Currently our first and second vice district governors, Lions Jackie Kurley and Steve Weld are both Zone Chairs - Zones R2-Z1, and R3-Z3 respectively. Expect their visits and we would encourage them to visit other clubs as well. In fact, all Zone Chairs are expected to visit their assigned clubs at least twice a year. Welcome them as one of your own.

Remember we're not there to get into your business, rather to applaud you for your business, SERVICE to YOUR COMMUNITY. It's YOUR CLUB, YOUR WAY.

That leads me to my next point, State Projects. I would like to strongly encourage every Club to support our state projects financially. You know, Cancer Control, Indiana Lions Eye Bank, Leader Dog, Speech and Hearing, Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, and our own Indiana Lions Foundation. Not only that, I would encourage each Club to reach out to one of the trustees and have them give a program to your club. Get to know what you are supporting. Don't know who they are or how to reach them? Not to worry. PDG Paul Russell our newsletter editor, has them all listed for you. Keep reading and you will find them. Programs like that drive home the point that not only do we Lions support our own communities, we also support causes that better the lives of many we will never know. SERVICE to others for a better world for all.

This leads me to another revelation from the Council meeting and this is a BIG ONE! Any Lion Member can report service in the new portal. Say it isn't so, right ... well I came home and yesterday, Monday, I thought I would give it a try. (I have no idea if District Governors could report service before or not) I decided to report the fact that 1st Vice District Governor Jackie Kurley and I attended the Council meeting. I watched the "how to" video on service reporting and then set about entering the data. As far as I can tell, it was reported. Great job District Governor, I pat myself on my back. Now you can too. I think about those in my own club that volunteer their time at our local food pantry. I don't believe that was getting reported. Now any one can and should do it. The same with eyeglass collection. If your club has a member responsible for collecting eyeglasses, now they can report their work. You know it is a "signature" activity. Do you have a member who volunteers at the hospital or nursing home? Report it! The fact that now any member of your club can report service there should be no reason that we as District 25G can't have 100% reporting service. Don't feel comfortable with the new portal? Reach out and ask for assistance. As I have said in the past, I am not the District Governor, I am YOUR District Governor. My service is to you and your club. We as District Leaders will assist you however we can.

I'm going to end on this note, membership. I imagine that your eyes have already glazed over and you think you're done reading. STOP, we're going to talk about SERVICE, something exciting and motivating. Remember, the motto this year is Cooking up Service, Back to the Basics. Again, at the Council meeting we heard from Past International Director Robert "Bob" Block, our Area Leader for the Global Action Team. His message was simple. We need membership growth. In order to achieve that, we must publicize the SERVICE we Lions do in our communities and the world. Individuals will want to join Lions when they know there is something exciting and interesting for them to DO, an ACTIVITY—SERVICE.

A Message From 1st Vice District Governor Jackie Kurley



Hello fellow Lions,

August will prove to be a busy month for us all. But what I want to talk about this month is communication. We need better communication to be more effective. So, I am committed to giving you information I receive that I believe is important for Lions to know. I attended a council meeting in July, and the following was discussed at that meeting.

First, Mission 1.5 is a focus. We had a mini training class on where we were, where we are now, and where we need to be to provide service for our communities. The goal for Mission 1.5 is to have that number of members to serve 1 billion people across the world.

The negative to declining membership is 10 years ago the United States had 17 of the 35 International Directors for the Lions. This year we have 11 Directors, and we may

lose 2 more if membership continues to decline. It is obviously beneficial for us to have as many Directors as possible. The DGs, GATs, and GETs will be attending a "Hop on Board" training session in early August to learn the "Trail to Success" for Mission 1.5.

There was a motion to approve a marker that was made in honor of Past International President Wayne Madden that will go up in the Auburn, IN area. We will notify the clubs when the actual ceremony takes place. We then talked about the importance of making sure clubs get a visit from each of the State Projects.

Are your members really informed as to what each project represents and how they function? This is one of the easiest ways to set up programs for your club meetings.

Next on the agenda was how to promote your club. As you know, the Hoosier Lion is now digital with some issues also in print. The way to promote your club is to write an article about yourselves and send it to our media chairperson or directly to Stu Clampett, the editor of the Hoosier Lion.

If you are doing anything for the Special Olympics, please let the District Chair know. Every district has something that is scheduled for those Olympics, make sure you tell your story. Ask your District chair to do a program for your club.

Did you know that children as young as 24 months (2 years) can be screened for eye problems? Since sight is one of our major projects have you thought about a community screening program. You can inquire about having one at the library or even your community building. What a wonderful way to get people to see what Lions are about. Also, think about setting up tables at fairs and local gatherings.

In 2023-2024, Leader Dog provided training to 180 clients in homes and on campus. Within the next two years, Leader Dog will initiate a new major fund-raising project to update the residences of the animals which are now over 20 years old.

Information and technology reported that topics for their July meeting will include the portal. A reminder to the club secretaries that the MMR is no longer required.

Congratulations to Area C (Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois, and Michigan) Lions. Lions Clubs International Foundation reported that we exceeded our goal for last year. Not only our goal but Chairperson Brian Sheehan's stretch goal. Now that every club has an LCIF coordinator more fun can be had by all. Especially my very own Dunlap Lions Club will have a lot of "Funraising".

