


DG John Hand - "Opening New Doors"



Throughout the world, the long white cane is used by people who are blind or visually impaired as a tool for safe and reliable navigation. The white cane is a symbol of the user's skills and talents, mobility and independence. It also allows the sighted person to recognize that the user is visually impaired.

The white cane was initially developed and put into use as a measure of safety, especially in traffic situations. Sufficient training with an Orientation and Mobility specialist can aid in successful cane use, technique and safety. Several countries have traffic laws designed to protect the person using the white cane. The "VisionAware" section of the American Foundation for the Blind's website illustrates several types of white canes that are internationally recognized. Sometimes the white cane has a red band or strip for the purpose of contrast.

International White Cane Safety Day (October 15th) gives Lions an opportunity to increase awareness of the white cane traffic safety laws. According to the World Blind Union, which is a global organization representing the 285 million blind or partially sighted people worldwide, "White Cane Day is observed worldwide to recognize the movement of blind people from dependency to full participation in society."


Greetings, 39W Lions!

FACEBOOK SUSPENSIONS

Has your club Facebook page been suspended? or are you concerned that it could be?

Please <u>fill out this form</u> if you are the Facebook page admin of a Lions club's Facebook page. We will review your account to be added to our Allow List within Meta Brand Rights Protection, which lets Facebook know your page is allowed to use the Lions International trademark.

We understand the importance of Facebook pages in Lions clubs' marketing efforts, and how frustrating this issue can be. Thank you for your patience as we work to provide support.

Please note that we cannot guarantee any suspended Facebook pages will be reinstated."

FACEBOOK SUSPENSIONS (From Lions Club International)

Are you a Facebook page admin for your Lions club? Read on for recommendations if your page has been deleted, next steps and best practices for avoiding suspension.

What Facebook Recommends

If you disagree with Facebook's decision to remove your page, you can request a review of the page and Facebook will take another look at the decision.

You can do this by going to the Support Inbox, opening the message Facebook sent you about taking down the content and clicking "disagree with decision" if you see the option. Or, try going to your page and clicking "Appeal" at the top.

Once you've submitted your appeal, a Facebook (or Meta) Support ticket will be opened, and you will be contacted via email by a support agent.

Including as much information as possible will give your Facebook support agent a complete view of the purpose of the Facebook page and verify the page's authenticity. Your agent may request that you create a new email, correctly identify certain members in photos, provide additional documents and complete other actions, which Lions should be ready to comply with.

If you see an option in your email ticket to start a live chat with a support agent, try it out. This will open a chat via Facebook Messenger with a support agent, and you may even be able to communicate with them by phone. Only open this option if you have the time to respond to messages immediately.




Todd Durbin from Hands of Hope received \$900 from Nampa Lions Club to fund a year of shipping insulin and unused medical supplies to those in need.
