A Message from District Governor Warren Allender

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September also offered me the opportunity to visit clubs in earnest—six of them to be exact. As I have said before, visiting clubs is exactly what I had signed up to do as a District Governor. I appreciate each and every club I have visited. Here is my highlight reel: Richvalley celebrated their 50th anniversary of service, Mexico inducted a new member and had a long list of service activities completed and in the works, LaFontaine honored a member with a Melvin Jones Fellowship and was getting ready for a busy weekend of fundraising, Lake City continues to carry out service activities in the community, Peru is a powerhouse in the south with service and new members, and Lakeville we'll be seeing before the month is over. We are Lions, We SERVE.

And of course, during the month, Lions International gives us inspiring and revealing information in the form of the monthly 'Health Assessment' for all the clubs in the district. The document, as I see it, is simply a tool to give those serving at the District Level a bigger broader picture of the district as a whole. I'm not sure exactly who all sees it, I do know the district leadership team sees it and zone chairs see it specific to their areas. It's not a secret document. It lets you know if clubs are reporting membership changes, new members, dropped members, deceased members, transferred members, etc. It also lets you know if service projects are being reported, club meetings, fundraising projects, work projects, etc. International doesn't do any analysis for you but it does put some information in "red" like membership below 15, 3 or more months delinquent in membership reporting, and 12 or more months since activity has been reported. The red is depressing and there's a lot of it. Enough said. Yet it's important as your District Governor that I reflect on this monthly information in relation to the goals we as a district team set, like, 92 new members by the end of the year or the stretch of 132. Well, at the end of August 35 of our 44 clubs failed to report membership information. How about the service reports? 31 clubs are delinquent in reporting service. Remember, our goal is to have 80% report service and I believe it should be 100%. Just saying there is a lot of red in this report and I'm looking for a cause and a solution. First, let me simply say if this is your responsibility, please do the reports. Secondly, I ask myself, is it the portal, or is the portal just a convenient excuse? I'm not sure. I am sure that if I hear of information that is useful in the operation of the portal, I'll pass it along. With that said, I need to give credit to District Governor Mary Ellen Sherer 13OH3 who is part of my Group 29 Governors. Her district administrator developed a number of "cheat sheets" for the portal. She shared those with Group 29 in hopes they might help. I believe they are a big step in the right direction for portal entry. I made those available to PDG Marty Juel and he has posted them on the District Website www.lions25g.com I believe Past District Governor Marty has also written information about it. That's how important it is. We, your district team, will do whatever we can to assist you with what Lions International is asking of you. That is our SERVICE to you. Your SERVICE to us is to continue to provide SERVICE to your community and then REPORT IT! Lions not in leadership roles are banking on the fact that their volunteer work, service, time and efforts are being recognized by Lions International. Believe it or not, they want to, and it will be if we simply do our part.

A Message From 1st Vice District Governor Jackie Kurley



Happy fall, y'all! There is a bit of crispness in the air, and I am OK with that after the September heatwave. For me, September was a whirlwind of training at the USA/Canada Leadership Forum, LCIF training, and the last weekend was Leader Dog Training. What a fabulous presentation at Leader Dog to learn what a cause is all about.

I knew little about Leader Dog other than it was a cause that we have for helping blind people and that it was one of my first District Governor's projects when I joined the Lions. The training was a one-day class that started with an hour bus ride to Rochester Hills from the hotel. We learned how a small farmhouse became the large campus we visited today. Our class had 57 Lions representing 10 states from Delaware, North Carolina, and Maryland on the east coast to as far west as Nevada. We learned that there are approximately 1,300,000 legally blind people in the United States and 75,000 people (about the seating capacity of the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum) will become blind or visually impaired this year.

The mission of Leader Dog is to empower people who are blind or visually impaired with lifelong skills for safe and independent daily travel. Think about that for a minute. Do you realize how much you walk daily? Keep track of your steps for one day and imagine doing that without sight. Two of the major programs for this campus are Guide Dog and Orientation and Mobility. O&M is how to adapt to using a white cane. One of the most important things you learn is to trust. You must have trust in your dog that they will lead you appropriately and keep you from harm's way. We toured the housing facility where there are signs in braille and subtle things to help those that are impaired. For instance, there is a bold blue stripe on the wall to let you know there is a handrail there. But what you might not know is that there is a nub at certain points on the inside of that rail letting you know there is a sign above or directly across the aisle from you. Most signs are in braille or raised lettering so you can feel the letters to read the sign.

We also visited a room where the client stays for three weeks to get acquainted with their dog and heard emotional stories about how these clients realize that they can finally start to gain more independence.

