

DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Are you going to the MD22 Convention May 13-16? It will be an interesting time for us in District 22-W. Lion Barbara Brimigion met with the Honorary Committee prior to the 4th Cabinet Meeting and changed her intention from running for Second Vice District Governor to running for First Vice **District Governor**. She got her paperwork in to the Nomination Chair PCC Clare Newcomer by the deadline, leaving a vacancy in a candidate running for Second Vice District Governor. Also meeting with the Honorary Committee was Cabinet Secretary Charlie Croft who, due to time constraints did not get his paperwork in on time for Second Vice District Governor but has since gotten an endorsement from the LaVale Lions Club to run for that position. In accordance with our Constitution and By-Laws. We will take a nomination from the floor at the first District 22-W Meeting to be held on Wednesday, May 15. As usual, we will vote for District Governor, First Vice District Governor and Second Vice District Governor, along with District and MD22 changes to the Constitution and By-Laws at the second District 22-W meeting on Thursday, May 16. If you are a delegate or alternate, be sure to get your card certified when you register so that you are eligible to vote.

Thanks to Leader Dog Chair, Lion Richard Crunkilton for coordinating the Leader Dog Rallies and for the support from our Lions Clubs of District 22-W. We are the best District in the multiple District 22!

We have made Official Visits to 56 of our Lions Clubs and the Hagerstown Lioness Club in District 22-W. We have also made many other visits to charter nights and other events held by our Lions and Clubs and the Lioness Club. Our membership is down, but we are inducting many new members. MEMORIALS

JOHN HART, from the Thurmont Lions Club, died on Tuesday, April 16, 2019. He spent 39 years in service to the Federal Government including three years of active duty with the Army. While in the Army, John served as a Sergeant in Vietnam from March 1958 to February 1969. After military service he went on to serve aboard and eventually captain the tugboat Chickadee and lightship Chesapeake operating predominately on the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay.

He traded the sea for the mountains and a career at Catoctin Mountain Park with the National Park Service. For over 30 years John was the chief of Maintenance for his beloved Catoctin Mountain Park where he oversaw the construction and maintenance of all park buildings and utilities including working with the presidential retreat Camp David.

John was an active member of his community, volunteering for a number of organizations including serving as past club president of Thurmont Lions Club, past master of the Thurmont Grange, mem-



ber of the Rocky Ridge Volunteer Fire company, board of trustees for Wetler United Methodist Church, a member of the Masonic temples of Kensington-Bethesda and the Acacia Lodge of Thurmont, and a member of the Carroll and Frederick County Amateur Radio Clubs.. Following in the footsteps of his father, John was an avid amateur "Ham" radio operator since his early childhood. Going by the call sign K3KWO, John would make contact with Hams from around the world from both his home station and mobile units.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by his children: Carrie Shives (Jason), Erica Lockney (John), John D. (Sage) and 7 grandchildren.

The funeral service was held April 24th at Weller United Methodist Church in Thurmont. Memorial donations may be made to the Weller UMC Memorial Fund.

WALTER EDWARD SCHOENIAN, JR., 88, of Hagerstown, MD passed away on Sunday, April 14, 2019 surrounded by his loving family. He was born on July 13, 1930 in Millvale, PA to the late Walter Edward Sr. and Alice Kleinhample Schoenian.

HAS YOUR PERSONAL INFORMATION BEEN STOLEN?

If you feel you may have been hacked via your computer, a scam phone call, bad credit card charges or bank deductions you must act fast to protect yourself, your identity and finances.

1: Immediately call your bank and any financial institution you deal with using the phone number on your printed statement or on your credit card to report the fraud. If you delay, you give the scammers more time to access accounts and steal your money. Just because you catch one small credit card charge does not mean that is all they are after or have access to.

We do not recommend you try and look up the phone number on the internet as many of the search results are scams themselves and will mislead you to steal your information. If unsure go to your bank branch and ask to speak with someone about this.

- 2: Request new credit cards with new numbers and have your bank either lock your account and request a new account number.
- 3: Change any online account passwords for banking, email accounts and any shopping site you use. i.e. Amazon, etc.

We know these steps are a pain and seem overwhelming, but if not followed you can get scammed over and over and can have your finances and privacy disappear.

These are professional criminals who prey on people. They will tell you anything, including telling you they are there to help you, they are from you bank, Microsoft, Google, Credit Card Company, BGE, Verizon, even your Mortgage company to get your information.

