# **Scholarships for District 22-C Honor Band**

What a difficult time to be graduating from high school. In spite of the cancellation of many of their activities as well as our annual celebration, in a sense, the band played on. The scholarship program requires a student to play in the band for two years. To maintain the integrity of the program, all underclass students who responded to the invitation will be credited as though they did play this year so they may qualify for a scholarship next year. With many lost opportunities for graduating seniors, we had to find a way to maintain our scholarship program, so, we held an online audition with our usual two judges. I wish you could meet these young people. Each and every one of them was grateful for the opportunity to audition and are excited about their future.

Our first scholarship recipient is a student at Phelps ACE High School in Washington, DC. Syanne Nosiri auditioned on the alto saxophone which she started playing last year, transitioning from the trumpet. ### What is LOVRNET?



The Lions Low Vision Rehabilitation Network (Lions LOVRNET) is a community-based healthcare program that addresses the current shortage and distribution of low vision rehabilitation services.

The Lions of Multiple District 22, in partnership with low vision rehabilitation experts at the Lions Vision Research and Rehabilitation Center of Johns Hopkins Wilmer Eye Institute (Lions Vision Center), developed and implemented LOVRNET as a demonstration project in Maryland, Delaware, and the District of Columbia (Multiple District 22). It overcomes the barriers of meeting the rapidly growing demand for low vision rehabilitation services that must be provided by eye doctors and therapists in the community as the number of people with low vision rapidly increases with

the aging of the population.

The program was initially funded by grants from Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) Sightfirst program and the Readers Digest Partners for Sight Foundation. Check out its history below. There was also a second LCIF grant of \$130,000.00.

# **HOW CAN THE LIONS OF DISTRICT 22-C HELP?**

• Sign up to be an interviewer

\*Patient Interviews is responsible for recruiting, training, and supervising Lion volunteers who conduct computer-assisted telephone interviews of LOVRNET patients before their visit to the low vision clinician and again after the patient has been discharged from low vision rehabilitation care. This Task Force also is responsible for quality assurance of the patient interviews and assuring compliance with patient protected health information requirements under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). This is all done at your time and your home.

• Sign up to help with Direct Services

\*Direct Services to Patients is responsible for developing and coordinating local programs in which Lion volunteers provide direct services to LOVRNET patients. These services include providing transportation to the doctor's office or a clinic for patients who need it; trouble shooting and when appropriate solving patient problems with their use of vision assistive equipment in the home; helping make safety and adaptive modifications to the patient's home environment as recommended by the low vision therapist; helping patients gain access to services available to the blind and visually impaired; organizing and leading local low vision patient informational and support groups; and helping patients identify sources of financial assistance to help pay for needed vision assistive equipment.

#### WHAT IS LOW VISION?

- Low vision is a term used to describe permanent visual impairments in both eyes that interfere with the person's ability to perform daily activities that are important to them.
- Most low vision is caused by incurable age-related eye diseases such as age-related macular degeneration, glaucoma, and diabetic retinopathy.
- Eighty percent of people with low vision are over age 65 and the average age of the low vision population is 77 years old.
- More than 90% of low vision patients have at least one other major health problem.
- More than a third of low vision patients (39%) live alone, 81% depend on family and friends for transportation and most depend on family (77%) and/or friends (38%) for other types of assistance. Only 5% of patients report they receive assistance from their church and only 2% report receiving assistance from community service organizations like Lions Clubs.
- The patient's physical and mental health status add to and interact with the patient's visual impairments to cause cumulative functional limitations and disabilities.

#### **HOW DID IT ALL GET STARTED?**

Dr. Robert W. Massof from John's Hopkins had a dream in 2013 now known as *LOVRNET*. Dr. Massof, better known to the Lions of MD 22 as Dr. Bob, is the founder and director of the Lions Vision Research Foundation or LVRF.

Dr. Bob's dream was to help the avalanche of people in MD 22 who would be experiencing low vision by

providing them access to trained low vision providers. He began his pursuit of this dream by seeking support from the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) and by convincing the Lions of MD 22 to support this project in their communities.

Dr. Massof asked LVRF to seek a grant of \$800,000.00 from LCIF in 2012 to fund his LOVRNET dream and he asked the Lions of MD 22 to volunteer to make *LOVRNET* a reality. The LCIF Sight First Committee responded with a grant of \$567,647.00 in August of 2013. A second grant of \$300,000.00 was received from the Reader Digest Partners for Sight Foundation to complete this project. The *LOVRNET* dream was now ready to become a reality.

The first step in the *LOVRNET* project was to select an Executive Committee with one Lion from each of the five sub districts of MD 22. The Lion from District C selected was PDG Ted Ladd.

District A – PCC Rowe Haywood, District B – PDG Charlene Travers, District C – PDG Ted Ladd. District D – PDG Ken Chew, District W – PCC Clare Newcomer

Dr. Bob Massof and Jim Deremeik were advisors and Past International President Clem Kusiak was a representative of the LCIF Sight First Committee.

The first action of the Executive Committee was to put together a *LOVRNET* Steering Committee with two Lions from each district. Those Lions from District C were: PID Joe Gaffigan and PDG Gary Burdette

District A – PDG Dick Bloomquist and PCC Rowe Haywood, District B – PCC John Lawrence and PDG Dave Studley, District C – PID Joe Gaffigan and PDG Gary Burdette, District D – PID Ted Reiver and PDG Charles Covington, District W – Lion Bob Bullock and PCC Clare Newcomer

By January 2014, everything was in place to build the Lions Low Vision Rehabilitation Network. The Executive/Steering Committee needed now to get Lions trained and involved in Dr. Bob's dream. Lion Task forces were created and the Lions who made up the Executive/Steering Committee were given the job to head up the five key taskforces as follows:

1. Ophthalmologists Outreach - PCC Bob Muchow

- 2. <u>Telephone Interviewers</u> PDG Ted Ladd
- Direct Services Lion Bob Bullock (also initially on the planning committee from District 22-C, PDGs Gary Burdette and Sandi Halterman). PDG Paul Hawkins assumed these duties.
- 4. Administration PID Joe Gaffigan
- 5. <u>Sustainability</u> PCC John Lawrence (added in 2015)

The official Kick-Off Event for *LOVRNET* was held at Blind Industries and Services of Maryland (BISM) in Baltimore, Maryland on June 9, 2014 with 85 Lions and guests attending including LCIF Chair PIP Wayne Madden.

The rest of the story is all the work that has been accomplished to make Dr. Bob's dream come true. There was also a second LCIF grant of \$130,000.00.

Today, *LOVRNET* is up and running and trying to expand beyond MD 22 with the Lions of MD 33 in Massachusetts creating their own LOVRNET project. Also, a new foundation, Lions Low Vision Network Foundation has been set up to accommodate the expansion process.

A dream is always a dream until every patient with vision has access to low vision specialists who understand that the standard of care for low vision patients is rehabilitation. Dr. Bob Massof's dream is still a work in progress.