I also learned a new meaning of the word "park". Did you know that dogs can be trained to relieve themselves on all surfaces? Grass, gravel, concrete, tile, it is the command that initiates the action not the scent. Fascinating!

We were then shown the building where the dogs were housed in their suites. Yes, they are called suites, not kennels. Kennel is a dirty word in Leader Dog. We saw how the harnesses and leashes were made, the different villages based on the dog's maturity, and the sections of suites where the breeding occurs. Two dogs in each suite but usually only one bed.

We also learned how to help someone that is visually impaired. It is best to offer assistance, do not assume someone wants help. It is also a courteous act to announce yourself when entering or leaving a room, or just clearing your throat and be as descriptive as possible with directions or information.

For lunch, we were treated to the long-standing tradition of chili and donuts. I know it sounds odd, but it was surprisingly delicious. The day finished with us having dinner and listening to more touching stories of how these dogs have not only made such a difference in lifestyle, but also saved their lives more than once. The caveat to dinner was that we ate with blindfolds on. We did get a few hints that the chicken would be at six o'clock, the potatoes at ten o'clock, and the broccoli at two o'clock. The water was at one o'clock and the pepper had a rubber band around it just to make it easier to navigate our way. It was unimaginable the struggles I went through just to get my food onto the fork and into

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my mouth. I certainly have a new appreciation for my sight.

I strongly recommend that as a Lion you plan to visit this facility and take part in this incredible experience. Did I mention there is no cost to the individual during this entire process? The three weeks stay with food and housing for the client, the time and money spent training and caring for the dog is at no cost to the client. So, as Lions what can we do? Please think about organizing a fundraising event, getting a Leader Dog speaker to your club meeting, or starting a local campaign for awareness in your community like Dollars for Dogs. These types of programs make us proud to be Lions.

Like any time of the year, though, Fall also seems to have a never-ending list of topics constantly demanding our time and attention, and it is easy to lose sight of what is most important. A tongue-in-cheek phrase for this challenge is: "The main thing is to keep the main thing as the main thing."

While it is important for each of us to have a clear sense of what matters most to us personally, a tool which Lions Club International offers to help us consider and pay attention to what is really important at the Club level is the Club Excellence Award. The criteria for the award covers five areas, providing a brief model of what a healthy and effective club should look like.

The five areas are: Membership, Service, LCIF, Leadership and Organizational Excellence, and Marketing. While far from a perfect evaluation tool, any Club can use this very simple application form for a quick but useful strategic review of where they are as a Club. Club members and leaders could then very easily use the discussions generated by this simple review for planning where the Club could spend its time and attention, celebrating its successes, and creating ways to invest in the areas which may detract from future strength and growth.

The deadline has already passed for submission of award applications this year, but now is a great time to start planning for how your Club could qualify next year. Information on the Club Excellence Award can be found in the Member Resource area of the Association website, including the application, as well as criteria for the more challenging and higher level Club 5 Star Excellence Award:

A Message From District Cabinet Secretary Lion Kim Polk



"I COOK."

On a recent day when my granddaughter was visiting, she wanted to cook. I really did not need to make anything but decided that we would make a small batch of snickerdoodle cookies. She helped get items out that we needed including her apron, mixer, bowl, measuring cups and spoons and various ingredients. I helped her put on her apron and she climbed into her toddler tower so she could reach the counter. With each ingredient she was adamant she would do it and said, "I cook, I cook". I was able to control most of it until it came to the



flour. I thought I had a fairly good idea about how much flour had been put in the bowl, but as I mixed it up, I knew that the batter was too stiff. We rolled the balls and baked them. They were edible but were much harder than they should have been. If she had allowed for more guidance the cookies would have turned out much better.

As I reflected on this cooking experience with Mattie, I thought to myself: What went wrong? We had all the right ingredients. We had all the right utensils and items to bake the cookies. What we did not have was the right attitude from the cook! By her not wanting to listen to anyone and saying, "I cook!" she caused the outcome to be not good. Do I have that "I cook" attitude at times? Sometimes, I do.

So, when we are looking at how we do projects and take on service ideas we need to be asking additional questions beyond just "do we have the right stuff?" How many times do we say, "I cook" (I can do it) when we should be saying "no"? Or if we say "yes", we then need to get others to help or get them involved. By saying "I cook" when we may already have a full schedule, we only do an okay job. It may be a job that you are so-so at and someone else may do a better job. But more importantly, by not allowing others to help, we are not being a team player. Remember there is no "I" in team.

