The Global Causes—eight areas of service to which our Association and Foundation give particular care and attention (Diabetes, Environment, Hunger Relief, Pediatric Cancer, Vision, Disaster

However, a Club's top concern should be local needs, so developing a solid understanding of the issues of real concern to the members of the community. Identifying local opportunities for service may require some work, but that learning can position a Club to be highly effective.

DISCOVER: The next step is allowing what was learned in the first step to help guide discovering the service opportunities which surround the Club. Additionally, this is the chance to build partnerships with other agencies, organizations, and individuals engaged with serving, identify available resources, innovate , and develop a refined focus on what, where, how, and why to serve.

ACT: The third step is the chance to marshal all the energy and zeal in which we take so much pride as Lions, and channel it into efforts to make a real difference in the lives of real people. The Association offers advice on selecting and executing service projects which are visible, measurable, and practical with a variety of Service Project Planners, which are available at https:// www.lionsclubs.org/en/start-our-approach/service-journey/service-project-planners.

CELEBRATE: Finally, a successful service project -- or even an unsuccessful project which offered learning and growth -- deserves a moment for sharing our stories with each other and with our community. Take this opportunity to analyze and report impact, reflect on ways to inspire continued service, and strengthen our capacity, motivation, and abilities to serve,

The steps of the Service Journey are not details of a recipe which must be followed exactly or that guarantee success, but are notes, ideas, and recommendations offered by fellow travelers, offered with the hope of enabling others to succeed. As stated in one of the recommendations, "Service is our Journey. Let's explore it together."

LEADING FROM BEHIND

I think it's time to let little Molly scrouge for hay in peace for a while. We still laugh at her. She has pawed a hole under the wooden divider between her and the next horse, and she works hard to drag bites of hay through that stall into her own. If you say something to her, she looks at you with those big innocent eyes as if to say "What? Who, me?" and gets back to hay mining. Whoever coined the phrase "dumb animals" obviously never owned one. And who was the first person who deluded themselves by thinking they "owned" a cat?

Similarly, we often delude ourselves by thinking someone is not a

good Club leader if they don't "take charge" of the Club. But we all have different leadership styles. Some like to dominate. Some like to build consensus. Some like to have the members make all the decisions, and some really don't want to be leaders at all. Club members have the same range of thought patterns.

Books upon books have been written about being a dominating-leader who really takes charge and isn't interested in sharing decision making. I'm going to ignore that type of leader here and concentrate on the other types of leaders. Consider that even if you never wanted to be a leader, you were elected to be a leader. Your Club believes in you and trusts that you can do the job, so it is important to do your best, regardless.

Delegation is an important tool for all leaders. Use it. Leadership has never meant that you must do all the work yourself. Nor does it mean that you can pass away all your duties except gaveling the meeting to order.

Leadership from behind means that you are confident enough in your Club that they are going to do the work you assigned or for which they volunteered. It also means that you are demonstrating your confidence and trust in them. Together you lead your Club or committee.

A few of you got an office despite not really wanting it. Please don't insult your Club by constantly complaining that you never wanted the job in the first place. That gets old in a hurry. And if you really aren't interested, then make good use of delegation. You are the shepherd and can keep the Club moving in the direction you want them to go without being out in front.

Some people are actually afraid of leadership roles. Try to figure out why. Perhaps the fear of public speaking? Perhaps the fear of having people staring at you? Afraid you'll make some silly error? All of us suffer from one or more of these fears, or something like them, at one time or another. But we can get over them if we try. There are the usual piles of books and articles suggesting how that can be done. Or pick a leader you admire and study their style. Just remember, you can be a leader.

You don't have to be a fire-breathing dominator. You can be a shepherd leader, keeping your Club members involved, happy, and creative.



LCIF Coordinators Update



LCIF Disaster Relief Support Update

Lions-

We are pleased to provide an additional update to LCIF's ongoing support following the impact of recent hurricanes in the southeastern United States.

FOUNDATION Between July 1, 2024 and October 14, 2024, LCIF awarded 147 grants globally totaling US\$2,828,653 under the cause of disaster relief. This includes refugee relief grants.