I hope you will find this information helpful in understanding why the leaders of your district make the decisions we make. If you would ever like to attend a district or Multiple District meeting, please know that those doors are always open, and we encourage you to come to meetings.

A Message From District Cabinet Treasurer PDG Ron Guth



Greetings fellow Lions of District 25-G,

We are all busy with the many events that occur during the summer and early fall to promote Lionism and the fund-raising efforts to support those activities. This month I would like to offer a little information about the commonly known state projects. Most of us know them as the "five" projects, but in reality, we have six or more state/district level projects that could use support from our district clubs.

Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana: This program has helped countless Hoosiers over the years and is currently looking for donations to put toward matching funds to support the research and treatment of pediatric cancer.

Vision First Indiana Lions Eye Bank: The Eye Bank has processed over 50,000 corneas for Hoosiers and other patients in the USA and foreign countries. Our club donations help support the KidSight program and the Surgical Assistance program.

Leader Dogs for the Blind: I'm sure most of us know some of what this program does to help the visually impaired. This program supplies its clients with guide dogs and training at no cost to the patient. They also provide Orientation and Mobility training for first time and current white cane users. Did you know they also have a Summer Experience Camp for legally blind 16 and 17 years olds to teach them skills and provide them with personal GPS units? Your donations go to the program in Rochester Hills, Michigan, unless you specify that the funds remain in Indiana.

Indiana Lions Speech & Hearing: "Working for a sound quality of life". This project supports programs offered at the Indiana School for the Deaf, colleges and universities for the speech and hearing impaired, and also provides hearing aid assistance for Indiana Hoosiers.

Indiana Lions for the ISBVI: This project helps to support the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired. The school is undergoing massive renovations and construction over the next several years to allow the Indiana School for the Deaf to share the same campus. Donations are used to help the school cope with continuing the education of our visually challenged Hoosier students.

Indiana Lions Foundation: The foundation offers matching grants of up to \$1,000 per year for any club to support the community. The State Fair fund raiser is an important source of monies and needs your support by working a gate, but they also welcome club donations.

Diabetes: Our District has a Diabetes fund that we use to support a camp in our district and the state has a Diabetes committee that funds state wide projects. If your club wants to donate something for Diabetes, I will keep the monies in our district fund, or if specified, I will forward the monies to the state level.

Special Olympics: The state has a Special Olympics committee that collects and donates funds to the Special Olympics summer and winter programs. If your club would like to donate funds for Special Olympics I will collect it at district level, then forward it to the State Comptroller for use by the committee.

District 25-G Eyeglass Recycling Program: Our district has an excellent eyeglass recycling program that collects, processes, and distributes them in Mexico during annual mission trips. They need your support as well to continue the great work to help others in need.

Now the easy part: When your club decides to make a donation to any of the above projects just write one check made out to District 25-G and attach a short note saying how much should be given and to which projects. I will combine your donation with those from other clubs sent in the same time period and write checks to the respective projects along with a letter telling them where the monies came from, so your club gets credit.

What is not listed above and is not done at district level is donations to LCIF. Your club should send all LCIF donations directly to LCIF along with a completed Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) form indicating where the funds should be used. You can send in smaller amounts and just add to your credit and when the total reaches \$1,000 you can give them the information needed for the recipient.

All of your club treasurers should have received notice of your dues invoice from LCI, unless your club didn't report officers to LCI before July 1st. If you don't have an invoice/statement, please contact me and I will help you access it or send a copy to you. District dues invoices were sent on 7/13/24 to all clubs with half of the clubs already having paid them by 7/25/24. **Thank you!**

Now, get back to work on those projects and we will be ready for that club check when it comes.

The crowds have descended on Paris. On Friday, July 26, the 2024 Olympics officially began. Over 10,000 athletes gathered to participate in at least 32 sports, some new, some old, probably many never conceived of by the early Greek Olympians. The Olympics will end on August 11th after seemingly endless rounds of events, most covered by high-powered broadcasters and deeppocketed corporate sponsors. For the athletes, it has to be a highlight in their lives. For fans, it may seem like this will never be finished, even if slightly tarnished by athletes and staff asked to leave

But whether you like the Olympics or not, it is a wonderful example of diverse people coming together for a few days for a common goal: the elusive gold medal. It's the culmination of years of practice and competition. It's too bad that lesser events, for which athletes get little or no recognition, go unnoticed. One summer example would be the plethora of 4-H Fairs around the state. Who can tell me even one of the prize winners' names? Another recent example would be the Hoosier Summer Classic Dog Show at the St. Joseph County 4-H Fairgrounds. Over 700 beautiful dogs plus their handlers gathered to celebrate canine nobility with (people) food served by the Lakeville Lions Club. It was a great 4-day event, but almost completely unremarked by local or national media.

