Your Club can still apply for the 2024-2025 award until the end of August. If you qualify, this is a great way to gain recognition for your Club's success. This year's update eliminated the application process, as all criteria for earning the award is available when the Club updates their records in the Portal. Whether your Club is in a position to earn the award, now is a great time to start planning how your Club can grow and flourish this year. As club secretaries we need to continue our learning as well. So, my article this month is to focus on Meeting Minutes. What do we include and what do we not include.

# Club Secretary Responsibilities: Best Practices for Keeping Meeting Minutes

Minutes: Typically, information to record includes ...

- 1. Type of meeting (regular, special or board)
- 2. Date and place of meeting
- 3. List of members attending and name of any guests/visitors
- 4. Name of person presiding over meeting
- 5. Whether previous meeting minutes were approved
- 6. If a motion carries or is lost
- 7. All points of order and appeals and whether they were sustained or lost
- 8. Time the meeting was called to order and adjourned
- 9. Names of board members (for board meetings)

Minutes should focus on recording decisions, motions, and official actions taken, rather than opinions or dialogue. The secretary's task is to capture the essential facts, such as motions presented, their outcomes, and any important procedural steps, ensuring accuracy and impartiality. This approach maintains a clear record of club business while keeping the minutes concise and accessible.

Remember: It is Your Club, Your Way. Your minutes need to reflect what is happening in your club meetings, but don't be a stickler for the rules!

#### A Message From District Cabinet Treasurer PDG Ron Guth



Lions of District 25-G, welcome to summer and a new Lions year!

We are all busy with the many events that occur during the summer and early fall to promote Lionism and the fund-raising efforts to support those activities. This month I would like to offer a little information about the commonly known state projects. Most of us know them as the "five" projects, but in reality, we have six or more state/district level projects that could use support from our district clubs.

**Lions Cancer Control Fund of Indiana**: This program has helped countless Hoosiers over the years and is currently looking for donations to put toward matching funds to support the research and treatment of pediatric cancer.

**Vision First Indiana Lions Eye Bank**: The Eye Bank has processed over 50,000 corneas for Hoosiers and other patients in the USA and foreign countries. Our club donations help support the KidSight program and the Surgical Assistance program.

**Leader Dogs for the Blind**: I'm sure most of us know some of what this program does to help the visually impaired. This program supplies its patients with Guide Dogs and training at no cost to the patient. They also provide Orientation and Mobility training for first time and current white cane users. Did you know they also have a Summer Experience Camp for legally blind 16 and 17 years olds to teach them skills and provide them with personal GPS units? Your donations go to the program in Rochester Hills, Michigan, *unless you specify that the funds remain in Indiana*.

**Indiana Lions Speech & Hearing:** "Working for a sound quality of life" This project supports programs offered at Indiana School for the Deaf, colleges and universities for the speech and hearing impaired and also provides hearing aid assistance for Indiana Hoosiers.

**Indiana Lions for the ISBVI:** This project helps to support the "Indiana School for the Blind and Visually Impaired" The school is undergoing massive renovations and construction over the next several years to allow the Indiana School for the Deaf to share the same campus. Donations are used to help the school cope with continuing the education of our visually challenged Hoosier students.

**Indiana Lions Foundation:** The foundation offers matching grants of up to \$1,500 for any club per year to support the community. **The State Fair fund raiser is an important source of money and needs your support by working a gate**, but they also welcome club donations.

**Diabetes:** Our District has a Diabetes fund that we use to support a diabetes camp and the state has a Diabetes committee that funds statewide projects. If your club wants to donate something for Diabetes I will keep the monies in our district fund, or if specified, I will forward the monies to the state level.

**Special Olympics:** The state has a Special Olympics committee that collects and donates funds to the Special Olympics summer and winter programs. If your club would like to donate funds for the Special Olympics I will collect it at district level, then forward it to the state comptroller for use by the committee.

**District 25-G Eyeglass Recycling Program:** Our district has an excellent eyeglass recycling program that collects, processes and distributes them in Mexico during annual mission trips. They need your support as well to continue the great work to help others in need.

**Now the easy part:** When your club decides to donate to any of the above projects just write one check made out to District 25-G and attach a short note saying how much should be given and to which projects. I will combine your amounts with other clubs sent in the same period and write checks

for the respective projects along with a letter telling them where the monies came from, so your club gets credit.

