While we are on this subject, now is the time to start considering establishing a committee to select club officers for next year. Once the committee announces their suggestions in March these need to be announced at the next three meetings and then voted on. Elections need

to be held in April. For clubs that only meet once or twice a month it is imperative to start thinking now. Officers need to be reported no later than May 15<sup>th</sup> to LCI. It is critical for your incoming District Governor to have

this information available when they start their year. The new Governor does not need to spend the first two months of their year trying to get a club officer contact list together. Also, when reporting club officers, if we don't have complete contact information it is hard to make contact. When you are contacted by the District Governor, please respond in a timely manner to allow them to make travel arrangements. We have a very large district to cover, and your cooperation is essential.

Another thing to note is that the time is now to do your nominations for District 3NW Lion of the year as well as the Hal Long rookie of the year, Carobelle Carson Women in Lions award, and Mike Banks Spirit award.

We have been able to make about 23 club visits so far and I have real concerns with the limited amount of knowledge that our club members know about the state projects such as the Briggs Memorial scholarship, KidSight, Oklahoma Lions Eye bank, eyeglass recycling, etc. I even had the question asked of what do we do with the glasses after they get to the state office. Of course, this starts with proper mentoring of new Lions but if you don't know what these are about, ask questions, and better still, start attending District and State meetings. 
They sponsor a teacher feed before school starts in August, give scholarships, sponsor a golf tournament as well as other activities. We always enjoy our visit with Crescent.

In September at the Blaine County fairgrounds, they man a concession stand for two days serving food and drinks. Also in September, they prepare food for the Signal Peak Silica Golf tournament at Roman Nose State Park in return for a generous donation to their club.
