One of the Lions International Causes is Childhood Cancer, so since the month of September is Childhood Cancer Awareness month, let's look into this. Did you know that in the United States, one in five children diagnosed with cancer will not survive? That's frightening. As a parent, when your child is sick or injured they look to you to make them feel better. Cancer is not something you can "kiss and make it go away." We all know someone who's battled cancer, here's some info about children:

Facts

Globally, childhood cancer looks like this:*

400,000

children diagnosed annually

9 in 10

diagnosed children live in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs)

<u>~30%</u>

of children with cancer in LMICs survive, compared to ≥80% in high-income countries

Cancer is the number one cause of death by disease among children (Children's Cancer Cause).



Of children diagnosed with cancer globally, 62.6% die from the disease within five years (Cancer.net).

6.2 million child deaths could be averted between 2020-2050 through investments to increase the availability of childhood cancer healthcare services (World Health Organization).



A cure is possible for more than 80% of children with cancer when childhood cancer services are accessible (World Health Organization).



Only 20% of countries globally reported early detection programs or guidelines to strengthen early diagnosis of childhood cancer symptoms at the primary care level (World Health Organization).



The most effective strategy to reduce the impact of cancer in children is prompt, accurate diagnosis followed by effective, evidence-based therapy with tailored supportive care (World Health Organization).

Childhood cancer is rare, but it can be more dangerous than adult cancer, since children are still growing and their bodies are not fully developed. About 1000 children in Canada are diagnosed with cancer each year. What are the most common types of childhood cancer?

- **Leukemia** Leukemia is a cancer of the blood and bone marrow, and it accounts for about 30% of all childhood cancers.
- **Brain and Central Nervous System Tumors** These tumors can occur in various parts of the brain and spinal cord and can cause symptoms such as headaches, nausea, and changes in vision.
- **Neuroblastoma** This cancer develops from nerve cells. It is most commonly found in the adrenal gland, but it can also occur in the neck, chest, or abdomen.
- Wilms Tumor This affects the kidneys, primarily in children under the age of five. Symptoms can include a
