A Message From 2nd Vice District Governor Steve Weld



Our district has given great support to the Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) over the past several years, due both to the enthusiastic promotion by our LCIF coordinator, 1VDG Jackie Kurley, and to your bighearted generosity, with so many Lions and Clubs in our district donating selflessly and with great kindness.

Even as you may recognize the many ways LCIF, "our foundation for service through grants and programs", serves communities across the nation and around the world, have you ever considered how an LCIF grant might be able to transform the ways your Lions Club can serve your own community? Has your club been thinking about a project which could greatly benefit your community, if only you had more finances available? Grants are intended to provide the additional resources which may be needed to

accomplish an effort, leveraging locally available resources for larger impact. LCIF grants are offered in a variety of flavors, though each category has both common and unique rules. All have a clear intent for using funds to meet humanitarian needs, with particular rules for how the funds can or cannot be used. Most have a requirement for matching funds, that is, local clubs have to provide some portion of the total project funds.

Four categories of grants are directly tied to four of the Association's long-standing Global Causes: Vision, Diabetes, Hunger, and Childhood Cancer. Each of these grants enable local Lions Clubs to invest in solutions for local needs, ideally in partnership with other local organizations meeting those needs and serving the community.

A number of grants are available to address the Foundation's Global Cause of Disaster Relief. Beyond the large grants awarded by the international president and LCIF chair for Major Catastrophes, grants for emergency assistance, disaster preparedness, and community recovery are available to local Clubs.

For the Global Cause of Youth, Leo Service Grants enable our Leos to assess, plan, and implement their own service projects. Additionally, Lions Quest Grants aid the implementation and expansion of Lions Quest, our Association's premier social-emotional learning program for youth.

If a project to address local needs does not fit into one of the Global Causes aligned grant programs, then it may be possible to obtain a Matching Grant. Similar in structure and requirements as other grants, this can be used to provide equipment and construction for almost any humanitarian need.

Finally, District & Club Community Impact Grant (DCG) enables Clubs to fund local projects with up to 15 percent of their past LCIF contributions. Unique among the grants, this one not only does not require matching funds, but can be used as a local match for another LCIF grant.

The Family Membership Program provides families the opportunity to receive a special dues discount when they join a Lions club together. The first family member pays the full international dues and up to four additional family members pay only half the international dues. When you enter these members into the portal there is an option to waive the discount and the club will then be charged the full amount. If you want the family member discount, do not click the box to waive the discount and just click the next button. See the graphic below. If you have questions, please contact me.

Leading By Learning

First you thought you were done learning when you got your high school diploma. Then it might have been your college degree or some work-related education. Lions International seemed like a great organization to join without a lot of pressure. But now something new has entered the picture.

If you attended the recent District Meeting, you heard that Lions International would now like to keep track of your Lions educational achievements. First of all, for us, Lions wants District 25-G to submit the names of faculty and attendees at our Spring officers training sessions. After that, in my opinion,

it gets a little murky. I'm not sure there is a requirement to list the officers who didn't attend, but the ultimate goal is to encourage all District officers to make use of some Lions educational opportunities, whether working alone through courses, going to classes, or attending other activities, like Mid-Winter Conference. The options seem endless.

All these learning activities will then be entered into the new Lions portal. It's not exactly clear who will be doing all that entering, how far back you may go in listing activities (for instance, having attended officers training for the past 10 years), or if this all begins with just this Club year. There are lots of unanswered questions, and as we find out more information, we'll do our best to keep you up to date. In the meantime, start compiling your own list of educational opportunities completed, then look for additional opportunities. I do think, however, that Lions is looking for more significant learning experiences than learning how not to burn your fingers at a fish fry.

A great place to begin is the Lions International website itself (www.lionsclubs.org). It is reasonably simple to use, and often you can find more than you wanted. When you have the chance, open the site and do some exploring. When the website opens, you will see two options. The first is the magnifying glass in the upper right corner. Clicking on that icon takes you to a page with a category marked "Member Resource Center". This lists several options including one called "Training." Clicking on that brings you to a page with more options, including the category "Leadership Training". Then choose the topic you want.


This should lead you to the Lions Learning Center. Follow the directions there to access the Center. But if all this sounds confusing, go back to the first page with the magnifying glass and click on the icon. A page featuring a long line will appear. You can simply key in the term you want to search, like Club President, then click on Search. For Club President, you will get 624 items, although probably 623 of them are not what you wanted. Another choice brings you to the e-books directed at any one of eight Club officers. Nicely compact, these should answer your basic questions or suggest further items for you to search, but I'm hoping you all know more about this than I do through your own experiences.

This new initiative does not appear to be a race for credits or some basis of qualification for office or another pin to wear. In my opinion, this whole process can be used to show other organizations that we take ourselves seriously and are working to improve the organization. I see it as much like recording service hours and projects. It may also show Lions International where there are training gaps that should be addressed to make us more efficient and effective. Now we just have to get started. Let's help build the organization in a positive manner.

Opportunities for Service

Lions Quest Keeps Growing in Indiana!

New programs:

Lions Quest (LQ) is expanding from last year's successful programs in Clinton and Carroll Counties! Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Greater Lafayette, SURF Center, and Lafayette Lions are partnering to support a community LQ program for at-risk youth in Tippecanoe County. "Bigs" is implementing a national level program called Big Futures, and LQ will be a component of their Lafayette rollout.

This community model can be duplicated to include other Big Brothers/Big Sisters affiliates, youth organizations, juvenile court programs, and other interested parties. As happened in Carroll County, a successful LQ program in the community can then be adopted in schools with less friction. See lionsquest.org for more program information.

SURF Center hosts and coordinates all the area twelve-step process addiction programs, as well as Primary Prevention programs for reducing initial substance abuse, suicide, and other process addictions. LQ will be made available to interested groups like Ala-Teen, Al-Anon, and other family recovery support groups.

With support from LCIF and local funding, establishing the standard county-wide five-year license will allow us to expand the program to other area groups, schools, and agencies on demand. Another major agency participant is expected to join the Tippecanoe County effort.

Grants Are Available!

An LCIF Community Development Grant of \$15,000 and a Promotional Grant for \$1,500 are being prepared for submission by November 22. The development grant will pay for the County Community Program, while the Promo grant will be used for Lions Quest Open Houses, booth supplies, and other promotional efforts to bring LQ into new areas. These grants are avialble to all districts and do not conflict with other LCIF grant opportunities.

New Outreach

LQ is being informally presented to school principals and counselors as an add-in to Lions Vision Services acuity screenings. While we are already in the schools, why not make them aware of Lions Quest, develop contact information, and prepare for follow-up? This is also a great contact opportunity for preschool KidSight screenings. Seven school districts have been approached in this way and four have requested further information for 2025.

Discussions on LQ are continuing with the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI), Indiana University School of Public Health, and the Indiana Supreme Court. Meetings with all of these groups are pending. ICJI Behavioral Science and Youth divisions are big fans of LQ. Their positive opinions are acting as a Center of Influence for other State level organizations and is opening additional doors.