How many times did you think about Lions while reading the two paragraphs above? We too are a wonderfully diverse group of people who gather periodically for non-competitive meetings, whether it's an International Convention, the MD-25 Convention, a District Meeting, or a Zone Meeting. August alone brings to District 25-G a District Meeting and a Banner Night. Both offer the opportunity to get re-acquainted with fellow Lions; to gather information from the District Governor; and to meet new Lions and friends; and to share successes. Such meetings give us the opportunity to decide how and plan how our Clubs can improve themselves and contribute to the greater good.



2025 State Convention News

The 104th State Convention will be held at the Farmstead Inn in Shipshewana, April 25-27, 2025. As many of you may recall, the Convention of 2016 was also in Shipshewana and was deemed a huge success. Shipshewana is the home of many attractions including shops, auction houses, entertainment venues, and restaurants, and is steeped in the culture of the Amish people.

The 104th State Convention will be hosted by District 25-G, and co-chaired by PDG Marlyn Fast and PDG Brian Thomas. To date, we have secured the Farmstead Inn as the headquarters hotel for the weekend, a venue for an invited Thursday evening dinner, a host club for a Friday evening dinner, a caterer for a buffet style Saturday lunch, and an Amish family-owned caterer for the Saturday evening banquet featuring special guest Past International President Jimmy Ross.

Facilities at the Farmstead Inn will be the hotel itself with a large expo barn steps away for eating, display space, and seminar space. Room rates will be in the \$125 to \$150 range, while convention registration will be between \$75 and \$100 depending on the activities you choose. Registration forms and room reservations will be available December 1, 2024

The committee is working on a list of suggested Saturday luncheon speakers and suggested topics for seminars. If you have ideas for either, please relay the information to PDG Marlyn or PDG Brian. We are in the early stages of producing an official program book which can include ad space for your club or district to highlight special events or projects. We are working diligently to make this a special State Convention and hope to see you in Northern Indiana in April 2025.

Dunlap Lions Club helps out the Lakeville lions club at the St Joseph County fair. It was definitely a hot couple of days!!











Indiana Lions Foundation Community Service Grants A New Way to Use W.P. Woods Fellowship Credits

The trustees of the Indiana Lions Foundation (Foundation) have approved an additional way to use W.P. Woods Fellowship credits earned by working for the Foundation at the Indiana State Fair. As in the past, individuals may use their credits for a W.P. Woods Fellowship for themselves or another individual, or may transfer their credits to their club or district to be used for a W.P. Woods Fellowship.

Effective immediately, W.P. Woods Fellowship credits may also be redeemed for Indiana Lions Foundation Community Service Grants. An individual or club may redeem 10 W.P. Woods Fellowship credits for a \$200 Community Service Grant. The grant may be directed to the member's home club, one of our five Indiana Lions state projects, the Indiana Lions Foundation, or the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). The check from the Foundation will be made out to the designated beneficiary and sent to the requesting individual. The individual may then present the check to their club or a trustee of one of the five state projects, or they may simply mail the check to their designated state project or LCIF, as appropriate. If the grant is given to a club, it must be placed in the club's public funds account and used for Community Service projects, not for the club's administrative expenses, such as dues. A club that has W.P. Woods Fellowship credits which were transferred to it by individual members may use these credits in the same manner. A person or club may redeem only 10 credits (one \$200 grant) per year. A club, state project, the Foundation, or LCIF may receive more than one Community Service Grant per year, if the grants are requested by different individuals or clubs. We acknowledge that there will be many questions about this new opportunity to serve our communities and the trustees will be working on a more detailed Community Service Grant policy document in the weeks following the upcoming State Fair.

INDIANAPOLIS – Governor Eric J. Holcomb and the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired (ISBVI) today announced James R. Michaels will serve as the next superintendent. The school's current superintendent, James Durst, announced his retirement earlier this year. Michaels will enter the role with over 35 years of serving Hoosier youth and adults with disabilities.

"James Michaels has spent his life in service to Hoosiers with disabilities," said Gov. Holcomb. "I know James will bring that dedication along with his decades of experience providing and leading human services to the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired."

Michaels is an alumnus, former employee and former board member of ISBVI. Since 1998, Michaels has served in education, counseling and leadership positions, including VP of Programs, at Bosma Enterprises, an Indianapolis nonprofit providing employment, rehabilitation and job training for people who are blind or visually impaired. Earlier in his career, Michaels held multiple student-serving roles at the Indiana School for the Deaf.

"I am so grateful to have the opportunity to return to the school that made such a difference in my life. As a former student and employee of the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired, I have witnessed first-hand the life changing impact the school has on the students, parents, staff, and the community at-large," said Michaels. "I am excited to have the opportunity to work side by side with the amazing ISBVI staff to continue to support, encourage, and educate the student-body. The message the students will hear from me over and over again is, 'I believe in you."

Michaels completed his undergraduate and graduate degrees at Indiana University. He resides in Brownsburg with his wife, Connie; they have a son, Jesse, currently attending college.

As one of the largest state schools in the nation serving students who are blind or have low vision, IBSVI enrolls 110 students spanning preschool through high school, approximately 40 of whom are residential, as well as directly serving over 300 students across 46 school districts. Established in 1847, the school also offers a wide array of other programming aligned to its statutory mission of serving Hoosier students with visual disabilities.
