A Message from District Governor Warren Allender

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I would like to recap some of my comments, for a couple of reasons. Number one, the deadline for my submitting this newsletter article is today, August 25th. And secondly, I believe the information shared is relevant and should be shared with those who were not in attendance. So here goes.

The first point made went like this. At our Cabinet/Leadership meeting on August 10th, all committees and then all clubs in attendance - thirteen of them, were given an opportunity to report on what they have been doing. You know - SERVICE. You know what? **ALL** of them, every one of them had something to report, from fund raising, working concessions at the county fair, having fish frys, and selling burgers. There were also SERVICE projects such as KidSight screening, passing out dictionaries, and building beds. There were also comments about recruiting and installing new members. Here's the deal: our GOAL for CLUBS reporting SERVICE this year is 80%. That's ridiculous. Why can't we get 100%? We know we're doing it, so report it! There is no excuse. Having trouble with the Portal? Ask for help. Don't want to do it? Ask someone else to do it. You know I reported that now anyone can enter activities. Well, I found out that is correct to a point. Anyone can enter activities, however, the entry does need to be approved by one of the Club Officers. Ok, that doesn't seem too hard. Get and Give Credit where Credit is due. Be proud of what you have done. I know you are and we are. We are District 25-G. The G stands for GREAT as 1st Vice District Governor Jackie Kurley will tell you.

To follow up on that just a little, is to ask that you send photos and stories to our Newsletter Editor, PDG Paul Russell. I know that many of you do, many more of you could and should do it as well. I am fascinated when I read the newsletter and see the pictures and stories about what clubs in our district are doing. It's your story, tell it. I only wish I could be more involved and know more about what is happening. With that said, I say keep up the good, no, GREAT SERVICE work in your communities. That's what we Lions do: WE SERVE.

While on the topic of publicity, when you are sending information to Past District Governor Paul Russell about your activities, go ahead and add a CC to Stu Clampitt at: news@readthereporter.com, so it gets published in the Hoosier Lion. You should have received the August edition. It would be great if District 25-G, tucked away there at the end, could really MAKE SOME MARKS of the SERVICE we do in the GREAT District of 25-G.

Of course, my next point shouldn't surprise anyone, as membership was the topic. At the Cabinet/ Leadership meeting, our Global Membership/Extension Chair, Past District Governor Marlyn Fast outlined our stretchi goal in membership. It went from 92 up to 132 new members and two new clubs. Lions International was kind enough to send fifty (50) new member packets. Those were handed out at the Cabinet/Leadership meeting. So, at Banner night two new member applications were passed out at each table. We're off to a ROARING good start with new members. So far, each club I have visited has in fact had one or two new members. Great news and be sure to let Past District Governor Marlyn know who your new members are and get them involved. I know you will.

Several things were not mentioned at Banner night, but discussed at the Cabinet/Leadership meeting, and I believe they are important: Gaming Licenses. If your club runs any type of gambling activity, make sure you have your license. I wanted to do a raffle of a couple of cast iron cookware pieces. We applied for our Gaming license, and it was rejected. We did not have a plan for the disbursement of funds in the event the District was disbanded. We did not do the raffle of the cookware. We did ask that the Constitution and Bylaws committee prepare an amendment ready for a vote at the District Convention in March. The point being, if your Club is doing a major raffle or gaming event you will need a similar statement regarding the dispersal of funds in the event your club would close. (Just a

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side note: recall another stated goal was "No Club Closures".) I believe such a statement could be approved by the Club's Board of Directors and quickly adopted by the Club. Don't let it scare you, just do it.

Another item had to do with marketing. Our Marketing Chair, Past District Governor Marty Juel, prepared a list of marketing ideas for clubs. There were many easily implemented ideas. Again, one of our stated goals this year was to make clubs aware of the marketing possibilities and promotions. Past District Governor Marty also reported that the District website has been down for several months. A new one is working and can be found at www.lions25g.com. And guess what, you can find those marketing ideas right there right now.

The last subject I would like to cover from the meeting deals with Special Olympics. District 25-G, for a number of years, has not named a Committee Chair for that area. Having said that, it does not mean that your club should not support the Special Olympics. It is listed as an area of SERVICE at the state level and there are many local Special Olympics organizations. The decision to support the Special Olympics is yours alone. To do so, simply write a check to our District Treasurer, Immediate Past District Governor Ron Guth, noting what the funds are for, e.g., Special Olympics, either locally or as a state project. He will make sure the money goes to your specified Special Olympics organization.

The last point to be made at Banner night was our District 25-G's commitment to host this year's Lions of Indiana State Convention. We need your help. Reach out to Past District Governor Brian Thomas or Past District Governor Marlyn Fast. Get involved. We want to make this the BEST Convention ever; we want to MAKE OUR MARK! We need **YOU**, a Lion who SERVES!

A Message From District Cabinet Secretary Lion Kim Polk




Hats -

A Message From District Cabinet Treasurer PDG Ron Guth



Hello Lions All,

It's September! The corn and soybeans are still growing, so we as Lions need to keep growing!