What is not listed above and is not done at district level is donations to LCIF. Your club should send all LCIF donations directly to LCIF along with a completed Melvin Jones Fellowship (MJF) form indicating where the funds should be used. You can send in smaller amounts and just add to your credit and when the total reaches \$1,000 you can give them the information needed for the recipient.

All of you should have received notice of your dues invoice from LCI, unless your club didn't report officers to LCI before July 1<sup>st</sup>. If you don't have an invoice/statement, please contact me and I will help you access it or send a copy to you. District dues invoices were sent on 7/8/25 to all clubs with over half of the clubs already having paid them by 7/19/25. **Thank you!** 

It feels great being a Lion and supporting projects that allow us to help others in need. I will be ready to distribute your donations per your direction.

#### I Didn't Know Lions Did That!

When I talk to family members, friends, and acquaintances about Lions Clubs' service projects, I often hear "I didn't know Lions did that". We all recognize the importance of publicizing our fund-raisers, but how many of us recognize the importance of publicizing our service projects?

Our Lions Clubs exist for one purpose: community service. We serve our communities in many ways, but in many communities, the local Lions Club and the service it provides are the best kept secret in town. As we serve those who need our help, we need to make sure that our neighbors know who we are and what we are doing to make a difference in our local community, across the state, and around the globe. We need support – and new members – from our local communities, in order to continue our long tradition of service, but we are not going to get that support or those new members, if people do not know that our Lions Club exists, or if they think that we're just another card club or bowling team.

Our Lions Clubs have a long tradition of service. If we want that tradition to continue far into the future, it is not enough to work to meet the needs of today; we must also build to meet the needs of tomorrow. We joined Lions because someone offered us the opportunity to make a difference in our community. Offer someone else that same opportunity.

#### Now What Are You Going To Do?

You've been elected to your new office and you are facing your first meeting. Or you've been handed the packet of notes from last year's fundraiser in your new role as committee chair. Now what do you do? What do you want to do? Where do you want your Club or committee to be in 11 months? If you haven't already thought about it, now is the time. Frankly, you need to set some goals **RIGHT NOW**. Mere survival until June 30, 2026 is not a goal.

We have all heard of SMART goals (Specific, Measurable, Actionable, Realistic, Timebound). Keep that SMART acronym in your head as you

begin planning for the next 11 months. Don't let those five little letters frighten you away. Each one is intended to help you create and manage the goals you want to set and achieve.

Let's try an example. I would like to increase Tail Twister income from \$12.00 to \$15.00 at each Club meeting by December 30, 2025. Is this specific? Is it measurable? Is it doable? Is it realistic? Does it include a timeline? I would say "yes" to all five questions. It also assumes I have done some homework on how much we are currently collecting and the average attendance. It also assumes I know how the Tail Twister is raising money now.

But with each goal, you need an action plan. How are we going to put the goal into practice? The plan might include choosing a more imaginative Tail Twister, or work with the current Tail Twister to try new techniques, jokes, raffles, or auctions. The plan might also include visiting other Clubs to watch their Tail Twisters at work, or attending Zone Meetings to get some advice.

Goals can be set for almost every Lions office or activity. Lions Clubs International is very insistent that District Governors have SMART goals which are publicized to the District. Your new goals and action plans shouldn't be a secret either. Communicate them to the Club at meetings. Print them in your Club newsletter. Keep them in the forefront so every member becomes familiar with them and figures out how best to help you achieve them. Report progress or the lack thereof. Emphasize the benefits of reaching the goal. Remember: We do things together. Together we make your goals succeed.




## Are you missing reporting? - Introducing the new "Report to LCI" button

When you are entering service activities – if your entry still says "Draft" – it has NOT been reported to LCI.



A recent Portal update added a new feature to make this easier! Here's how it works:

- 1. Create your service event in the Lion Portal.
- 2. Fill in all required fields—cause, project type, dates, description, and metrics.
- 3. A new "Report to LCI" button appears once these are completed.
- One click validates your inputs, checks the "Report Complete" box, and officially submits the activity to LCI and Insights dashboards.



This new button ensures that your service is **fully and officially recognized**—no more missed steps.

#### Large Project (6+ People)

Project Name: Light Up for Hope Walk

Include an opening ceremony with a survivor speaker or a trustee from Lions Cancer Control state project and provide information booths from local health organizations and the state project.

