How does a quarter auction work?

All bidders purchase a numbered paddle (or paddles) for \$3 for one or two paddles for \$5 – a ping pong ball with the same number(s) goes into the *spin bin*. Vendors offer items for auction (new, quality items from their companies). Based on the value of the item, you bid on the item with quarters. (Example – a \$38 baking stone from Pampered Chef is up for auction. If you want a chance to win, you pay \$0.50 cents for each paddle you want to use. Everyone who wants to bid on the item pays \$0.50 cents to their table worker (per paddle) and raises their paddle up above their head. When all bids are in, the *spin bin* is rotated, mixing the balls up, and a ball is drawn with a number on it. If the person with that number placed a bid, they win the item for that round.

If they did not bid, another ball (with a new number) is drawn until someone who placed a bid wins. This process continues until all auction items are won.

Bidding scale for Quarter Auction:

Retail of \$20.99 or less = 1 quarter ••••• \$21 - \$40.99 = 2 quarters
\$41 - \$60.99 = 3 quarters •••••• \$61+ = 4 quarters
(No bids will be over 4 quarters regardless of the value!)

Highlighting

Our District 22-C Chairperson is PDG Mike Bigler

A little history: The ideas behind Lions Quest dates back to 1975, when a teenager named Rick Little set out on a “quest” to help other young people develop the skills and strength of character needed to succeed as adults. Rick conducted a survey of over 2,000 high school students to determine the issues that concerned those most and consulted experienced teachers who suggested including a teacher workshop which would serve as a classroom model. The program was so successful at the high school level that soon middle and elementary schools were asking for age appropriate positive youth development programs. Little eventually founded and served as chief executive officer of the International Youth Foundation.

In 1984, Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) gave its first grant to Quest International to help further expand the program. From that point, support of Quest became a key tenet of LCIF’s service to youth. For the next eighteen years, LCIF supported Quest at the organizational level through grants and technical collaboration, and at the local level through club involvement in community implementation of the program in schools.

LCIF took formal ownership of Lions Quest on September 30, 2002. *To date, LCIF has awarded more than 360 grants for a cumulative total of more than \$20 million to expand or establish Lions Quest programs across the United States and around the world. Since that time, the program has grown to include 40 languages in over 90 countries across the globe.*

Lions have been key to the success and expansion of Lions Quest, supporting the program through local funding, coordinating teacher training, co-hosting parent meetings, speaking to youth, and undertaking joint service projects with students.

Of personal note: Many of you may still remember Lion Helen Thiers from the former Oxon Hill Friendly Lions. She was one of the lions who spearheaded trying to get the Quest program in District 22-C (specifically Prince George’s County), back in about 1999, however, due to County having the D.A.R.E. program already in place, they were not real receptive to this new program. Lion Helen did have some seminars with teachers and some lions to educate and Certify them in the Quest Program, one of them being a young lion name Sandi Halterman.

What is Lions Quest? Lions Quest is a life skills and prevention program of Lions Clubs International Foundation, implemented in more than 50 countries around the world. Lions Quest programs teach young people skills necessary for everyday success. These skills include: • Learning to accept responsibility • Communicating effectively • Setting goals • Making healthy decisions • Resisting pressure to use alcohol and drugs

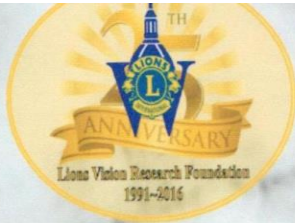
Lions Quest programs: • Provide high-quality, research-based classroom resources for teachers and age-appropriate learning material for students • Present opportunities for students to learn and practice skills that build and enhance positive relationships • Involve the family and community in supporting the healthy development of young people

Skills for Growing through a series of thematic teaching units, Skills for Growing will help create a classroom environment that nurtures and enhances learning. This primary school program contains thematic units designed to teach young learners how to make positive decisions and maintain positive self-esteem. Skills for Adolescence The most widely used of the three Lions Quest programs worldwide, Skills for Adolescence helps middle school youth, parents and teachers cope with the physical, emotional and social challenges of the early adolescent years. The program builds important competencies by promoting positive social attitudes, respect and responsibility, while serving as a strong prevention tool – guiding young people toward healthy choices and a drug and violence-free lifestyle. Skills for Action A unique secondary school (high school) curriculum, Skills for Action combines the development of personal, social and thinking skills with service-learning to help young people improve self-confidence and build resilience, maintain connectedness to school, engage in real-life issues and learn 21st century workplace skills. The flexible design of the program provides a valuable curriculum in a broad range of settings.

Worldwide Impact Educators from more than 50 countries have been trained to implement Lions Quest, making it one of the most widely-used life skills programs in the world. *To date:* • *More than 420,000 educators have been certified worldwide* • *Materials have been translated into 30 languages* • *Nearly 12 million young people have benefited from Lions Quest programs*

Teacher Training and Professional Development in order to ensure the quality of the program, all educators must complete a Lions Quest training workshop before they can teach the curricula. Only Lions Quest certified teachers can obtain program materials. In some countries, certified teachers are eligible for professional development credit or other recognition. An individual school, a Lions club or district, or a government entity can sponsor a Lions Quest workshop
