- I. Called to Order: by District Governor Beth James. Date & Time: Sat 08/17/2024 10:03 AM. Host: Arlington. Location: 154 W Cox St, Arlington WA 98223.
 - A. Casual Introduction(s): Members & people present gave introductions. Wrapped up around 10:15 AM.
 - **B. Program:** Banner Passing. DG Beth James introduced and thanked PDG Joel Haggen for his year. Joel thanked Alington for hosting, and to each and everyone for all the help throughout the year and convention. Presented CC Patty Allen-White & 2nd VDG Rock White with Presidential Appreciation, and awarded other Heros at Convention Rosemary Walkup & Travis Walkup and Leos. Immediate Past Zone Chairs formally passed Zone Banners to the new Zone chairs.

II. Standing Items

A. Secretary Report (John LeMieux): Reminded members verbally to get reports in for inclusion on minutes (this in addition to an email prior to the meeting, and twice in the week after the meeting).

B. Cabinet Reports

- 1. Alert North Chair (PZC Larry Koberstein): Not present, no report submitted.
- 2. Alert South Chair (PDG Steve Brooks): Not present, no report submitted.
- 3. BC Lions Society Chair (PZC Robin Woolmer): The British Columbia Lions Society for Children With Disabilities raises funds to provide specialized services for children in BC and Yukon, such as camps, accommodations for families, transportation and grants. All Camps were in full swing this month and all were completely full. Family Camps running in Aug are also completely full. We are partnering with Canucks Autism Network to run some special camps this summer for children on the autism spectrum. Camp Shawnigan Campaign going well, almost \$9 million raised. We are doing special tours in September for some of the people who are interested in supporting the Campaign. Hoping to work with the Lions to put on this event. Easter Seals House is running at over 90% occupancy. Drop Zone is in September. We are doing well in Vancouver and Victoria. Kelowna and Burnaby could use some more registrations.
- 4. Lions of District 19O Charitable Outreach (PZC Ron Wilkie): Formerly the Busy B Charitable Outreach.
 - **a.** We have not been able to identify a new editor for the newsletter. Without an editor we will be looking at other options to continue.
 - **b.** The dinner/auction is on hold at this time with our primary concern being the newsletter.
 - **c.** We applied for and received an Melvin Jones Fellowship to be presented to Mckenna. We hope to present it to her in the near future.
 - **d.** We are looking at adding to our committee roster, especially from the north to fully represent our entire district.
- Camp Horizon Chair (Don Webster): Not present, no report submitted. FYI Empowers people challenged by disabilities through experiences that help develop life skills, foster independence and build self-esteem.
- 6. CARE (PZC Lynda Davidson): Not present, no report submitted.
- 7. Christmas Ship Chair (PZC Sandra Ball): The International Lions Christmas Ship is gearing up for another sailing, happening on the second weekend in December, as usual.

We have some vacancies on our Board that we'd like to see filled with hard-working and dedicated Lions. There's a bit of work to be done before we even look at sailing; organizing costumes, making sure they're clean and ready to wear, selecting the 30-person crew who will be on the high seas, having someone prepare the food and other snacks for us, and a Santa. Of the 30 people sailing (from both sides of the border), a small number are people who have sailed before; bringing with them and sharing

their experiences with the newbies. We are also searching for people to Lead some of the groups; we have some pretty rowdy pirates and a choir.

If you're interested and you have the time and are so moved, please see me after this meeting. Our AGM is slated for September 21st, 10am in the Community Center in Bellingham, next to the MD19 office. It will be a Live and in-person meeting.

We are also seeking ideas for fundraising; we were able to raise some monies last year, but aside from funding/gifts from certain Lions Clubs, we do not have a steady income source. This needs to happen if the project is to continue serving the children of the islands. While the International Christmas Ship is presently not sailing Canadian waters, there IS a group of dedicated Lions who are making sure the children to the North are not left out. We thank them for their service!

- Once again, AGM is Sat Sept 21st, at the Lions Community Center. We hope to see you there!
 8. CLERC (PZC Barry Shiles): Not present, no report submitted. FYI Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre.
- 9. NW LERC (ZC Carolyn O'Dell Bob O'Dell provided on behalf): The Northwest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center continues to be the beacon of light and hope for those that may not otherwise be able to see. All Lions Clubs in Washington and Idaho continue to collect used eyeglasses from the public to support the NWLERC's mission of distributing eyeglasses around the world.

Recently, the Northwest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center had completed several mission requests for glasses to Nepal, Kathmandu, and Birtamode. Other recent missions include Tijuana, Mexico for over 1,500 eyeglasses.

