# A Message From 2nd Vice District Governor Steve Weld



Lions International developed the Global Membership Approach (GMA) to enhance the skills and create the capacity to grow at the Club and District levels. GMA has become a fundamental building block for Mission 1.5. The fourstep process of the Global Membership Approach is specifically designed and intended to grow membership in Lions Clubs and Districts. So, if your Club wants to grow, and decides to give this approach a shot, here are the four steps to the process.

### Step 1 • BUILD A TEAM

In this first step, consider the skills, motivations, experience, networks connections, creativity, and other characteristics of the members of your Club.

With all these elements in mind, start building a team of workers who can take on the challenges of growing your Club, and invite your team to commit a portion of their precious time and attention to this important work.

Effective teamwork is powerful and can be tremendously rewarding. However, it can be very difficult to actually do, so building a team that can work well together is an important foundation for taking on the work ahead.

Consider also if there are Lions outside your Club -- in your Zone, District, or elsewhere -- who may be available to serve as resource, or provide assistance and advice. Consider, also, if there are non-Lions in your community who are already connected with your Club somehow which may offer local insight, resources, or support.

# Step 2 - BUILD A VISION

Your team can now conduct an analysis of your community and develop goals to best serve its needs. Tools like the Club and Community Needs Assessment and SWOT (Strengths Weaknesses Opportunities Threats) analysis can be very useful for understanding what your Club offers and where your Club fits within your community. Understanding these things enables building an honest and accurate vision for where your Club is going, what you can offer new members, and where your Club can focus your efforts to grow and serve your community.

### Step 3 • BUILD A PLAN

Now your team can use the vision you built to guide you in building a detailed series of coordinated tasks to move the Club from where you are at to where you want to be, using the resources you have (or will have) available.

# Step 4 • BUILD SUCCESS

Next, your team, with a vision for where it wants to go and a plan to on how to get there, needs to implement the plan, translating all your hard work in preparation into a reality benefiting your community and your Club . A famous military saying is, "No plan survives first contact with the enemy." This experience requires the team to stay engaged and focused on its goals, adjusting and adapting the plan to overcome obstacles and seize unexpected opportunities. As your team carries out your plan, make sure you capture lessons learned and observations for improving the prospects of success for future teams, and celebrate the many successes you will have along the way simply for having worked together as a team.

# A Message From District Cabinet Treasurer PDG Ron Guth



Hello to all and it is a great day to be a LION!

This month I will comment on the importance of getting your 2025-2026 new officer information entered on the portal. Also, letting DGE Jackie Kurley and CS Lion Kim Polk know who the President and Secretary are and if all their information is correct for the directory and LCI portal. As for myself I would appreciate knowing who your treasurer is for the 2025-2026 year and any contact information changes.

All officers should have an email address listed. If they don't have an email address, they can't login to the portal and will not get critical information sent to them via LCI or our district 25-G.

All of this is important but doubly so for the club treasurer position because of this statement from LCI that was sent to Lion Bob Yunker who is our Indiana MD 25 state controller.

Dear Lion Robert

Thank you for your email. Please note ALL payments are due upon receipt.

The clubs are normally given 30-day grace period to pay.

Please note that LCI will no longer be sending out statements as of July 15, 2025. Treasurers will have access to statements through the Portal moving forward.

Ok, what does this mean? Effective 7/15/25 statements will no longer be mailed to the club treasurer. It is imperative that you have the treasurer position entered on the portal and that the email address for the treasurer is accurate and will be checked often. So, what do you do if your treasurer does not have an email address or is not comfortable or willing to use the portal? The best option is to find a club member who is willing to be the treasurer and has the ability to use the portal to make payment online via the club PayPal account or direct withdrawal from your club checking account. Another option is to create an email address for the treasurer that will be checked by another officer in the club that can download the statement, print it and give it to the treasurer to generate a check and mail to LCI. **Do not enter a treasurer into the portal without a valid email address!** 

I know that I'm being direct here, but times are changing and much of what was done in paper is now done electronically. I need to change as well and my goal is to have the option for you to pay the district for dues, meal payments etc. other than by check. Nothing is in place yet but will keep you informed of my progress to that end.

I've included a page from LCI on payment instructions and as always please contact me if you have any questions on the portal for access to statements/payments.

# **Global Leadership Team**

#### Now What Am I Supposed To Do?



Too long ago, District Governor Elect Jackie Kurley asked me to send out brief job descriptions of what Club officers do, geared for incoming Club officers. Now, as Club elections are being held and new officers selected and inducted, this seems like a good time for these thumbnail sketches. All the officers named below are members of the Club's Board of Directors without actually being named Directors, just with more specific duties.

Directors serve to help formulate and carry out the goals and policies of the Club, faithfully attending meetings, especially caring for the financial health of the Club, and assisting the other officers as requested.

