

District Governor Message

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As of September 30, I have completed 29 official visits and attended the Flintstone Lions Club's first charter night and the Taneytown Lions Club's 71st charter night.



Did you know that chartered Lions Clubs have specific obligations? These obligations are designed to help your club operate in an efficient manner and are set by Lions Clubs International, as follows:

- a. To hold regularly scheduled meetings or events.
- Except as otherwise provided herein, to collect from each member minimum annual dues to cover international and district (single, suband multiple) dues and such other expenses as are necessary for club administration.
- c. To encourage and motivate regular participation in club activities.
- d. To conduct activities for the advancement of the civic, cultural, social, or moral welfare of the community and for the promotion of international understanding.
- e. To report monthly to International Office such information as may be called for by the board of directors of the association.
- f. To report to the International Office the financial condition of the club upon request.
- g. To elect officers, annually, not later than April 15, whose terms of office shall commence on July 1 following their election.
- h. To thoroughly investigate the background of all persons proposed for membership in the community where the proposed individual resides or has a place of business or is employed.
- i. To uphold, preserve and enhance the image of The International Association of Lions Clubs.

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j. To abide by the policies and requirements as determined by the International Board of Directors.

- k. To further the Lions Clubs International Purposes and Lions Code of Ethics.
- I. To resolve all disputes arising at the club level according to the Club Dispute Resolution Procedure determined by the International Board of Directors.

As of September 26, we have added 26 new members and dropped 49 for a net loss of 23. This is unacceptable! Please do your best to give others the opportunity and privilege to become members of the world's greatest and hardest working service organization. If you are enthusiastic, then that enthusiasm will be evident to others.

Ronald Eugene Reeder, 78, of Hagerstown, passed away Friday, Sept. 1, 2017, at Meritus Medical Center, Hagerstown. Born March 28, 1939, in Boonsboro, Md., he was the son of the late, Charles L. and Margaret L. (Smith) Reeder and stepson of Evelyn Reeder of McConnellsburg, Pa.

Mr. Reeder was a 1957 graduate of Boonsboro High School. He retired from the U.S. Postal Service as a mail handler. Mr. Reeder was a U.S. Army veteran. He was a member of Emmanuel United Methodist Church, Hagerstown; Longmeadow Lions Club; the B.P.O.Elks 378; NARFE; Maplehurst Country Club, Frostburg, Md., and Beaver Creek Country Club, Hagerstown; Seniors Bowling League at Turner's South Side Lanes and the Old-timers Baseball League, Cumberland, Md.

As a member of the Longmeadow Lions, he served in the Office of Director and for the past ten years he has served as the Club's Tail Twister. He had ten years of 100% Attendance. He and his wife, Pat, made a great team for Lionism.

In addition to his stepmother, Mr. Reeder also is survived by his loving wife of 55 years, Patricia A. (Rohrer) Reeder; a daughter, Susan Ann Reeder of Ashburn, Va.; half-brother, Michael B. Reeder (Tina) of McConnellsburg, Pa.; an aunt, Janet Otto of Delaware; sisters-in-law, Pamela Darden and Joyce Sheffler.

WILLIAM MARTIN THOMPSON

On Tuesday, September 12, Middletown lost a beloved former burgess, William M. Thompson. Lion Bill was well known for his intellect as well as unfailing wit. He devoted himself to public service and his family. His service as

Middletown burgess was one of the most rewarding experiences of his life.

Lion Bill was born August 13, 1930 in Woodbridge, New Jersey. He earned a BS in Ceramics from Rutgers University and a MS degree from Ohio State. After graduating, he began a long career in public service beginning with a 14-year Air Force commission. He continued serving with the Defense Technical Information Center, part of the Defense Logistics Agency, where he retired in 1990 after 26 years of honorable service and earned the Meritorious Civilian Service Award. He married Phyllis Larue Gladhill in 1964 and they had two daughters, Laura and Ann.