I am hopeful to be able to reach a wider audience to inform the many Lions Clubs within District O on the interworking of the main mission for the NWLERC Office. I will be reaching out to many Zone Chairpersons to arrange a time to give a NWLERC Presentation at their Zone Meetings. On the presentations, in which I intend to give, I will put together a PowerPoint to add to my presentation to provide viewers with a visual to have a better understanding of the NWLERC's mission.

As a NWLERC District Director, I find it to be very rewarding knowing that we are helping to change people lives, even if it is only one pair of glasses at a time. I will continue to work with the Zone Chairpersons, Individual Clubs, and their Satellite Persons to assist them in their efforts to continue to collect glasses and will provide them with information and support as needed.

- 10. Contests & Awards Chair (Michael Contreras): My plan is to continue the current contest that was a part of last year's convention. However, I plan to work with Lyro for the upcoming year to revise and revive some of the contests that have fallen through the cracks. I urge members of the district to review the Contest page on the MD-19 website, and to email me if they see a contest that they wish to revive or participate in, to please email me at <u>mikercv.nac@gmail.com</u> with any thoughts, Ideas, or questions. I will provide an update in the next quarter.
- **11. Convention (Lyro Downie-Cyphers):** The Convention for 2024-2025 is "Let's Give Em Something to Talk About." The location of the convention is the Swinomish Casino & Convention Center.
 - a. The dates are March 21-21,2025 and Save the Date emails will be going out soon.
 - **b.** We have a unique opportunity for Lions who may want to attend convention but find it a bit cost prohibitive. The Swinomish has set aside 15 RV slots that have hook ups and electricity for anyone to use at about 1/3 of the cost of the hotel rooms, these slots will be first come first serve. What that means is three nights in the RV slot will cost about the same as one night in the hotel.
 - c. We will have hotel accommodation in the hotel that will be similar to last year's cost per room.
 - **d.** DG Beth will be working on showing people who Lions are and will be sending her message of Lion growth, Leo growth, and working toward the goal of 1.5 million new lions by 2027.
 - e. Growth for our clubs is crucial to our service and to bringing in new Lions who want to work to serve and grow stronger. So, "Let's Give Em to Talk About"!
- 12. Diabetes Chair (Mark Deroche John LeMieux read on behalf): Lions, with the support of Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), are working to reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve the lives of those living with diabetes. My goal this year is do my best to learn more Diabetes information that I can pass on to the District and clubs. Upcoming, our MD Diabetes Chair Georgia is setting up a Step Challenge for all of us to get involved in. This year, MD Diabetes Chair Georgia Medwedrich is hoping to call on each district to participate in a "Fitness Challenge." This is where each club will submit to me their club's total of steps over the course of each week for 30 weeks, with the winning district announced at the Multiple District 19 Convention. So, to continue along this theme, I am challenging each of the five districts to participate in this step challenge. This year I would ask that each walker donate a participation fee of \$5.00 which will go toward sending a child to camp in either US or CA. All monies donated will be split by where the majority of the clubs are located and sent to either the American Diabetes Assoc. or Diabetes Canada. Starting October 7, 2024 to May 4, 2025 for a total of 30 weeks. This sounds like a good way to get some exercise and support a child to go to camp.
- **13. Environment (PDG Enoch Rowland):** Lions working to protect the environment to create healthier communities and a more sustainable world. Called attention to planting anc cleaning at the airport park, and need for Discovery Park tree replacement and cleaning.
- 14. GET (PDG Rosemary Richert): Global Extension Team (GET) is an offshoot of the Global Membership Team that is focused on starting new clubs within its district. To-date a preliminary of 17 locations on

the US side of District 19-O have been identified for possible extension efforts, and 8 existing US clubs have preliminarily been identified for rebuilding efforts. These sites will soon be compared to the ones listed by DG Beth in her DG goals for this year and then efforts will begin to prioritize extension and rebuilding efforts. Soon I hope to network with knowledgeable Canadian Lion leaders to determine a like list for Canadian locations. The MD19 'GET' chair has reached out to begin having all 5 'GET' chairpersons work together to identify potential strategies and methods. As chairperson, I was invited to attend the summit in Toronto but unfortunately, I am unable to attend.

- **15.** LGL (PDG Rosemary Richert): Lions Giving Library (LGL) has given away just over 3100 books, at 5 events, since the beginning of this Lions year on July 1 st . Events included a Farmers Market, a Night Market, a Seafood Fest, a Neighborhood Night Out, and a giveaway at Walmart. Lions Giving Library is the grateful beneficiary of a \$5,000 MD19 Lions Foundation grant to purchase 2000 Spanish language books for early learners and their parents. The goal is to begin to meet the basic literacy needs for the growing Hispanic population in King & Snohomish Counties, both for young children and their parents as many of the books will be bilingual. The project is for one year beginning September 1 st , 2024.
- 16. GLT (Bob O'Dell): Global Leadership Team (GLT) supports and strengthens Leadership Development for members at every level of Lions International.

