Getting the Most from the Lions Portal



As the Lions year winds down and clubs are completing their officer transitions, this is an ideal moment to make sure the Lions Portal is working for your club — not just sitting there waiting to be used.

The Portal is the central hub through which Lions International manages the administrative life of every club: member rosters, officer records, service reporting, dues, and communications. Clubs that use it well tend to run more smoothly and stay more visible to the district and to LCI. Clubs that use it irregularly often find themselves scrambling at year-end or missing out on recognition they have earned.

Here are four things worth checking before June 30.

Member records: Are your active members listed correctly? Birth dates, addresses, email addresses, and phone numbers feed into district communications and the directory. This is also the time to process any drops or resignations cleanly, before the new year roster is set.

Service activity reporting: Every service activity, fundraiser, and donation your club has completed this year can still be entered before June 30. Each report counts toward your district's service reporting rate and your club's Club Excellence Award metrics. If your club has been doing the work but not recording it, the next few weeks are your window.

Contact information for incoming officers: Make sure the new president's, secretary's, and treasurer's contact information is current and accurate. These are the addresses through which the district — and LCI — will reach your club next year. A wrong email address in July means a missed communication in August.

Club meeting information: In addition to updating contact information, make sure the information on your club's meeting is also correct. If needed, update the day, the time, and the location for your monthly meeting — or meetings, if you have two different times or locations.

However, Lions International has built tools to help clubs do what they already want to do — serve their communities, grow their membership, and recognize their members' contributions — and the Portal is part of that effort. I encourage you to continue to learn and explore how to use this tool to help your club thrive.

A Message From District Cabinet Treasurer PDG Ron Guth



Greetings to Lions of District 25-G,

I will be sending out dues invoices in July based on your club's member count as of 6/30/2026. Please have your club's membership up to date on the Lion Portal before the end of the month so your club is not billed for members no longer with your club.

I have attached a "New member semi-annual dues breakdown" which gives you the amount of dues to collect depending on when the new member is added into the Lion Portal. It is a lot to digest but for existing members the fee is simple. **Total of LCI and District/State annual dues are: Regular Member \$68.00 and Discounted Family Member is \$43.00.**

You should be collecting dues from your membership now so that you have funds available when you receive notice of invoice/statements from District and LCI in July.

You can expect a **district** dues invoice via e-mail after we receive the member count from LCI. District invoices are sent to treasurer and/or secretary email address on record with LCI. If none are listed or your secretary/treasurer has contacted me with changes they are sent to the address listed in our district accounting program.

Please note that LCI no longer mails statements. "Notice" of statements will only be sent to the email address listed for the club treasurer. The Lion Portal must be used to pay electronically (recommended) or to download/print statements if paying by check (not recommended).

KEY POINTS:

You must login to the Lion Portal to see your LCI dues statement it will not be sent to you. District dues invoice will be sent to you via e-mail from me, the cabinet treasurer.

Both the LCI dues and District dues require payment within 30 days.

Any membership changes must be made in the Lion Portal prior to midnight 6/30/26.

Member drops are effective on the date you file, not the date you list in the portal.

75% of the district clubs pay dues promptly and set an example the remaining clubs should strive to match and show pride in being LIONS.

It has been an honor to serve as the cabinet treasurer this year and I look forward to doing the same under the leadership of DGE Steve Weld.

I'M RIGHT AND YOU'RE WRONG



Conflict seems everywhere in our lives. Conflict ranges all the way from trying to get the biggest cookie to fighting for that parking space closer to the mall entrance to vast geopolitical wars in which we feel fairly helpless other than wishing "our side" to win.

Lions Clubs are no different. Conflict abounds, all the way from the petty ("he's sitting in my chair") to the philosophical ("I'm not selling fruit just to see my money get spent out of town"). Sadly, Lions International ranks conflict as the leading cause of membership losses. Lions International defines conflict as "a struggle resulting from incompatible or opposing needs, diverse wishes, or external or internal demands."

There are a variety of reasons why conflict occurs. It can result from a simple misunderstanding that isn't resolved. Perhaps someone's interests or values were challenged. Perhaps personal or Club power/authority was challenged or ignored, or perhaps our members' needs were just not being met. I'm not going to define each of these since I believe we can all relate to any one of these, if not all of them.

Sometimes conflict can be beneficial, possibly producing better relationships, better communications, prevention of future conflicts, increased innovation or service, or sometimes stronger personal motivation. All of these are fundamental for a successful Club. But conflict can also be extremely harmful and must be recognized and dealt with quickly and carefully.

