I want you to take a few minutes and think back to when you joined Lions Club. Why did you want to join and when did you actually become a Lion?

I know for me it started when I was a kid. My Great Uncle Charles

McVey was a member of the Anadarko Lions Club. I can remember the events they sponsored, but none stands out more to me than when the Lion sponsored Carnival came to town. It was set up on the Courthouse Square and was always a huge event for our community. I can remember one year how much I wanted to go and how much sadness there was in my mother's eyes when she said she would see if we had the money after the bills were paid. The next afternoon my uncle stopped by, and just happened to have a couple of books of ride tickets the "carnival" had supplied to encourage community participation (I know now it was him who purchased those tickets). I remember all the lights, the Ferris wheel and the Lions Club concession trailer. I remember seeing the men inside the trailer having the best time- all smiles and full of fun! I remember watching them make hot dogs, nachos, and chili pies, but what I remember most was watching them make snow cones! I remember how the syrup ran down my uncle's hand as he made them. The red, blue, and purple syrup stained his hands and lasted for days before it was all washed away. I remember how much he would smile anytime anyone asked what had happened. It was then, I knew, I wanted to be a part of something like that. A group that would make the community better, all while having fun, enjoying the interaction with everyone involved.

After I graduated from high school in 1986, I attended college and life got super busy. The thought of becoming a member of a social organization went to the back of the list of my priorities. By the time I started thinking about being a part of a community organization my uncle had passed away. I didn't really know anyone in Lions and when the opportunity arose to join AMBUCS came, I joined. Due to some crazy circumstances and lack

of support from the sponsors of the club, it quickly folded. I found myself once again looking for a way to help my community. A couple of years later a friend of my mother's was serving Anadarko Lions as President. She asked and invited mom to join the club. My mom did what she always did and jumped in with both feet! The memories of actually becoming a Lion surfaced when I saw the difference Lions were making by hosting the Lions Annual After prom. Being able to see the students choose to be a part of the Lion sponsored event was life changing. I have adults that come up to me now from my first "After prom" telling me how much they appreciated the Lions Club for making prom night memorable!

As I continue to serve my community, state, and world, I look forward to finding new projects and new friends. Friends that I will ask to join us as Lions as we <u>MAKE OUR MARK</u> on the world.