Lions work as a team. Lions also are not just one member. Lions live and work as a group (pride) of Lions. It is a group of people that come together to work for a common cause. The next time you are about to say, "I cook", think about the people you know. Would they enjoy helping you? Would they enjoy creating something exceptional? Ask them to help!

We have finished the first quarter of the Lion's year. If you as the Club Secretary are still struggling with the Lion's portal, please reach out to me. Good day Lions,

In talking with DG Warren, he told us that our Service Hours are way down, so we would like to share this with you to see how we can help you. Reporting your service hours is very helpful for LCI. We don't have very good news about our Service Hours reporting for August. Only 34% of clubs reported any Service Hours. Our goal is to try and get up to 80% and I don't understand why we don't have 100%. Maybe we can do more specific training for secretaries on reporting. We are open to suggestions. How can I help your Club report your Service Hours? I want to help. Here is some information for you.

Who can report service?

It's important for your club to know who is responsible for service reporting, so your club receives the benefits. In a Lions Club, the Service Chairperson is responsible for service reporting, although many clubs choose to have the Club Secretary or Club President report. In a Leo Club, the President, Secretary, or Leo Club Advisor can report service. Your club can appoint an administrator to handle service reporting.

See the documents entitled 'Service Activity Information' and 'Why Report Service' for additional information about Service Reporting. They should have been attached to the email message with this newsletter. You can also find information about Service Reporting on the LCI website at <https://lionsclubs.org/service-reporting>.

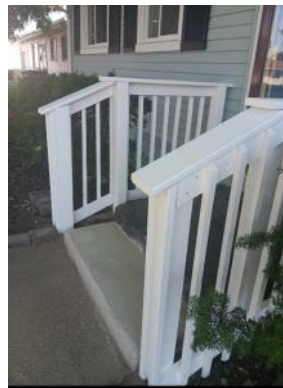
Lydick Lions Build Step and Handrails for Local Couple

233 Lions, Leos, family members, and friends representing 67 Lions Clubs and Leo Clubs from throughout the state of Indiana worked 6,971 hours for the Indiana Lions Foundation at the 2024 Indiana State Fair. This includes 25 volunteers from 9 clubs in District 25-G.

This project is the Foundation's single largest fundraiser and we want to thank every volunteer who helped make this our most successful year.

The Foundation has announced that W.P. Woods Fellowship credits earned at the Indiana State Fair can be transferred to another individual or club, or used to request a \$200 Community Service Grant for an Indiana Lions Club or district, an Indiana Lions state project, LCIF, or the Foundation. The rules governing the use of W.P. Woods Fellowship credits are appended below, and a form to transfer credits or request a Community Service Grant is on the next page.

Rules for Redeeming State Fair Credits Announced

A person (Lion or non-Lion) may use their state fair credits in one of three ways as follows:

1. Expend 10 of their accumulated credits for a W. P. Woods Fellowship for oneself or to give to another person (Lion or non-Lion) in recognition of their commitment to community service
2. Expend 10 of their accumulated credits for a \$200 Community Service Grant for a Lions club located in Indiana. A check for \$200 will be made out to the designated club and mailed to the person using the credits for their presentation to the club in a manner of their choosing.
3. Expend 10 of their accumulated credits for a grant to one of the five Indiana Lions state projects, LCIF, one of the seven MD25 districts or the Indiana Lions Foundation. A check for \$200 will be made out to the designated state project, LCIF, district or the Foundation and mailed to the requesting person for their presentation to the receiving organization. A person may wish to present the check to one of their district trustees of the designated state project or perhaps mail the check with a cover letter to the state project with a personal note relating why they are supportive of the work of that state project.

A person (Lion or non-Lion) can transfer their credits to an Indiana club, an MD25 District or to another Lion. Two or more Lions who don't have 10 accumulated credits as individuals could band together and decide to transfer their credits to one person or to a club, who could then amass the required 10 credits to use in one of the three ways stated above. A Lion or non-Lion may wish to transfer their credits to an MD25 District to allow the District Governor to present W. P. Woods fellowships.

In a fiscal year (July 1 to June 30) a person or club may only use 10 of their accumulated credits either for the \$200 Community Service Grant to a club or for a \$200 grant to one of the state projects, LCIF, MD25 district or the Foundation.

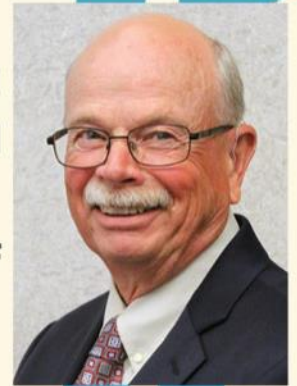
