truly, Lions District 22-W is the best district in MD-22. We have the most clubs and the most Lions members. But we cannot rest on our successes. We currently have a net loss in membership (currently less than 1900, down from over 2000 in 2014), and have lost 2 Lions Clubs, bringing our total number of clubs to 57 (down from 59 last year). We also have over 10 clubs with less than 20 members. To help those clubs, we need new Guiding Lions. The course is available on-line, and we hope to have a 4-hour course to be held in a central location of our district. We need to find new, quality members to bolster our numbers, especially since our membership is getting older and cannot do what we used to do. We need to continue to ask younger members to help us with our service and fundraising activities, eventually becoming Lions members, continuing to serve and look **Beyond the Horizon** to increase our **membership**, leadership, to continue the fellowship we have in our clubs, and to showcase what we do as Lions. Too many times we quietly serve without telling others about our service. There are still those in our communities that don't know about Lions. Be ready to tell them about your club when they ask What are Lions? Be proud that you are a member of the world's largest service organization and wear your Lions pin everywhere.

I hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving. Here we are entering December and Christmas is
 coming fast. I would like to make my message for December geared toward the homeless in our
 communities. With cold weather here there are many homeless staying out in the cold.

In Maryland alone they estimate around 50,000+ experience homelessness. Many Questions
arrive like why don't they get a job or just go and get a cheap apartment but the facts show that
poor people work. More then 38% of poor people work full time or part time jobs and are still below the poverty level.

As far as cheap apartments, Maryland is home to the 7TH highest housing wage. Fair market
 for a 2 bedroom housing unit is \$1281.00 a month. This means it would take 3.1 full time mini mum wage jobs to afford this housing.

We can help by simply holding a clothes drive focusing on warm clothes, cooking some hot • meals and delivering to a location where they can come get a hot meal or partnering with anoth- • er organization to help with shelters or food pantries.

Maybe next time you see someone that is homeless, just stop and talk to them and offer them a chot meal. You never know someone's story until you stop and listen.



Nicole Chowdhuny, an 8th grade student at St. John School in Frederick, Maryland, has taken a major step to becoming an internationally recognized artist by placing first in the Peace Poster Contest sponsored by the Lions Clubs of District 22W. Winners were announced on November 17th at the Myersville VFD Hall, Myersville, Maryland by the contest chairman, Lioness Lesley Smith of the Hagerstown Lioness Club. LCI has sponsored this program for over 30 years to encourage young people worldwide to express their visions of peace. The theme of the 2018-2019 Peace Poster Contest is "Kindness Matters". The award for first prize is \$100 and a certificate.

The second prize winner was Jane Orellana whose poster was submitted by the Frederick Lions Club.She attends the 7th grade at *After School* in Frederick. The award for second prize is \$60 and a certificate.

The third prize winner was Samantha Heyison whose poster was submitted by the Frederick Lions Club. She is in the 8th grade at The Banner School in Frederick. The award for third prize is \$40 and a certificate.

In addition to the 1st, 2nd and 3rd place awards, two Honorable Mention awards were recognized; one went to Carolena Cepeda, a 7th grade student of New Life Christian School in Frederick and was sponsored by the Frederick Lions Club; the other went to Janay Badoe an 8th grade student at the Springfield Middle School and was sponsored by the Williamsport Lions Club. Both Honorable Mention winners receive a \$25 prize award and a certificate.

Nicole's winning poster was entered into the Multiple District 22 competition competing with the winning posters from the four other districts of MD22. If she places first there, her poster will be sent to Lions Clubs International headquarters where it will compete with winners from all over the world. Winner at this level is \$5,000 plus a trip to the United Nations on Lions Clubs Day at the United Nations on March 9, 2019. In addition to the grand prize, 23 merit award winners will receive \$500 and a certificate of achievement.

WHAT IS THE STORY BEHIND HANUKKAH?

Hanukkah commemorates the victory of a Jewish rebel army, the Maccabees, over the Seleucids (an ancient Hellenistic empire that ruled much of the Middle East) in 165 BCE and the subsequent re-dedication of the Temple in Jerusalem that had been desecrated.

