

Building Your Club/Team-Part 2



When I wrote the first instalment of this article, I wondered if I would hear from any Lions about my comments. I heard nothing. But I still do wonder what it takes to install the team concept for our Lions Clubs, either an individual Club or Clubs in general. What do we need to do to keep our Clubs successfully working together?

I suggested three things. First, remember that the Club is not the Club President's property. Second, regular communications are a must, and third, finding and using Club members' talents adds to the Club's abilities to serve.

In addition to these three major components of team building, I'd like to suggest a few more that will help ensure success.

First, have a vision and share that vision. It does no good if I know what I want to accomplish but don't share that with anyone else or explain why they need to participate. If I said we want to raise \$10,000 in eight months but don't share "why" or "how", should I really be surprised if there is some pushback. That could range from "we'll never be able to do that" to "I'll bet we could really raise \$12,000, if we tweaked this just a little". Allowing input to your vision could possibly lead to more growth than originally anticipated.


Second, word your goals so that each not only contains a challenge, but it also appeals to personal pride. Who doesn't like a challenge? Who doesn't want to be the best? Who doesn't want some bragging rights? We aren't kids anymore, but some recognition for selling the most pork chop tickets or bringing in the most pounds of used hearing aids isn't all bad.

And third, our expectations need to be realistic. How many hours should each member expect to spend on this project? Don't leave the impression that a few old guys working a few hours can raise that \$10,000 alone. If we really think that it's going to take a lot of time for each member, be honest and say so. No one likes the rules changed partway through a project.

Are you starting to see a pattern here? Yes, we want a successful team, and a large part of that success is getting our team members to buy into our goals. Everybody counts, all year long. In a silly way, it's like Smokey the Bear says, "Only you can prevent forest fires", except that here we are thinking that "Only you can prevent Club member loss". Remember, you can lose a member without having an actual resignation.

LCIF Coordinators Update

Lions Clubs International Foundation Helping a World in Need

LCIF MISSION: To empower Lions Clubs, volunteers, and partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian services and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding.

An update for the calendar year 2023 is: 166 Grants were given for \$3,562,272. This was for 39 states, Jamaica and Puerto-Rico. The state of Indiana applied for four grants totaling \$172,000. This certainly proves that a Lions' share of LCIF funds stay locally.

We are all accountable for achieving District 25-G's 2023-2024 goal of \$31,374. To date, only 19% has been received, leaving a large portion to be received the last six months. Have your club or club members donated to LCIF this Lion Year?

I encourage clubs to come up with ideas for generating giving to LCIF. A recent fundraiser at my home club came up with a new idea that was quite successful. We used a blank calendar month to encourage our giving. Each Lion was asked to put their signature on a date of the month which corresponded with the amount they wanted to give. For example, I signed on the 5th and the 20th since I wanted to give \$25.00. (Our club is larger, so we actually used two months.) Our goal was to fill the calendar with signatures. We then collected the money for LCIF, noting the member's name and amount. The fundraiser was successful in that we collected over \$1500.00. This was sent to LCIF with the donors' names, membership numbers, and amounts donated.

I am sure each club can come up with other fundraiser ideas. The important thing is that members get credit for each donation.

Individual and club donations are very much needed and appreciated!