Just ask your neighbor, friend, work associate, family members and fellow worship members: **Do You Want to be a LION?**

Speaking of Lions and your club, all but 5 clubs have paid their state/ district dues for the first half of the year. The district thanks you for your timely payments. I was asked by a club how much are the dues for next year? I responded with both the district and LCI amounts, but cautioned that LCI dues are based on fiscal year not calendar year. If your club collects dues for the fiscal year, 2024-2025 regular member dues are

\$48 LCI, \$18 District for total of \$66. For calendar year of January 2025 thru December 2025 the dues are \$49 LCI, \$18 District for total of \$67. Finally, the next fiscal year 2025-2026 dues are \$50 LCI, \$18 District with total of \$68.

Let me put on my IPDG hat and bring up a few topics:

SchoolSight Vision Screening: As a district we excel at screening in the schools, but we don't do so well on reporting the results to the state, which is needed to keep officials apprised of what we do. Please see the "School Screening Reporting Sheet" that is attached with this newsletter and fill it out and send it to the phone # or email shown on the form for each school/class you screen.

Member Portal: Are you having trouble logging in? If you are trying to use the old site it should redirect you to the new site and what you need to do. So what does little Molly have to do with Lions leadership? I think the answer lies in the title of this article. We have already gone through the first two months of this Club year. Are you getting more comfortable in your leadership role? Have you shared your goals with the entire Club so you are all on the proverbial same page? Are you using correct parliamentary procedure? Are you explaining to new Club members what is happening and sharing Club traditions? Are you encouraging Club members to attend Lions functions like Banner Night, District meetings, or Zone Meetings? Have you encouraged all Club members to participate in Club events and fund raisers? Have you explained how your Club fits into the greater Lions International hierarchy? Have you encouraged contributions to LCIF?

This sounds like a hefty list, but a good leader delegates. Some of these tasks should be delegated to other Club leaders or experienced members. No one Lion should have to do everything. There's a job for everyone. Big things become little things.

Molly also applies to membership. I truly believe members don't leave Lions because they find us a dreadful organization that they mistakenly joined. It's the little things. Things like not being included in conversations, not being introduced to the other members or Club ways, or not being asked to participate in Club events. Bringing in new Club members is cause for celebration, but far too often we then largely ignore them and they fade away until they're gone. Big mistake. Let's make sure we match our actions with our rhetoric. It's those little things.



show hard facts about what we contribute versus how many grants have been issued for our communities. We also spent a lot of time on how our clubs should be asking for more grants and how to guide them in obtaining those grants.

There are many different types of grants and different qualifications are required to get those grants. But, if there is money available to help your community, wouldn't you make every attempt to get those funds?

As I mentioned previously, we are going to make sure we put the fun into fundraising. At the District 25-G Banner Night recently, Lion Sophie and I introduced our "Squares" game. For only \$10 you can purchase a square. Once all the squares are sold, we will draw a "winner," and the winner will receive a Melvin Jones Fellowship. Lions Clubs have been so active in promoting literacy in our schools. Today, I come to each of you in 25-G to make sure that your club is actively promoting literacy in your area schools. I strongly encourage your club to ask your local schools if they would like each of their 3rd grade students to receive a dictionary. Remind them of the many advantages of an actual dictionary: enhances vocabulary acquisition; encourages independent learning; develops core language skills; and cultivates critical thinking. We love to present dictionaries to the children because they get so excited that this is their very own book and it doesn't need to be plugged in to work. We walk them through all the interesting aspects of the dictionary. Another great purchase would be Spanish/English dictionary, or whatever the foreign languages are in your area. Ask the schools ahead of time how many they need.

Your club may purchase dictionaries through this website: www.dictionaryproject.org. This program assists people in becoming good writers, active readers, creative thinkers and resourceful learners by providing them with their own personal dictionary. Educators see third grade as the dividing line between learning to read and reading to learn.

I know many clubs throughout Indiana and beyond have already purchased and presented dictionaries to 3^{rd} graders in their area. Thank you so much for promoting literacy. Please send me an email to let me know how many students have benefitted from your club's generosity.



This included ultrasound cleaning (2,750 pairs), preliminary sorting (965 pairs), final sorting and filing (100 pairs), boxing for shipment (2,400 pairs), identifying and shipment of metal scrap for recycling, and sorting designer frames for recycling (1,800+ pairs).

Two sessions (9am-11am and 11am-1pm) were held to accommodate the schedules of those who volunteered to work. All work was done at the district's eyeglass processing center at its facility in the Fairview Grange in Goshen. Four areas of work were accomplished: Ultrasound washing, sorting (taking donated glasses and separating them into useable/non-usable, scrap, and recyclable eyeglasses), final filing of glasses that have been read and labeled by prescription into boxes of 50 for shipping, and preparing boxes of 400 pairs into boxes that will be shipped to Mexico prior to a mission.


Lydick Lions Present Awards for Service

September Is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month



September is childhood cancer awareness month. Did you know that cancer remains the leading cause of death due to disease in young children, yet only 4% of federal funding goes to researching childhood cancer. Let that sink in. It's just not fair. These kids deserve to live out their lives! Help spread awareness next month! Help spread awareness all year long! Fight and advocate for our most vulnerable population.