United States

Since September 27, LCIF has awarded 10 Emergency grants totaling \$150,000 for hurricane relief across Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and Tennessee. We are still working with Lions in additional districts that are assessing needs, and we anticipate additional grant funding will be awarded soon. Lions in these districts are using Emergency grants first, and then will assess if additional LCIF funding is needed.

In addition to these 10 Emergency grants, LCIF has also awarded 2 Major Catastrophe grants. Multiple District 35 (Florida) and Multiple District 31 (North Carolina) were each awarded Major Catastrophe grants for \$100,000 each. Lions are working to develop a plan to use these funds.

As of today, LCIF has awarded 12 grants totaling \$350,000 for US hurricane relief.

Donations to the general disaster fund help us award these grants immediately to Lions who are impacted by natural disasters. We anticipate additional funding requests will be received and awarded to help support Lions continue hurricane relief activities.

We deeply understand the extensive damage across these states and are in ongoing communication with Lions in affected areas. We're continually reviewing new requests from districts that may need further assistance. Our commitment to supporting relief efforts is unwavering, and we truly appreciate the dedication of Lions actively helping in these devastated communities. Your enthusiasm for sharing the impactful work of YOUR foundation is incredibly inspiring.

District eyeglass mission success

The district's eyeglass mission was held September 21-28 in Aguascalientes, Mexico. During the 5day event, Lions provided eyeglasses to nearly 2,100 individuals. A total of 20 Lions, 18 from Indiana, Utah, Ohio and Massachusetts, and 2 from Mexico, tested and fitted eyeglasses from the 14,500 pairs that were shipped a few months earlier for this project. Lions from District 25-G work throughout the year to collect, sort, clean, read prescriptions, box and otherwise prepare the glasses for shipping to the city where that year's mission will be held.

The daily routine at the mission begins at 8 am and usually ends around 6-6:30 pm. On Friday, in order to serve all those who came for glasses, workers had to use the flashlight app in their phones in order to see the glasses in the numerous boxes. The main room at the mission site had no operating ceiling lights!

Members from the *Club de leones Aguascalientes Hidrocalido, A.C.*, were abundant and always ready to help the mission group. The local club provided snacks and meals during the mission as well as numerous translators to assist Lions when discussing the various pairs of glasses that were found to match a person's prescription. The district's eyeglass mission was last held in Aguascalientes in 2019.

Next year, a similar mission will be held September 27—October 4, 2025 in Puebla, Mexico, a city located about an hour from Mexico City. Plans for the mission are already being made, and a mission team is being recruited.

Lions District 25-G Awards Community Grant to Miami County Helping Hands

Syracuse Lions Head Back to the Classroom for Fall Service Projects

The Syracuse Lions Club has completed its annual autumn service projects, which focus on the needs of area elementary and middle school students.

In September, the club did its annual SchoolSight screening of students in grades 1, 3, and 8 at Syracuse Elementary and Wawasee Middle schools. The Lions vision team also screened new students in other grades. The state-mandated vision acuity screening has been provided by the Syracuse Lions since 2015, with the exception of 2020, when schools were closed because of the pandemic.

On September 11, two teams of trained Lions screened 120 first and third graders, and on September 17, the teams screened 171 eighth graders and new sixth and seventh graders. The teams included PDG Ann Haffner, Lion Tom Thornburg, Lion Marie Butler-Knight, Lion Karen Hartley, and Lion Barbara Grumme, working closely with District Health Coordinator Sarah Bauer and Syracuse Elementary School nurse Tisha Powell.

With this year's screening, the Syracuse Lions have screened or assisted in screening approximately 4,800 students in the Wawasee School District since they began screening. This year's referral rate of screened students increased slightly over the prior year, but remained low at 17%.

The club's second school service project took place on October 7, when Lion Jerry Wright, Lion Joe Hibschman, and Lion Marie Butler-Knight distributed a free book to all third grade students at Syracuse Elementary. The book chosen was *My First Book About Outer Space*, which combines reading-level-appropriate text about the wonders of space, with activities to complete and images to color. The Lions Club provides the books to encourage reading during third grade, when students must achieve reading proficiency in order to succeed in higher grades.


