Greetings to Lions of District 25-G,

LCI will be sending out dues invoices in July based on your club's member count as of 6/30/2025.

Please note that LCI will no longer mail statements by USPS after 7/15/2025. Notice will be sent to the email address listed for the club treasurer. The club treasurer must use the portal for electronic payments or to download and print statements, if paying by check.

The member count is determined by LCI based on their records from the club's last membership changes on the Lions "Member Portal" before the end of June. Any changes received on 7/1/2025 or later will not change

the billed count. The State and District dues are based off the same LCI member count.

Semi-annual dues for LCI are \$25.00 per member (\$12.50 for a family member).

Semi-annual dues paid to District 25-G are \$9.00 for all members (\$7.00 state, \$2.00 district).

The dues schedule for the 2025-2026 period was included in the last two newsletters. If you need a schedule, please email me directly and I will send you a copy.

You can expect a district dues invoice from me via e-mail no later than mid-July.


More Random Thoughts from a Random Mind

Caring About Gifts



It being another hot and muggy day, I decided to skim through some Lions papers I had, hoping to make the big pile much smaller. One of the papers I picked up was a reprint of Helen Keller's speech at the 1925 International Lions Convention in Sandusky, Ohio. This is the speech still famous for its last line: "Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?" This one sentence has inspired Lion for 100 years now.

So I re-read her whole speech again, even moving my lips to give it more dramatic effect. Incidentally, in 1925, Helen Keller was 45 years old and quipped that she seemed to be the youngest person in the room. I wonder that that says about the image of Lions being an old men's club.

But as I read, I found another passage, two sentences long, which I liked even better than her "Knights of the Blind" sentence. This sentence, I think, strikes even closer to home today. Near the end of her speech, she said, "It is the care we want more than money. The gift without the sympathy and interest of the giver is empty."

It made me think about how true this is becoming for Lions today. We all seem to be too busy to meet the objects of our Club donations, so it is simply easier to write a check and mail it. Obviously, there are times when we need to respect the privacy of people and obviously we can't deliver checks directly to people LCIF may be helping on another continent. But I do think that meeting the receivers of our donations, as many as possible, just might bring a heightened sense of caring to all of us.

It's also important to match the donation with the receiver. The gift must be meaningful and useful. If we are thinking of money, that's not normally a problem, since most Lions Clubs treasuries don't allow for much excess. And maybe money isn't what's needed the mot. We need to do our research.

It has taken me a long time to get to my point, but here I am. I would like to see every Club have some project whereby we personally meet the recipients of our gifts. It doesn't have to be a huge project, but some project. I can think of examples already in District 25-G where this is done, and I hope there are lots more than are being done that I don't know about. Perhaps a list of such projects could be printed in this newsletter. Maybe it involves vision screening. Maybe it involves the kids who get the dictionaries we provide. Maybe it is someone who gets a new pair of eyeglasses through Lions. Maybe it is someone who gets a new rollator. Maybe it's an anxious family staying in a Ronald McDonald house.


It is entirely possible that the recipients may discover, unlike Helen Keller, that we are just a group of old men. Maybe they will discover that we are friendly and talkative. It just might result in a few new members here and there. Somehow, we need to show that Lions are real people.

No matter how we Lions look at it, Lions are one-half of the charitable transaction. As Helen Keller said, "the gift without the sympathy and interest of the giver is empty." At the start of this new Lions year, let's vow not to be empty givers.

The Lions motto of "We Serve" is more than just words. It needs to be a cornerstone of everything we do as Lions. But here is a thought:

"If We Don't Report It, It Didn't Happen!"

We do a *lot* of great things in our clubs. From giving out eyeglasses to picking up trash to handing out backpacks, Lions are always busy

helping people. But guess what? If we don't report our service activities, it's like they never even happened! That's why it's so important to let Lions Clubs International (LCI) know what we're doing.