After moving to Middletown at the prodding of his family. his father-in-law, Ray Gladhill, decided he should be burgess in 1995, "with no input from me." He was responsible for the creation of a revitalization committee to develop ideas for downtown renewal and persuading Safeway officials to reopen their store in Town Center Plaza. The town's water tank is a standing monument to his ability to advocate for the town. Water issues dominated his time as burgess and he successfully in-

fluenced the MDE to improve our water policies. His involvement in the Maryland Municipal League and Council of Governments helped the town become well known and respected around the state. He was well known for immersing himself in issues without bias and understanding perspectives of those inside and outside of government.

Even in retirement, he continued to serve his community. Lion Bill was an active member of the Myersville Lions Club, and was a Melvin Jones Fellow. He was also a member of the Evangelical Lutheran Church Zion, a life-member of the Amvets Post 9, and the Elks.

Lion Bill is survived by his wife, Lion Phyllis; his daughter and son in-law Laura and TJ Junor, and their daughters Madeline and Evelyn; his daughter and son in-law Ann and Michael Santorios, and their daughter Fiona; his sister Barbara Kelley, and many others who although mourn, rejoice in his homecoming to the Lord.



Our District Governor would like for every club in District 22-W to conduct a vision Days collection event during her term of office (2017 – 2018) in support of the Lions Vision Research Foundation (LVRF). The traditional time for conducting a Vision Days event is the month of October but in reality you can do so any time during the year. As I have previously noted, the concept of Vision Days is for clubs to collect donations from the public to support LVRF as opposed to just budgeting a donation from club funds. This process provides multiple benefits for our clubs which include:

- It increases the club's visibility in the community and can be used as a vehicle to attract new members;
- It makes the public more aware of the work we do in the area of vision conservation in general and specifically can be used to promote the Lions Low Vision Center at the Wilmer;
- Has the potential to increase overall donations to LVRF while reducing demands on club budgets. Real world experience has shown that even a small club can realistically expect to collect between \$500 and \$1000 during a properly executed Vision Days event.

Obviously, such an event does best when it is conducted in a high traffic location such as a grocery store. However, location alone will not insure a successful collection. Your members should be wearing articles of clothing that make it obvious that they are Lions and you should have at last one sign indicating that you are collecting funds to support Lions Vision Research conducted in conjunction with the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins University. We have a limited quantity of very nice Vision Days posters available for your use. To obtain a post contact Lion Bob Bullock (410-848-7748) – bullock2070@comcast.net. In addition, make sure at least one person at each collection point can provide at least a basic explanation of what the Lions Vision Research Foundation is and how it is affiliated with the Wilmer.

Last, but certainly not least, when making your collection you need to be proactive. Don't just sit behind a table with a sign and hope people will give you a donation. Stand up and approach people as they come toward you; tell them that you are the XXX Lions Club and that you are collecting donations to support Lions Vision Research. Personally I have found that many people will tell you that they don't have any small bills with them – tell them that that is okay and that you see them when they come out of the store. I try notice what they are wearing and then remind them when they come back out of store. You will get a lot of refusals, and some really strange excuses but you will also collect a lot of money for LVRF.

PHISHING PROTECTION FOR LIONS Submitted by DG Susan Bonura

At Lions Clubs International, we pride ourselves in service to others. Our efforts bring notoriety and respect from communities worldwide. Unfortunately, this notoriety can also attract individuals that misrepresent themselves in order to gain access to personal or financial information. When individuals use the internet or phone to commit this type of fraud it is commonly known as "phishing."

LCI systems are password protected for your safety, and restrict access to personal information including email addresses and phone numbers. Outside of our LCI systems, Club information is widely known in our local communities through the media or non-LCI websites, and it is quite easy to obtain. This visibility also increases the chance of being contacted by a phisher.

To protect yourself, your club, and the Association from phishing:

- As a general practice when receiving unsolicited emails, do not follow embedded links in emails, especially if there is any mention of updating credit card information, personal data, PIN numbers, or passwords. Delete these emails immediately.
- If you should be redirected to a website, verify that the URL address starts with https://. The single letter S after http indicates that it is a secure site, and is likely legitimate. If the URL is not secure, close your browser immediately.
- If contacted by another club member or the Association Headquarters via email, mobile text message or social media, and there is a request for financial assistance, wire transfer, etc. do not reply to the message. Contact the club member or Association staff separately via email, phone, or through the MyLCI Communications Center to validate that the request is legitimate.
- Always use virus protection software on your PC or MAC.