Lion Tamers keep track of Club property and records, make sure the meeting space is ready for each meeting, and make sure that there is space for all attendees, particularly new or prospective

members. By doing so, the Lion Tamers help serve a membership growth function of the Club.

Tail Twisters encourage fellowship, enthusiasm, and goodwill during Club meetings using humor and good sportsmanship. They also work to make everyone feel welcome, all the while collecting small "fines" for sundry offenses in the name of fun. This also serves as a membership growth function of the Club.

Membership Committee Chair is a critical office for the Club by helping to develop growth programs as approved by the Board of Directors, encouraging members to bring qualified and quality new members in to the Club. The Chair also helps to orient and welcome these new members. On the other hand, the Chair works to minimize the loss of Club members.

The Treasurer serves at the custodian of all Club funds, depositing all monies received and disbursing funds only as directed by the Board of Directors. The Treasurer is responsible for keeping itemized financial records for historical and budgetary purposes and issuing financial statements as requested.

The Secretary has perhaps one of the most important positions in the Club. The Club's success depends largely on the efficiency of the Secretary in maintaining records, serving as liaison between the Club and the District, the District Governor, the Zone, and Lions International, particularly by making sure the Club is in compliance with the District and Lions International by submitting reports quickly and correctly.

The Vice Presidents serve to assist the Club President as well as to prepare themselves to act as Club President when their turn comes. While in some Clubs, the position is largely honorary, each Vice President is a student of the workings of the Club so that when their year does come, they can step into the role seamlessly.

The Club President acts as the "face" of the Club by serving as its chief executive officer and presider at Club meetings. The President sees that committee chairs perform their duties in pursuit of the Club's goals. The President does not act as a dictator but as directed by the Board of Directors to pursue the best ways to exemplify "We Serve" in the community.

Other Club officers are the Lions Clubs International Foundation Coordinator, a Service Activities Coordinator, and a Communications Coordinator.



Here we go, it's that time of the month for our updated information on how we are doing with our Service Projects. Many clubs still have not added information to their Service Activities in the Lion Portal. I would like to see if we can help you get your Club updated. Documented club achievements reveal what's working and what's not. For example, what if your diabetes education program is growing in attendance, but your annual club fundraiser is shrinking? Reviewing past service reports helps your club make better decisions, including choosing service activities and setting realistic goals.

Details give stories power. Saying you fed 87 families is more powerful than saying you organized a food drive. Saying your club contributed 1,265 volunteer hours last year is more powerful than saying your club serves the

community. When your club reports service, you collect the details needed to share powerful stories of your club's impact. I know many clubs that provide information like packing meals from Cultivate Food Rescue with over 10,026,800 Pounds of Food Rescued, 78,659 Hours Volunteered, and 1,728,786 Meals Distributed. This is just some information to help you with how our Service data works.

This gives us the ability to communicate how We Serve around the world! We take pride in that achievement, thanks to the leaders who reported over 1 million service activities. Through our service reporting, your club joins in with pride and is eligible for service awards. Lions International service hours are important because they demonstrate the impact of club activities, inspire more service, and provide valuable insights for donors and partners. By tracking service hours, Lions Clubs International can demonstrate the value of their work, build community engagement, and attract new members.



# **Indiana Lions Foundation**

Trustees of the Indiana Lions Foundation, Inc. met on Saturday, April 12<sup>th</sup> at the Lions of Indiana State Office Building and approved ten matching grants totaling \$9,385. In addition to these matching grants, an emergency disaster assistance grant was approved for District E in the amount of \$1,000 to assist with relief supplies for the tornado and flooding events in southeastern Indiana. Matching grants were approved for the following clubs:

- Camp Woodsmoke Remodel camp infirmary addressing structural issues
- Centerville Remodel outdated kitchen in the historic Mansion House
- Mexico Replace outdated plumbing system in the community center
- Plainfield Purchase a surgery light for the Hope Free Medical Clinic
- Riley Township Erect marquee signs containing various community organization's signs destroyed by severe weather
- Peru Purchase a PlusOptix® vision screening camera to be used in the club's reading action and vison screening program
- Noblesville Purchase and plant trees in a greenspace area created as a result of a new White River bridge
- Griffith Provide 'Blue Bags' containing sensory stimulation items that help to de-escalate Autistic and special needs patients during over-stimulation emergency situations.
- New Paris and Leesburg partnership Purchase materials and assemble beds for needy families in their communities

The Trustees approved an increase in the club matching grant maximum to \$1,500 effective July 1, 2025.

Funding for matching grants is derived from Lions license plate sales, funds earned as a result of Lions working at the State Fair, sales of W. P. Woods Fellowships, and investment earnings on the Foundation's endowment.
