At the present time we are working to obtain an LCIF Emergency Grant. Local resources continue to be used to address immediate needs.

That brings me to look towards the future. Perhaps what is needed is a service project at the district level. Specifically, the ability to develop a core group of Lions, from the many clubs in the district, willing to go and volunteer their services immediately after an event. Bourbon highlighted the need for hands willing to pitch in and help at any level--a great opportunity to show that Lions care about their community. An LCIF Emergency Grant might follow, but what is needed first is help. We're lucky to have Lion Steve Downey with the Lydick Lions working on Emergency Preparedness. I'll be reaching out to Lion Steve to see about getting this project rolling.

For now, let's just have April showers and look forward to May flowers.

Club Leadership Team

A critical element of your Club's success is how well the leadership team in your Club works as ... well ... a team. The formal "team" leading the Club are the club officers, which the "Standard Club" Constitution and By-laws from Lions International define as "... a president, immediate past president, the vice president(s), secretary, treasurer, membership chairperson, service chairperson, and marketing chairperson." These officers, in concert with the Board of Directors, lead, guide, direct and administer the Club.

Briefly outlined, the key characteristics of these positions are as follows.

- Club President Leads the Club, runs meetings, sets goals, motivates members to participate, and facilitates the Club decision-making process.
- Vice President Assists and supports the president, acts as president in case of absence, oversees specific committees or projects as assigned, and may serve as leadership chairperson.
- Club Secretary Manages Club records and correspondence, including membership records and reports to the Association.
- Club Treasurer Manages Club finances, including budgeting and financial reporting, ensures documentation and proper authorization of funds, and coordinates audits and financial planning.
- Membership Chairperson Focuses on recruiting and retaining members, develops strategies for member growth and satisfaction, and arranges orientation for new members.
- Service Chairperson Plans and coordinates service projects, verifies projects align with Club's goals and community needs, and ensures service activities are reported to Lions International.
- Marketing Chairperson Develops and implements a marketing plan, promotes Club activities and achievements, and improves Club visibility within the community.

If your team works together, each fulfilling their own responsibilities and enabling both other members of the team and all members of the Club to do their work well, the probabilities improve for your Club to flourish. Some of the elements of a team working together well would include:

- Collaboration The team works toward common goals, support and reinforce one another, coordinate their actions, and together enable the Club to grow and to serve their community.
- Meet regularly They discuss progress and challenges, share updates, address concerns, and seek to align with one another to continue pursuing their common goals.
- Support and Communication Whether in meetings, in person, or separately, the team supports one another, shares responsibilities, shares information, identifies and clears up misunderstandings, and seeks to solve problems in the best interest of the Club.
- Engaging Club members Club officers should gather feedback, encourage participation, and foster a sense of community within the Club.
- Networking and Continuous Learning Club leaders can serve their Club well by building friendships
 and connections with Lions in other clubs and across the district, as well as other service and
 community organizations. Additionally, a leader strengthens a Club when they continue to grow and
 develop their own leadership skills, and invest time in developing other Lions.

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Some small clubs may be concerned with how to fill all of the Club officer positions. Instead of being specifically concerned with "more" people or a "bigger" team, it may be better for the Club to consider how the Standard Club model can inform good administration and inspire effective leadership. Then, using the personalities, the experiences, and the talents of the Club members, build a team which enables the Club to effectively serve the community, motivate current members, recruit new members, and raise up future Club leaders.

Global Leadership Team

Team Building on Two Levels



One of my jobs as District 25-G Global Leadership Team Chair is to work with the incoming District Governor to host a series of officers' training sessions for next year's officers. It can be quite a struggle to mesh dates, locations, speakers, and schedules. Not to mention a slowly dwindling attendance from one year to the next. Sometimes I've driven home wondering if we have made any impact at all. I feel sorry for the session speakers who have carefully prepared, and then no attendees at their sessions. But then again, I've had Lions tell me how great their sessions were and how much they learned.