To that end, Lions International has recognized the dangers of conflict for the organization. It has established Dispute Resolution Procedures for the Club, District, and Multiple District levels for seemingly unsolvable disputes at those three levels. These Procedures are reviewed and revised regularly, most recently in July 2025. On the other hand, Lions International has published less complicated recommendations like "Quick Tips for Conflict Resolution" in 2019. Neither document will provide the perfect solution to the conflict, just ideas on the process toward finding a solution. In the past, Lions International also had a session on conflict resolution in its District Governor Elect training.

Ultimately the goal of conflict resolution is exactly what those two words mean, creating a win-win solution for both parties in the conflict. In my opinion, however, we should view a solution as a win-win for the Club, the District, or the Multiple District. Getting from the beginning of a dispute to a successful resolution may not be a swift or easy step. Watch for Part II of this article in the Newsletter. In the meantime, try to identify past conflicts in your Club and how they were successfully resolved.

Start Small. SERVE Well.

As this Lions year comes to a close, I want to leave every club with one simple challenge: **do one new service project in the next 30 days.**

It does not have to be large. It does not have to be expensive. It does not need a long committee report, a six-month plan, or a perfect idea. It just needs to be real service that helps people and improves your community.

For many clubs, the hardest step is not finding a need. The hardest step is moving past, “This is what we have always done.” Tradition matters. Fundraisers matter. Meetings matter. But the main thing for Lions is still service. When people see Lions serving, they see who we are. They see purpose. They see kindness in action. They see something worth joining.

I would like to introduce the SERVE framework to help. Before your club starts a project, ask whether the project truly SERVES the community:

S — Service, not just fundraising: Are we directly serving, or mainly raising money?

E — Effective impact: Will this make a real difference?

R — Relevant to the community: Does this meet a real local need?

V — Visible Lions in action: Can the community see Lions serving?

E — Easy to accomplish: Can our club realistically complete it?

A fundraiser raises money so we can serve. A service project is when we serve directly. Both are valuable, but they are not the same thing. Fundraising fuels service, but service is the mission.

The best place to begin is with a small launch. A few Lions can call a food pantry, school, senior center, library, park department, township trustee, church, or clinic and ask, “What is one practical need we could help with this month?” Then the club can shape that answer into a project it can actually complete.

Small service has big impact. Ten hygiene bags for a pantry, a two-hour park clean-up, a supply delivery to a school, a senior resource packet, or a simple eyeglass collection drive can all be meaningful. The goal is not to impress people with size. The goal is to serve well, learn, report the service, and build momentum for the next project. Then invite other people to serve with us.

This article is the last one for this Lions year, but it is also the starting point for next year. Over the coming months we will keep returning to this idea: clubs grow stronger when they try something, learn from it, and keep serving. We do not have to abandon what works. But we should be willing to add new service that meets today’s needs.

Service in a Box: Use SERVE to Launch One Project in 30 Days

Here is a simple step-by-step guide your club can use at the next meeting. Keep it small. Keep it clear. Complete it within 30 days.

Here are the steps:

- 1. Pick one need.** Ask one local partner what help is needed right now. Do not guess. Listen first.
- 2. Make sure it is service.** Use the S in SERVE. Are Lions directly helping, packing, delivering, cleaning, collecting, teaching, visiting, or improving something? If the main activity is only raising money, choose a different project for this challenge.
- 3. Check the impact.** Use the first E. Ask, "Will this make a real difference to someone?" A small project is worth doing if it meets a real need.
- 4. Confirm it is relevant.** Use the R. Make sure the project fits your community, not just your club calendar.
- 5. Make Lions visible.** Use the V. Wear Lions gear, use a small sign, take a respectful photo with permission, thank the partner publicly, and invite others to serve next time. Promote the event on social media or other ways.
- 6. Keep it easy to accomplish.** Use the final E. Limit the project to what your club can finish in 30 days with the Lions who are likely to show up.
- 7. Scale the project.** One to three Lions can ask, collect, deliver, photograph, and report. Four to nine Lions can hold a short packing night or collection week. Ten or more Lions can make it a visible community service day.
- 8. Report and repeat.** After the project is completed, report it in the Lions Portal. Then ask, "What did we learn, what can we try next, and who can we invite?"

30-Day District 25G Challenge

- Choose one service project - not a fundraiser.
- Keep it small enough to complete in the next 30 days.
- Use the SERVE test before you begin.
- Invite at least one non-Lion to help if possible.
- Report the project when it is completed.

Bottom line: A good Lions project does not have to be big. It needs to SERVE.