When we report service, we help show the world how big and strong the Lions family really is. Every backpack given, every meal served, and every child screened helps build a picture of how Lions are changing lives. Without those reports, other people (even LCI!) won't see how amazing your club is.




Reporting is easy and only takes a few minutes. Just go online to the

Lion Portal, under service or ask your club secretary or contact me for help. You don't need to write a long story—just tell what the project was, how many people helped, and how many were served. That's it!

And here's the fun part: reporting also helps your club earn awards and recognition. It can even help get more support and funding for future projects. So, let's make sure the great work we do *counts*—because your service matters, and the world needs to see it!

Let's keep serving—and don't forget to report it!



Service in a Box

Each month I want to provide you with some service project ideas. They will be various sized (Simple to Complex) – so that any size club can use them. Since August is back to school time – all of these are all focused on that theme.

1. Simple Project: "Notes of Encouragement"

Volunteers Needed: 1-2 people

Description: Create handwritten or printed notes of encouragement to be included in school supply kits or backpacks for students. These notes can offer motivation, kindness, and positivity to start the school year.

Steps:

- Write or print 50–100 short notes with messages like "You've got this!" or "Have a great year!"
- Partner with a local school or organization distributing supplies like "Blessings in a Backpack".
- Drop off the notes to be included in student backpacks.

Impact: Boosts student morale and emotional support at the start of school.

2. Moderate Project: "Lions Club School Supply Drive"

Volunteers Needed: 3–5 people

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Global Service Team

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Description: Organize a community collection of essential school supplies (backpacks, notebooks, pencils, etc.) to support local students in need.

Steps:

- Set up drop-off bins at local churches, businesses, or grocery stores.
- Promote the drive via social media, posters, and flyers.
- Sort and bundle collected items into supply kits.
- Deliver to a local school, guidance office, or shelter.

Impact: Directly helps students start the year equipped for success.

3. Complex Project: "Back-to-School Community Fair"

Volunteers Needed: 5-10 people

Description: Host a mini fair with free vision screenings, school supply giveaways, and fun activities for families.

Features might include:

- · Lions vision screening booth
- Free school supplies table
- Local vendors or health professionals (hearing, dental, etc.)
- Fun stations: face painting, games, snacks

Steps:

- Secure a venue (school, park, community center)
- Partner with local organizations for supplies and health services
- Promote the event across the community
- Set up, run, and clean up the event

Impact: Combines service, outreach, and community building—high visibility and long-lasting goodwill.

The Indiana Lions Foundation's Matching Grants Benefit Many **Lions Charitable Projects**

The Indiana Lions Foundation completed its fiscal year with \$24,652 in matching grants awarded to twenty-five clubs and Camp Woodsmoke as well as a disaster assistance grant awarded to District 25-E. These grants resulted in many benefits to our fellow Hoosiers through the enabling of these clubs in pursuing many charitable projects through the use of their charitable funds supplemented by Foundation matching grants. As a results of these club/Foundation partnerships:

1. Children 1) learned to appreciate reading through listening to stories in their public parks, 2) received their own book and 3) accessed new

books placed in their library.

- 2. Children learned how to fish.
- 3. Children were screened for vision abnormalities and dyslexia in their schools.
- 4. Children received beds to sleep in when they had no bed and were given food on weekends when no food was available in their home.
- 5. Children were able to attend Camp Woodsmoke with a working infirmary.
- 6. Communities benefited by 1) receiving information through the erection of informational signs 2) being able to use ADA compliant restroom facilities and 3) being able to use modern plumbing systems and kitchen facilities in their community centers.
- 7. The uninsured were able to receive medical care in a free clinic with updated exam lighting.
- 8. Communities were enhanced with new tree plantings and entertained by Fourth of July fireworks displays.
- 9. First responders benefited by being able to use a working beverage cooler in their firehouse and by being able to have 'blue bags' available to treat autistic victims and traumatized children.