What you can do before you get scammed to make this process easier on yourself.

- 1: Keep a list, in a book, (not in a file saved on your computer) of all account information including phone numbers, account numbers, online user names and passwords. This should include lists for banking, credit cards, shopping sites and email addresses.
- 2: Do not save the credit card info when asked to this when doing online shopping to help protect yourself.
- 3: Learn how to change passwords and keep the process written down so in times of frustration and anxiety you will know what to do. If you are unsure have someone you trust help you.

* SIGNS YOUR COMPUTER HAS BEEN COMPROMISED.

- · New icons on your desktop, taskbar or on your web browsers tool bar that you don't recognize.
- System or internet slowness.
- Spam e-mails that look legit.
- E-mails or calls from friends saying your sent them a scam e-mail.
- Strange internet web sites search results.
- Strange web sites opening automatically.
- Pop ups asking you to do something like update, call someone, install or add something that you do not recognize as legit.

If you experience any of these things your system may be compromised and should be looked at as soon as possible to make sure your online Identity is safe. Do not do any online banking or shopping until you get your system checked out to be safe Also remember that hacking does not have to start from your computer. It could be from using your credit card at a gas station, restaurant, etc.



COUNTY LIONS PERFORM VISION SCREENINGS

Putting into action the organization's motto of "We Serve," members representing several Frederick County Lions Clubs recently came together on a countywide service project when approximately 220 students at Mother Seton School in Emmitsburg received vision screenings performed by Lions members on two dates in March. Over 42 Lions service hours were spent on this effort. This was the fourth consecutive year for the joint screening effort.

The children were brought to a non-invasive testing station utilizing PlusoptiX S12C eye-vision technology to capture an image of the children's eyes and automatically determine whether a vision impairment, such as near- or far-sightedness or astigmatism, was present. The tester holds the unit approximately one meter from the child and asks the child to focus on the smiling face on the front of the camera. At the completion of the testing, younger children received a Lion sticker to indicate they had completed the screening process.

The parents/guardians of all children tested received written test results to indicate whether their child was recommended to see a vision professional for a potential problem or was unable to be screened. While the vast majority of children passed, readings obtained by trained Lions indicated that some of the children needed to be seen by vision professionals for potential vision anomalies. The advanced technology of the PluxoptiX camera provides readings that are printed either on a label which is attached to the letter for use by the vision professional of the parents' choice.

VISITOR FROM WCPS

Michelle Harman, Supervisor of Science/Math for the Washington County Schools System was a guest of Lion Brooks McBurney at a recent club meeting.

Prior to the club meeting, she met with Service Projects chair Lion Brooks and several interested lions to explain the school system's STEM Project and inquire if our club would want to participate in promoting it. Possibilities include participating in exhibits or exhibitions or at a Hagerstown Community College festival in the fall.

The STEM Project prepares students for careers in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.

When Ms. Harman was introduced during the club meeting, lion President Tony presented her with a Lions' pen, suggesting she could use it to fill out a membership application in his continuing enthusiastic effort to grow the club.

ANTHOLOGY OF THE KOREAN WAR

In April our speaker was Les Bishop from the Antietam Chapter of Korean War Veterans who present an overview of the conflict.

North Korean military units overran South Korea in 1950 only leaving a small corner of the invaded country free of occupation around the city of Pusan.

South Korea did not have adequately trained military to rebuff the invaders, so the United Nations passed a resolution bringing 21 countries together to support an effort to repel the North Koreans. The 16 countries sent military units, which were 90% U.S. forces.

General Douglas MacArthur

made an East coast invasions at Inchon to pierce the Communist forces in two and turn the tide of the war There were 8,000 Americans killed in the first 5 months of the war.

The war continued with movement of the UN forces into North Korea almost to the Chinese border when the Chinese entered the war. MacArthur wanted to invade China which caused him to be relieved of command by president Truman.

With intense fighting back and forth in North and South Korea, a stalemate was declared by July 27, 1963 with an armistice at the 38th parallel, the previous border between the two countries

There were 36,574 American deaths and 8,000 missing in action during the war.

HAGERSTOWN LIONS SERVICE PROJECT

Service Projects Chair, Brooks McBurney, and Lions Ralph Myers, Pol Heiney, Dave Kaplan, and Tom Perry distributed books at Hagerstown Children's School on April 11 as pictured below.
