I wondered what brought these folks out in the chilly air to wade through the soggy grass so early on a weekday morning. They didn't look like highway department people. They didn't look like work release people. They weren't in any kind of uniforms that I could see. Were they volunteers from a church, a business, or a club like Lions? And I didn't see anyone giving orders. They were all working together.

I admit that I admired them. They were willing to get up early, get cold, get wet, just to clean along a highway, to clean up after a winter's worth of thoughtless motorists. I'm only aware of the Etna Green Lions Club doing that same job. But admittedly, Lions spend countless hours screening children's eyesight, building ramps, working in food pantries, passing out dictionaries, and doing countless other projects that are largely invisible but equally vital.

So, here's my challenge. We have just elected our new Club leadership for the coming year. These new leaders are busy preparing for their duties ahead. But let's not forget to challenge our new leaders that they lead the entire Club, not just other officeholders, committee chairs, or their "best buddies". True leaders are all-inclusive.



Elkhart & Dunlap Lions Clubs Team Up for Flags from the Heart

On Memorial Day weekend, the 18th annual **Flags from the Heart** display will be flown in Lundquist-Bicentennial Park in Elkhart. The flags will fly from noon on **May 25** until 4:00 p.m., **May 27**. Memorial Day, or as it was originally named, Decoration Day, is observed on the last Monday in May. It originally began as a way of honoring U.S. military personnel who died while serving in the U.S. Armed Forces.

By participating in the **Flags from the Heart** display, presented jointly by the Elkhart Lions Club and Dunlap Lions Club, you may honor a member of the military, living or deceased, a loved family member, living or deceased, a friend, or a group by dedicating a flag to them. You determine the wording of the dedication. The flag is yours to keep after the weekend and may be taken home to be flown or it may be stored by the Lions to be flown the next year. The **first year**, a new American-made 3'x5' flag costs **\$35** to fly. To fly your flag in **subsequent years** costs **\$20** per flag **each year**. If you wish to take your flag home, please pick it up beginning at **3:00 p.m., May 27**, at the display. You may wish to fly more than one flag. If so, please complete one application form for **each flag flown**.






Indiana Lions Fighting Cancer!

On behalf of the Lions of Indiana, trustees for the Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana, Inc. presented checks totaling \$125,000 to Riley Children's Foundation at the Indiana Lions State Convention in Noblesville on Saturday, April 27th.

The \$25,000 donation is part of a 3-year, \$25,000/year commitment to provide funding for research to address severe neuropathy experienced by pediatric cancer patients undergoing chemotherapy.

The \$100,000 donation will be matched, dollar for dollar, by the Walther Cancer Foundation, resulting in \$200,000 for pediatric cancer research.

The Walther Cancer Foundation has pledged 10 million dollars to match donations of \$100,000 or more from individuals and organizations who make a commitment to Riley Children's Foundation and fulfill that commitment by 2027. We are the first donor to complete our \$100,000 pledge, and we intend to pledge an additional \$100,000. We will need your help to fulfill that commitment.

Major Changes to ISBVI Campus Beginning This Summer

You may already know that the State of Indiana intends to move the Indiana School for the Deaf to the current campus of the Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired. Most of the existing buildings on the ISBVI campus will be torn down and new buildings will be erected for each school. This is a multi-year project which will begin in earnest this summer.

What will happen to the current ISBVI campus buildings?

After graduation, the contents of existing buildings will be removed to Indianapolis Public Schools #83 and #94. These schools are 20 minutes east of the ISBVI campus. Bulldozing will begin in late summer. The tower and wings will remain and be renovated. The auditorium has already been renovated. The pool and its building will be renovated.

There will be no auction of contents left behind.