In one week it will be September—September is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. Most people probably didn't even realize that because by the middle of the month, the world has already turned everything pink to start October's Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Celebrities and athletes don't adorn the gold ribbon while walking the red carpet or taking the field, which is the symbol of awareness for pediatric cancer. There are no products at the stores with a gold ribbon—or branded merchandise turned gold to support these children. Yet, DAILY through out the month

47 parents will hear the words "Your child has cancer". That is over 1,000 children's and family's lives that will be completely flipped upside down just in one month alone.

And maybe just maybe, the gold ribbon isn't everywhere in September because most people choose to look away from it all. Perhaps it is just too painful to imagine a child fighting cancer so they hide their eyes or keep scrolling quickly to not see it. I truly don't blame them—but I didn't have the choice to look away when my 3 year old was diagnosed and thousands of other parents will not the get the choice either.

The funding for childhood cancer is grossly under funded—only 4%, yes you read that right FOUR PERCENT, of federal cancer funding goes to childhood cancer.

So I challenge you this September to not look away, share your support loudly and proudly—because if we do not fight for these children no one will, because they are worth SO much more than 4%.

Top 10 tips for membership prospecting success

Before you read another sentence in this article, be aware that membership prospecting is a sales game. But also

remember that in every encounter between a seller (the Lion) and the buyer (the prospect), something is always 'sold'. Our hope is that the prospect 'buys' our argument for that person to become a member of the Lions. If that doesn't happen, then the prospect 'sold' his argument and we bought his excuse for not joining.

Now let's get back to how we prospect. In addition to the person who actually calls us and asks for information about joining Lions, we usually have to develop a prospect list, which usually results in that uncomfortable job of 'cold calling'. And that usually results in failure to 'sell' our message, due in large part to our inability to generate lists of high probability prospects. Further, our attempts to get an appointment with everyone we talk to cause so much resistance that most prospects will not talk to us again. That prevents us from developing a favorable relationship with most of our prospects.

Tip #1 – Start with a highly targeted list, consisting of people that are most likely to consider membership. Search out names from reliable sources for people that might fit the demographics of your club. Try the local chamber of commerce newsletter for new members, new businesses in your city, and promotions. Check the local newspaper for names of businesses that are making news, adding employees and otherwise making an impact in your community.

Tip #2 – Call or contact names on your list every 3-4 weeks. Understand that only a small percentage of your list will be ready to 'buy' the first time you call. Many more will be ready each successive time you call. Most prospects will not want to meet with you until you have presented prospecting offers at least three times. To stop calling after the initial contact means you succumbed to that old sales resistance: FAILURE

Tip #3 – Present a 'prospecting offer' of no more than 45 words that clearly states who you are, what you are selling (we'll help you refine this in another tip), and 1-2 features of your proposal. Each time you call, change these features. Never tell your prospect you are selling membership in Lions. You will need to 'sell' the prospect the benefits he/she will receive by becoming a Lion.

Tip #4 – Before mentioning anything about Lions, ask your prospect if one of the benefits of becoming a Lion might solve a problem they have. For example, if your club is involved in your local school by supporting athletic programs, scholarships, and other activities, ask the prospect if he/she agrees that it is important that the community help schools by providing resources, including funds and volunteer opportunities. Always ask questions that will return a positive answer. Try 2-3 questions before mentioning that your Lions club members (important- be sure to say 'members' so your words talk about people, not a club) have been providing valuable support for many years. Also, by asking questions, you are involving the prospect in this exchange, and by allowing him to respond 'yes' to your inquiries, he is less likely to say 'no'. Think about your car

buying experiences. Car salespeople engage buyers with similar questions in helping us see ourselves in their vehicles, not by asking if we're interested in buying it!

Tip #5 – Schedule your prospecting sessions for the same time each time and day of the week. Limit your contact time to ½ hour or less.

Tip #6 – Tape yourself with a tape recorder with an open microphone to tape your side of each call. Listen to how you sound. The goal is to hear yourself using your usual conversational tones. Don't try to sound like a professional salesperson. Do not come across as overly enthusiastic, unusually friendly or enticing. Just relax and present your offer without persuasion.

Tip #7 – Always be in a 'disqualification' mode. Be determined to spend your selling time only with 'high probability prospects'. Disqualify low probability prospects quickly and courteously. Don't allow desperation or anxiousness to deter you from that mission.

Tip #8 – Accept the fact that prospecting really is a 'numbers game'. The most important numbers are your contacts per session and the ratio of prospecting offers to calls.

Tip #9 – Keep accurate records of your prospecting sessions. The most successful prospecting people keep accurate records, with notes about every exchange with a prospect.

Tip #10 – Ask for referrals. Whether you succeed or not, ask your prospect if he/she knows other people, like themselves, that may share a common value that supports your offer. Just because you may get a no, that doesn't mean you won't be able to get another qualified prospect. Then you can follow-up with a "Lindsey Jones mentioned that you also have children going to the same school as their children and you may have a similar interest in how we support those causes".

These tips can also be used when contacting prospects face-to-face.