- **17. GMT (Anna Corina Villarreal):** The Global Membership Team (GMT) supports membership development by recruiting new members and promoting positive membership experiences.

As of last month, District 19-O has 61 active clubs, Current Membership totals 1684. We have gained 27 members and dropped 44...leaving us with a net of -17 members, and that's with 28% of our clubs not reporting membership updates in the portal in over 3 months. Mission 1.5 goal from the MD level is net 2. How do we get there from here? Ideally, I would like each club to be net 2.

With that said, I believe that our strength as Lions lies not only in our numbers but in the diversity of our members, and that through this diversity we will reach our goal of 1.5 million members.

The largest diversity obstacle we face as Lions is age. If this were a play, the role of Elder has already been cast. Now, it's time to find the rest of the family. Because, the reality is, the median age of our members reflects the lifespan of our clubs. Not only empty nesters, but also moms and dads with school-age children, single adults, college students, and military members are all potential members of our Lions family.

We are no longer our grandfather's dinner business club. In addition to meeting over dinner with a prospective member for an hour to go over what Lions do, a simple QR code can now disseminate Lions information with a tap of the camera button on a smart phone, reaching potential new members with key marketing points in an instant. Gathering virtually through platforms like Zoom or TEAMS can help us attract younger members, who are often more comfortable with virtual interactions. We need to be active on all social media platforms, not just Facebook, and illustrate the variety of activities we offer.

One aspect that often gets overlooked is conflict resolution. I will encourage our district to have all members visit the Conflict resolution training in the Lions Learning Center. It's crucial to ask ourselves: When we bring in potential new members for a visit, what is the atmosphere? Does conflict exist, and if so, how does our club address it? Is it handled with parliamentary procedure and rational debate, or does it devolve into screaming and crying? The way we manage conflict can significantly impact membership, either positively or negatively.

Once new members join, it's essential to keep them engaged. When they first visit or join, ask them why they are here—is it for social interaction, business networking, or service opportunities? And most importantly, remember their answer. Give new members leadership opportunities. No one enjoys playing basketball with a ball hog—so pass the ball! This ensures everyone feels involved and valued.

"Just ask" isn't just a catchy slogan; it's a great mantra. Inviting a friend, coworker, neighbor, or family member to a meeting is twofold in its ingenuity. First, bringing visitors to the club increases visibility and membership numbers. Second, when people join with someone they already know, it increases their desire to stay. Think about it: Have you ever been invited to a party where you didn't know anyone? Compare that to a party where you know at least one person or even a group of people. Which party are you more likely to attend and enjoy? I challenge our district to use every meeting and every service project as an opportunity to invite a friend.

Never underestimate the power of will. Yes, it's about determination to reach our Goals, but it's also about commitment. When you say, "I will invite a friend, coworker or neighbor to a meeting or service project," do you mean it? There is strength in following through. Let us be a District that stands by its commitment to Mission 1.5

As we look forward to International Induction Day on April 26, 2025, let's remember that every new member we bring into our Lions family strengthens our mission. By embracing diversity in age, leveraging technology, resolving conflicts effectively, and fostering a welcoming atmosphere, we can ensure that our club not only grows but thrives.

I look forward to working with DG Beth and all of you to realize our District goals. Let's go out and find the rest of our family!