Until not so long ago, the Mishawaka Lions had the tradition of a Past Presidents Dinner. We would set a date and location when the current and incoming Club Presidents could meet, then invite all Club Past Presidents who were already home from Florida. The

purpose of the meeting was to provide "tips" and advice to the incoming President. The advice ranged from the humorous to the serious, from remembering "how we used to do" things to "what we need to do." Even when I wasn't an incoming President, it always amazed me how much we all wanted the Club to succeed. As we left the meeting, we all seemed to be on the same team.

It always amazed me that the Club Secretaries, Treasurers, and Board Members didn't hold similar meetings. On the other hand, those positions tend not to rotate annually like the Presidents. We did, from time to time, invite the Secretaries to meeting with the Presidents' group, but that didn't always work out. I think it would have helped the Club if the different groups could have shared what the Presidents were thinking. That might have made for a better Club team.

While I enjoyed those dinners and discussions, as well as admired the Past President who always ordered liver and onions, I never felt that these sessions should replace the District-wide officers training sessions. I believed that the District-wide sessions provided us information on a broader scale than just our own Club, from Lions International down to the particular office we held. Some Clubs didn't send anyone, some (like ours) sent one or two, but it was the smaller Clubs who sent the larger contingents.

In my opinion, both kinds of meetings have their value. A meeting of officers from just one Club fosters a great team spirit and hopefully some wisdom, but just for that Club. A District-wide training session fosters team spirit as well, as the diverse Clubs share their experiences, ask their questions, and listen to presentations on new programs and initiatives from Lions International. Remember the crowded session on the portal at last Spring's training session at Fulton-Liberty? The room was packed, and we practically had to turn out the lights on them to get the session to end.


So this Spring (if it ever gets here), try both kinds of meetings to help build your Club's team. Have as many officer groups as possible. Pay attention to the results of their discussion. But send as many officers as possible to the District-wide trainings as you can. And afterwards, be sure to share the information you gleaned. Perhaps even ask one of the session presenters to speak at your Club. It doesn't do anyone much good if you keep everything you've learned a secret. Teams don't keep secrets.

As we start another month of Service, from Pancake Breakfasts to Fish Dinners, assisting with meal preparation, helping with groceries, Easter Egg Hunts, and many more services you or your Clubs may be doing this month, be sure to report all the service hours for your club events.

Strengthened storytelling gives stories power. Saying you fed 68 families is more powerful than saying you organized a food drive. Saying your club

contributed 1,680 volunteer hours last year is more powerful than saying your club serves the community. When your club reports service, you collect the details needed to share powerful stories of your club's impact.

Documented club achievements reveal what's working and what's not. For example, it may show that your diabetes education program is growing in attendance, but your annual club fundraiser is shrinking. Reviewing past service reports helps your club make better decisions, including choosing service activities and setting realistic goals.

We have 15 Clubs that have not reported their Service Hours. I hope we can have everyone up to date with their Service Hours before the end of April. I will be sending emails to those clubs to see how we can help you. We have the Zone Chairs, 1st Vice District Governor, 2nd Vice District Governor, and then your Service CST Coordinator.

"We are incredibly proud to have Gail as part of our Lions Club family," said a club representative. "Her dedication to serving others does not go


unnoticed, and this recognition is well deserved.



When you work for the Indiana Lions Foundation at the Indiana State Fair, you receive W.P. Woods Fellowship credits. Work a morning shift and receive 1 credit; work an afternoon shift and receive 2 credits. You may redeem 10 credits for a W.P. Woods Fellowship for yourself or another individual.

This past July, the board of trustees of the Indiana Lions Foundation approved a proposal to allow State Fair volunteers to redeem W.P. Woods Fellowship credits for Community Service Grants to benefit Indiana Lions clubs, Indiana Lions districts, Indiana Lions state projects, or LCIF.
