District Governor 's Message

Thank you to all Lions and Lions Clubs for the love and support sent after my father passed away on May 18. Your cards, expressions of sympathy, thoughts and prayers are greatly appreciated.

My theme this year has been *Service from the Heart for 100* Years reflecting our past 100 years of service and looking ahead to our next 100 years. I recently received a copy of a new book, *Stories from the Heart/Lions Serving the World One Person at a Time*, by PID Robert S. Littlefield. The book includes 100 stories from Lions from around the world describing events in their own Lions lives which touched their hearts and made them feel that they really had become Lions. I would like to share two of those stories here.

"I joined the Lions Club in October 1973. After a couple of years, I was appointed to the Hearing Committee. In 1976, the club received a request for hearing aid assistance for twin five-year-old boys. I got to recommend approval of their applications and process them on to the audiologist for their exams and the fitting our mounds for their ears. I felt really good about my part in helping these two boys to be able to hear, as they were about to start kindergarten. Yet, I still hadn't become a Lion. Two months later, the club received a letter from the boys written with the help of their Mom. She expressed their heartfelt thanks for their aids. The boys described their daily trek to school. They talked about the first time they heard the robin singing in the trees, the scampering sound of the squirrels climbing through the branches. Did you know that candy wrappers make a lot of noise? 'The best part is that we can hear our Mom's voice and the many voices we never heard for five years.' Realizing the impact my Lions Club and I had on the lives of these boys directly gave me chills then and still does. I know I helped someone to have a much better life and future." (Lion Melvyn K. "I became acquainted with Lions in 1975 when my husband joined. For the next twelve years, I helped with fundraisers and programs before I was able to become a Lion on June 1, 1987. I wanted to join as soon as possible because I saw that Lions were grassroots people who performed service in a hands-on way. The sight service programs were wonderful. I was able to help give the incredible gift of sight through the sponsorship of eye exams, glasses, and surgical procedures for both children and adults. I knew that I was committed to serving the needs of others when a little girl our club provided glasses to ran through the hall of the school the day she got her glasses calling out to everyone that she could see. When I heard this from her mom I knew I was a Lion and we had contributed something immeasurable to this child and I want to continue to be part of this great work for the rest of my life." 

At the 96th Multiple District 22 Convention held in Ocean City, Maryland from May 7 through May 10, Lions, Lionesses and LEOs from Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia chose their leaders for Lions year 2018-2019. He will attend the Lions Clubs International Convention from June 29 through July 3 in Las Vegas, Nevada where he will be installed District Governor of District 22W by incoming International President Lion Dr. Gudrun Bjort Yngvadottir of Gardabaer, Iceland.

Elected to the office of 1st Vice District Governor was Lion Evan Gillett of the Roaring Run Lions Club. Lion Richard Crunkilton of the Westminster Lions Club was elected to the office of 2nd Vice District Governor. District Governor Elect Beachy has selected Lion Charlie Croft of the LaVale Lions Club to be Cabinet Secretary and Lion Susan Favorite of the Thurmont Lions Club to be Cabinet Treasurer. The new officers will assume office on July 1st; there will be a "Change of Banner" celebration meeting on Saturday, July 28, 2018 when retiring District Governor Bonura will symbolically turn over the reins to District Governor Beachy.

In attendance was Lions Clubs International Director Sam H. Lindsey, Jr. who presented awards to District 22W Lions for outstanding service and accomplishments over the past year. Lion Barbara Brimigion, who served as Cabinet Secretary this year, was presented the International Presidential Award Medal. Lions who were inducted into the District 22W Honor Roll were: Floyd Freyman of the Westminster Lions Club, Louis "Mike" Nassar of the North Branch Lions Club, Phyllis Thompson of the Myersville Lions Club, and Lois Conrad of the Williamsport Lions Club. District Governor Bonura awarded District Governor's Commendation Medals in recognition of exemplary service to Lionism to Lions Bob Coursey and Susan Coursey of the Westminster Lions Club and Lion Gary Buchman of the Freedom District Lions Club.

Lions Clubs International is closing out a 3-year celebration of its 100th anniversary July 31, 2018. In 1917, Melvin Jones, a 38-year-old Chicago business leader, told members of his local business club they should reach beyond business issues and address the betterment of their communities and the world. After contacting similar groups around the United States, an organizational meeting was held on June 7, 1917, in Chicago, Illinois. The new group took the name of one of the invited groups, "Association of Lions Clubs". A national convention was held in Dallas, Texas in October of that year where a constitution, by-laws, objectives and code of ethics were approved. And the rest is history.

Lions Clubs International is the largest service organization in the world with more than 1.45 million members in 220 countries and 47,000 clubs throughout the world and welcomes all men and women who wish to serve their community to join them. How to report

- Reporting club officers is easy using <u>MyLCI</u>. Click <u>video</u> to view a short video demonstration.
- Clubs not using MyLCI can report officers using the Club Officer Reporting Form. Mailing instructions are included on the form.

Update other club information

We have let the club officers in your district know that this is also the ideal time to:

- Verify their own contact information in MyLCI. A valid email address is essential for using MyLCI 2018-19 and beyond.
- Verify the new officers' email address, mailing address and phone number.
- Check to ensure the membership roster is up to date. That will help the incoming officers get a good start in the new Lion year.

Over 176 Lions service hours were spent on this effort. This was the third consecutive year for the joint screening effort.

The children were brought to a non-invasive testing station utilizing PlusoptiX S12C eye-vision technology to capture an image of the children's eyes and automatically determine whether a vision impairment, such as near- or farsightedness or astigmatism, was present. The tester holds the unit approximately one meter from the child and asks the child to focus on the smiling face on the front of the camera. At the completion of the testing, younger children received a Lion sticker to indicate they had completed the screening process.

The parents/guardians of all children tested received written test results to indicate whether their child was recommended to see a vision professional for a potential problem or was unable to be screened. While the vast majority of children passed, readings obtained by trained Lions indicated that some of the children needed to be seen by vision professionals for potential vision anomalies. The advanced technology of the PluxoptiX camera provides readings that are printed out either on a label which is attached to the letter for use by the vision professional of the parents' choice.




FREEDOM DISTRICT LIONS CELEBRATE VETERANS Submitted by: The Phantom Editor


NMDLC FRIENDSHIP/MEMBERSHIP NIGHT – April 16 Lion Peggy Brandenburg, NMDLC Editor