According to Jewish tradition, it celebrates a miracle: inside the Temple, the Maccabees found enough consecrated oil to light the eternal flame in the Temple for a single day but miraculously the oil lasted for eight days, long enough to produce new oil.

"This is the reason why Hanukkah is celebrated over eight days."

MIDDLETOWN LIONS CLUB HEARS SPEAKER FROM MPHP

The Middletown Lions Club Speaker Series aims to bring guest speakers to our Club, to expand our understandings of important agen-



cies in and around the Middletown Valley. Our community is fortunate to have several agencies to assist residents who are disadvantaged and need help. The local Social Services Department is usually the front line in this work, and often refers clients out to other organizations for more assistance. The Religious Coalition for Human Needs in Frederick is a primary source for assistance and acts as somewhat of an umbrella organization, helping to coordinate the assistance to clients. They may refer clients to Middletown Valley People Helping People (MVPHP) and this organization's work was discussed October 22nd , 2018 by Mary Straits.

Middletown Valley People Helping People (MVPHP) is a local non-profit organization developed and managed by volunteers. The mission is to create and support programs that benefit citizens of all ages that live in Braddock Heights, Middletown, Myersville, Wolfsville, and other local areas. Formed In 1998 by a group of concerned citizens, local clergy, businesses and local government, it has grown into a well-functioning, dependable group. Their intent is to serve the community, which sounds a lot like the Lions aim. The programs of MVPHP have been supported by the Lions and we recognize the Adopt-a-Family, School Supply collection, the Food Bank, and others as common interests. Our own Anne Keyfauver is President of the MVPHP and other members have also joined. We express our sincere appreciation for Mary's explanation, and for her years of volunteer service.

MVPHP has an Emergency Assistance Team that receives calls from clients and partnering non-profit organizations that work together to provide needy families with a variety of emergencies. Some of the emergency help we provide is eviction prevention, payment of utility bills, fuel in winter months, prescription assistance, rental assistance, home repairs, furniture and appliances (donated), clothing, shoes, tires ... We are also a referring agency working closely with other local agencies that can provide the help our clients might need. Locally, we work with Madeline Ann Burke Emergency Fund, St. Theresa of Calcutta and local churches. Within the county we work with The Religious Coalition, Frederick Rescue Mission, Social Services, Advocates for the Homeless, etc. Beyond the basic needs work, MVPHP sponsors Senior Exercise and Yoga classes, patient transportation to medical appointments, operate the Meals-on-Wheels program in the Valley, the "Empty Bowls" banquet, the Middletown Valley Sports fund, and supports the "Week end Food Backpack program" with the Food Bank to assure students have food on the week-ends.

Mary Straits has been volunteering with MVPHP for 9 years and notes that they need more volunteers all the time. Consider giving some of your time to this worthy group.

FSK LIONS LEARN ABOUT HEARING LOSS

District 22W Hearing Preservation, Awareness & Action Chairman Lion Barbara Brimigion spoke to the Francis Scott Key Lions Club recently on the causes of hearing loss, how to protect and preserve hearing, how to help the needy get free hearing aids, and how to speak at a meeting with hard-of-hearing members. Brimigion, of the Freedom District Lions Club in Carroll County, has also served the district in recent years as Cabinet Secretary and Cabinet Treasurer.

Brimigion related that hearing loss affects approximately 466 million persons worldwide and up to 48 million in the United States; approximately one-third of persons over age 65 have some degree of hearing loss. While mandatory newborn hearing screenings will help identify problems earlier (and possibly have hearing aids fitted by age four weeks), studies have found that Baby Boomers are experiencing hearing loss at a younger age.

While hearing loss is permanent and irreversible, up to one-third of cases are preventable. Risk factors for hearing loss include some prescription drugs, illnesses with high fevers, high blood pressure, abnormal bone growth and tumors, smoking, and head injuries. The average cost of a pair of hearing aids is \$4,800, although some may cost up to \$8,000; the average life expectancy is five years and often is not covered by insurance. In some cases, Lions Clubs can help those in need of hearing aids to obtain them.