#### **LCIF Coordinators Update**

Editor's Note: Due to a recent death in her family, District LCIF Coordinator Lion Sophie Long was unable to submit a column for this issue of the newsletter. Consequently, we are publishing a recent plea from LCIF for donations to assist victims of flooding in Texas.

#### **Historic Flooding Devastates Central Texas**

Heavy rainfall and catastrophic flash flooding devastated areas of Texas in the United States. More than 100 people were killed or remain missing, including dozens of children. The flooding displaced many people, destroying homes and severely damaging critical infrastructure, including roads and river crossings.

When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, we, as Lions, are ready to help. Right beside us is Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), our global foundation. #### **Reading Action Program News**

Lions Club has been active in promoting literacy in our schools. Today, I come to each of you in 25-G to make sure that your club is actively promoting literacy in your area schools. I strongly encourage your club to ask your local schools if they would like each of their 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students to receive a dictionary, including Spanish/English or whatever language your community may need. Educators see third grade as the dividing line between learning to read and reading to learn. Despite the availability of online dictionaries, paperback dictionaries continue to offer unique benefits for literacy development, especially for young learners:


- 1. Fosters dictionary skills: Using a paperback dictionary teaches essential skills like alphabetical order, using guide words, understanding pronunciation keys, and identifying different parts of speech.
- 2. Encourages exploration and serendipitous learning: Flipping through the pages exposes students to other unfamiliar words, expanding their vocabulary and fostering incidental learning.
- 3. Promotes focus and engagement: Unlike digital dictionaries that can be distracting, a paperback dictionary provides a focused learning environment free from pop-up ads, notifications, and the temptation of surfing the internet.
- 4. Strengthens memory and spelling: Manually looking up words and the physical act of turning pages can enhance memory retention and improve spelling abilities.
- 5. Develops problem-solving skills: Finding a word in a dictionary requires students to analyze order, sequencing, alphabetization, spelling, and context, providing a valuable mental workout.
- 6.Accessible and reliable: Paperback dictionaries are accessible without the need for electricity or internet connection, <u>according to The Dictionary Project</u>. They are also compiled and peer-reviewed by experts, providing accurate and reliable information.
- 7. Inspires curiosity: The tactile nature of a paperback dictionary and the sense of discovery as students browse through it can spark curiosity and a love of learning.

While online dictionaries offer quick lookup and convenience, paperback dictionaries provide a unique learning experience that contributes to deeper understanding, improved memory, and a more focused approach to literacy development.

#### Dunlap Lions Promote Eyeglass Recycling on Green Day at Elkhart County 4-H Fair

Seven members of the Dunlap Lions Club, including project chair Lion Jeanine Juel, participated in Green Day at the Elkhart County 4-H Fair on Friday, July 18, promoting District 25-G's eyeglass recycling program and collecting used eyeglasses from fairgoers.



The club's educational display featured a photo board that illustrated the complete process of eyeglass recycling, including cleaning, prescription reading, and preparation for distribution. The board also highlighted scenes from the club's Mexico mission trips, showing location setup, use of an autorefractor, and how donated glasses are selected and adjusted for individuals in need.

During the event, 24 pairs of glasses were collected. For each donation, individuals were entered into a drawing for prizes awarded at the end of the day, which included four fair admission passes, \$20 in Clover Cash, and \$10 in Clover Cash, all to be used at the fair. Volunteers engaged with numerous visitors, educating them on how and where to donate eyeglasses throughout the year, while also sharing the impact of these donations. The visual display served as a powerful storytelling tool in communicating the club's mission.

Special recognition was given to Lion Jan Robinson, who coordinated all Green Day events at the fair. Her husband, Wayne Robinson, provided invaluable assistance throughout the day, including setting up the tent, transporting tables and chairs, and helping carry supplies at the conclusion of the event.

When I decided I wanted to do something special for my presidency, I looked into a craft to do. These are pictures of Diamond Dot art of a lion. Diamond Dot is kind of like paint by numbers, but instead of using paint, you use small resin beads, called "drills," to an adhesive canvas. It combines elements of cross-stitching and paint-by-numbers, using a color-coded legend to guide the placement of the resin beads.

This picture took about two weeks to complete and required 70,000 drills to place. I enjoyed working on this, and the finished product is gorgeous. Haven't quite figured out how I am going to frame it as yet,


#### **Indiana Lions Foundation—Indiana State Fair Project**