- Exercise caution when using public Wi-Fi systems in a coffee house, restaurant, or internet café. These public systems offer no protection from unauthorized fraudulent monitoring.
- Create strong passwords for your email, social media and other online accounts, and update your passwords often.

Never store passwords, banking information, or credit card numbers in your email.

Lions Clubs International is the largest service club organization in the world. Our 1.4 million members in more than 46,000 clubs provide humanitarian service in more than 208 countries and geographical areas around the globe. Since 1917, Lions clubs have aided the blind and visually impaired, championed youth initiatives and strengthened communities through hands-on service and humanitarian projects.

Carroll County Lions Clubs have been providing hands-on service to the county since 1940 when the Westminster Lions Club was chartered. Other clubs followed and the county now has 16 Lions Clubs that include Union Bridge formed in 1944; Lineboro-Manchester formed in 1945; Freedom District, New Windsor and Taneytown all formed in 1947; Hampstead formed in 1951; Taylorsville-Winfield formed in 1954; Roaring Run formed in 1959; Silver Run-Union Mills formed in 1961; Terra Rubra formed in 1966; Deer Park and Harney both formed in 1974; Valley formed in 1980; Greater Carroll formed in 2005 and South Carroll formed in 2011.

These Lions Clubs sponsor five Leo Clubs in Carroll County at Francis Scott Key High School, Century High School, Liberty High School, South Carroll High School and Silver Oak Academy and these high school students also provide service to Carroll County citizens. Leos develop leadership skills as project organizers, time managers and team leaders. They learn teamwork, cooperation and collaboration and feel the rewards of community service.



SINKING OF THE TITANIC Submitted by Lion Jack Byers

The sinking of the Titanic occurred more than a century ago and five years before Melvin Jones held his historic meeting with business associates in Chicago. Still the sinking of the Titanic has fascinated and intrigued folks throughout the intervening 105 years. So it was a real treat to have Captain Edward Smith, aka Norman Little, with us at the September 5 meeting to present additional details about this doomed ship.

One of those details, actually a mystery, concerned the behavior of Captain Smith himself. Why did he have the throttle on full speed while passing through a field of icebergs when he had been previously warned about their presence? And in the midst of such danger, why did he retire at 9 PM on that fatal Sunday evening of April 14, 1912?

In his Captain attire, Mr. Little showed us the actual insignia on the cap. He also displayed a replica of the ring "Unsinkable" Molly Brown wore. The focus of his presentation, however, was his own involvement in the story. It began with a picture of the Titanic in his boyhood home. His wonder and curiosity about that picture soon led him to books and chronicles about the ship. Through the years he has secured construction plans as well as letters from survivors.

His crowning achievement, however, has been the construction of a fifteen foot long exact scale model of the ship, now on display at Discovery Station. The model has brought him into contact with individuals and families who were directly involved in the disaster, including two brothers whose last name was also Little and whose mother was a survivor. Little describes his Titanic journey as pursuing his dream. In that respect his parting message to the Club, reminiscent of the movie theme, Never Give Up, was simply *You're Never Too Old to Dream*!

WHITE CANE SAFETY DAY-October 15th

Throughout the world, the long white cane is used by people who are blind or visually impaired as a tool for safe and reliable navigation. The white cane is a symbol of the user's skills and talents, mobility and independence. It also allows the sighted person to recognize that the user is visually impaired.

The white cane was initially developed and put into use as a measure of safety, especially in traffic situations. Sufficient training with an Orientation and Mobility specialist can aid in successful cane use, technique and safety. Several countries have traffic laws designed to protect the person using the white cane. The "VisionAware" section of the American Foundation for the Blind's website illustrates several types of white canes that are internationally recognized. Sometimes the white cane has a red band or strip for the purpose of contrast.

International White Cane Safety Day (October 15th) gives Lions an opportunity to increase awareness of the white cane traffic safety laws. According to the World Blind Union, which is a global organization representing the 285 million blind or partially sighted people worldwide, "White Cane Day is observed worldwide to recognize the movement of blind people from dependency to full participation in society."
