A Message From 1st Vice District Governor Warren Allender



Can you say, I can't believe it's June already. That means a couple of things: a new Lions year is just around the corner, and this year is quickly wrapping up. With that in mind, I again need to acknowledge District Governor Ron for his leadership and friendship this past year. We have been Lions in Action. Each club is doing what we are chartered to do: Serve our communities.

It is sort of strange writing these articles, as you never know exactly what others will be writing about. Will yours be a duplication and be irrelevant? You just don't know. With that thought in mind and with community service in mind, I need to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to the Elkhart Lions. For what, you may ask? Can you say "community service for over 100 years!"? Elkhart Lions celebrated that occasion on May 16th and 17th. Thursday, May 16th was the

unveiling of their bronze 400-pound plus Lion statute created by master sculptor, Andrew Owens. This Lion is now prominently situated downtown outside of the Midwest Museum of American Art. Friday, May 17th, was their Centennial Celebration. It included a wonderful dinner, comments from District Governor Ron, and fabulous entertainment provided by singers from the Elkhart Civic Theater. Yet, for me, perhaps the most amazing thing was simply the comradery and history shared. Susi and I had the privilege of sitting with long time Lion Phil Lux, his wife, and long time Lion PDG Glenn Holtz and his wife. Lion Phil, a 77-year member shared many memories of his years as an Elkhart Lion. He shared how they were at one time the fourth largest Lions club in the world, and they had a "cap" on their membership at 175, with an active waiting list. He also told the story about Elkhart Lions hosting the State Convention in 1941. The keynote speaker for the convention was Admiral Richard Byrd, the famous explorer, he too a Lion. Upon hearing these fabulous tales, I couldn't wait to get over to the display tables. Sure enough, in their scrap book, back in 1941, there was a photo of Admiral Byrd with the President of the Elkhart Lion, Dr. H.C. Higgason, and other Lions. In another document, like minutes from the Convention, it was noted, "this program was held in the evening at Rice Field. It was very cold for June, everybody wore topcoats. Byrd was dressed in a white Navy uniform and said he was colder than he ever was at the South Pole." What a wonderful record of Lionism. From all of that, I have made a couple of observations. Number one, PDG Marlyn Fast and PDG Brian Thomas, the cochairs for the upcoming Lions State Convention in Shipshewana next April, have their work cut out for them. Clearly a speaker of similar caliber and character would be appropriate since District 25-G is hosting the convention. Number two, I noted that there seems to be less and less recorded and published since the advent of the digital age. I'm guilty of that myself, over six thousand photos it says on my photo file, yet very few, if any, have I printed to be shared later in life. I'm not sure how that might be remedied, perhaps an annual yearbook of your Lions Club's activities using Snapfish or something similar. I think it would be worth it.

OK, just one more thought about the upcoming year and what you might expect from YOUR District Governor. Here it is: There are 44 clubs in District 25-G, and there are 52 weeks in a year. I have a goal of visiting every club at least once during the Lions year. In order to get that accomplished, please give me a call and get me on **your** schedule. If you don't call me, you can expect me to call you. Many of you know I'm retired from the Sheriff's Department and we had a saying it goes like this: "bookem". I plan on doing just that with your help.

The Last Could Be Best



One of my newer hobbies is attending draft horse auctions, even though I seldom buy anything bigger than a jelly-filled donut. And living in this area, I've eaten quite a few jelly-filled donuts. It is exciting to see draft horses trotting up and down in cadence with the auctioneer as the price goes higher and higher. It's like the horses know. There's a catalog of horses being put through the ring, but at every auction there are "uncatalogued" horses at the end, horses whose owners

decided to sell them after the catalog deadline had passed or who weren't deemed just ready for sale then.

Sometimes the best (and highest selling) horses come from this group of "uncatalogued" horses. It's like finding the traditional diamond in the rough. And it is in some ways mysterious to see these horses lined up behind the auctioneer's booth with no published information about them, looking just as shiny and capable as the catalogued horses, but no owner's notes or name, no genealogy, no statement on why that horse is for sale. So many questions. Does the horse have defects or bad habits? How much training has it had, or what are its strengths?

Draft horse auctions remind me of Lions Clubs sometimes, especially during this season when new officers are elected and preparing to take over. Most of us probably prefer our officers "catalogued", the old reliables about whom we know a lot. We know their capabilities, what offices they might already have held, and what their personal Lions history is. And in some cases, who their parents are, how long they have lived in town, and where their kids go to school.

The problem is that we also have "uncatalogued" Lions in our Club, the new Lions, the shy Lions, the ones who might have to miss multiple meetings for various reasons. These Lions may be the ones who have turned down inquiries to become officers or committee chairs enough times that the Club has stopped asking, enough times that a current officer gets re-elected to the same job for the umpteenth time.

So what can we do to change the "uncatalogued" to "catalogued"? It could be just simple things like having conversations, finding out their stories and interests in Lions, then allowing them to share those interests. Make sure they know they are more than members, they are Lions. Make it your task to see they get introduced to the whole Club. All of this takes time.

Then see if they would like to take on a committee assignment or an officer's chair. Suggest something specific they can do. Who knows where this could lead? But pushing a new Lion may not be all that profitable.

Only you and the other Club members can determine how far and how quickly this transition can be made. It may take time, or it may happen quickly. But as I wrote at the beginning, sometimes the "uncatalogued" horses can become the gems of the sale. And sometimes the "uncatalogued" Lions can become the gems of the Club. Let's go mining.

Elkhart Lions Celebrate A Century of Service

On Friday, May 17th, more than 55 Elkhart Lions Club members and guests celebrated the club's 100th anniversary. The club organized and held its first meeting in December, 1923, and received its charter from Lions Clubs International in April, 1924. At the dinner, hosted by local celebrity Alan Strike, the sculptor of a life-size bronze lion, Andrew Owens, spoke about the project from conceptual drawings to the final casting of the statue. City Council member Arvis Dawson, representing the City of Elkhart, accepted the statue on behalf of the city.

In 2023 the Elkhart Lions Club voted to gift a statue of a lion to commemorate its 100th anniversary, celebrating its long history of public service in the Elkhart community. A life-size, 4' x 6' bronze replica of a lion was scheduled to be given to the City of Elkhart in April, 2024, culminating a several month fund-raising effort for the lion. The placement of the lion was made at the entrance of the Curtis Parking Lot, next to the Midwest Museum

of American Art, on South Main Street in downtown Elkhart. The sculpture was created by designer and sculptor, Andrew Owens, who was born and raised in Elkhart. Following the presentation, the activities continued inside the Midwest Museum of American Art with a reception and time for attendees to meet the artist. About 75 individuals attended the artist reception, where artist Andrew Owens was welcomed and spoke about the statue.

What will happen to the current ISBVI campus buildings?

After graduation, the contents of existing buildings will be removed to Indianapolis Public Schools #83 and #94. These schools are 20 minutes east of the ISBVI campus. Bulldozing will begin in late summer. The tower and wings will remain and be renovated. The auditorium has already been renovated. The pool and its building will be renovated.

There will be no auction of contents left behind.