- 20. Knights of the Blind (Colette Arvidson): Colette Arvidson, District O KOTB Cabinet Representative | <u>colette.arvidson@gmail.com</u> | (360) 391-5880. As we look toward the 2024-2025 Lions year, KOTB is laying out our Goals and Activities. Most Lions know that we carry the banner of Knights of the Blind. We do this primarily by preventing avoidable blindness around the world, especially by providing eyeglasses, vision screenings, and other programs. But many have never met a person who is Blind or Low Vision, especially considering personal confidentiality. For more information contact me by phone, text or email or read the rest of this report.  Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) supports the efforts of Lions clubs and partners in serving communities locally and globally, giving hope and impacting lives through humanitarian service projects
- and grants. 23. Leader Dogs for the Blind Chair (PZC Toby Hiller): Not present, no report submitted.
- Leo (PZC Linda Deroche): Not present, no report submitted. FYI Leadership, Experience, Opportunity (LEO) are devoted young members who realize the power of action.
- 25. LFCDG (Richard Simonson John LeMieux read on behalf): Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides empowers Canadians living with disabilities to navigate their world with confidence and independence, by providing a Dog Guide at no cost and supporting them in their journey together. LFCDG has Canada's largest Dog Guide Training Facility in Oakville Ontario. The Foundation provides Dog Guides to qualified Canadian citizens at no cost to the recipient. They train seven disciplines of Dog Guides to improve the quality of life for those needing assistance; 1. Vision, 2. Hearing, 3. Service, 4. Diabetes Alert, 5. Autism Assistance, 6. Seizure Response & 7. Facility Support Dog Guides. It costs \$35,000 to provide this service and the money is raised through donations from Lions Clubs, Lions, other service Clubs, businesses and individuals. Construction has begun on the new 89,000 sq. ft., \$50M dollar facility in Oakville as they need to be able to provide greater numbers of Guide Dogs and the current facility is at capacity, old and not built as an accessible building. Tax deductible donations and construction details can be viewed at the <u>dogguides.com</u> website. The current Director for BC/Yukon is Richard Simonson until October 2024 when Dave Pasin will take over for the next 3 years.

- 26. Lions of BC Hearing Society (PCC Surinder Gahir): Not present, no report submitted. FYI To foster and promote hearing conservation and aid to the deaf, deafened and the hearing impaired in the province of British Columbia.
- 27. Lions Quest {Vacant}: Lions Clubs International Foundation's (LCIF) signature youth education program, is a social emotional learning curriculum which gives students the skills to navigate life and prevent bullying and substance abuse.
- 28. Marketing & Public Relations (PZC Ed Poquette): Here to help.
- 29. New Voices Chair (Teresa Addison): The New Voices Initiative promotes gender parity and diversity and seeks to increase the number of women, young adults and underrepresented populations in our associations. Links Online <u>Resources Page</u> & <u>Facebook</u> group. We plan on setting up a contest soon and will have more details forthcoming.
- 30. Vision & Hearing (PDG Mike Lally): Vision Strengthen eye care systems, enabling them to fight blindness and vision loss and assist those who are blind or visually impaired. Hearing provides hearing aids through participating providers to eligible patients who are sponsored by Lions clubs. We have screened 15,780 people this year. We currently have 140 people trained on using the

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equipment. We are almost completely booked for September and October.
The new Hearing screener still has not been approved by the state for use in the schools.
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31. Youth Camps & Exchange (Rob Schumer): Not present, no report submitted. FYI - Youth Camps and Exchange (YCE) has programs all around the world and is designed for young people between the ages of 15 and 22 to create and foster a spirit of understanding among peoples of the world.

- 4. Zone 04 (Roger Chevrier): Presented a report, no report submitted a week after the meeting.
- 5. Zone 05 (Terry Bronkema): Has been in contact with the new club. Many clubs are not reporting service hour reporting and hopes to change that.
- 6. Zone 06 (Rosemary Walkup): Zone Chair Theme: "Friendship." 8 clubs including the Leos.
 - a. Membership: Zone O6 started the year with 220 members. We dropped a few since the June count, but we remain positive; Zone O6 current total membership is 221. Several of our clubs have added new members and we continue to grow. Our Zone project (Lions Trek 2024-2025) is set up to inspire continual membership opportunities to each club and we are excited to grow.
 - b. Leadership: All Club officers are reported to the Lions Portal and three clubs have excellence awards in review. I have met with all club presidents and secretaries to gain a deeper understanding of each club, encouraged annual planning meetings, completed four Official Zone Chair Visits, and addressed one DG visit. Our first Zone O6 Newsletter has been distributed, and I have worked with each club to develop a web page recruiting tool for our Zone Project Lions Trek 2024-2025. Training has been encouraged via online programs and the in-person Heart of a Lion conference in Everett. Some one-on-one training is being offered as needed for officer support of the new Lions Portal. The Leos continue to collaborate in the planning of LEOCON2025 with weekly meetings and fundraising efforts. As Zone Chair, I have taken the Guiding Lions Certificate course to better serve the clubs in my zone.
 - c. Service: Zone O6 has been busy with service projects and fundraisers! Logger Rodeo and Log Drive, Fourth of July Flags, Giving Library, Smokestack lights, Aqua Fest beer garden, Concession stands with Lions and Leos flipping burgers to raise scholarship funds, A Skagit Valley Leo returned from the YEP in Australia, Sedro-Woolley has the "Corn Feed" coming up in September, and there is a 75th anniversary party on the horizon for Lake Stevens Lions Club in October.
