NORTHEAST PENNSYLVANIA LIONS EYE BANK HISTORY



Northeast Pennsylvania Lions Eye Bank, Inc. (NEPLEB) is an independent 501 © 3 non-profit corporation. As an independent corporation it is recognized as a free-standing eye bank and a non-chartered organization under the constitution and by-laws of the International Association of Lions Clubs. As an eye bank, it obtains,

medically evaluates and distributes eyes from humanitarian-minded individuals for use in corneal transplantation research and education

Founded in 1957 by Lions members of the District 14-K, the NEPLEB serves a 37-county area, including 60 hospitals. The service area extends west to State College, Pennsylvania, south to Maryland, and north to New York and east to New Jersey. The eye bank is federally inspected and has recently undergone a successful Department of Health and Human Services, Public Health Service, Food and Drug Administration site survey. In addition, it is a certified member of the Eye Bank Association of America and has achieved the highest accreditation awarded by the association

During the past 48 years, the eye bank has provided corneas for over 25,000 successful transplants. Most of these "sight restoration miracles" benefited our 37 county service area residents, thanks to the cooperative efforts of the eye bank, hospitals, ophthalmologists, and Lions Club volunteers. Without this cooperation fostered by the eye bank, local residents would be forced to travel out of our region to deal with unfamiliar health care providers and longer waiting lists to receive corneas.

Surgical Recovery Specialists recover corneas by utilizing a surgical procedure called In-Situ Excision whereby only the cornea is removed from the donor. Prior to the implementation of the In-Situ Excision Program in 1995, eye donations were recovered through the enucleation process or removal of the whole globe from the eye donor. Expansion of our donor recovery program into the "In-Situ Excision" procedure has enabled us to minimize corneal endothelial cell loss and contamination, and maximize the number and quality of cells that ultimately are transplanted. Historically, donor families have declined eye donations because of the whole globe enucleation procedure and possible trauma to their loved one. A proven benefit of the In-Situ Excision program is that an increasingly number of donor families are now more willing to donate once they understand that just the cornea is removed.

One of the most important functions of the eye bank is to provide comprehensive laboratory services for testing and preparing donated corneas for transplant surgical procedures. Using the most up-to-date medical standards and technologies available, the eye bank lab does extensive testing to assure that all corneas are safe for transplant. In addition to its technical functions, the eye bank provides services for donors and their families, hospitals, transplant recipients and coordinates programs with other organ and tissue donor agencies in the state and across the country. It also provides a variety of educational and informational programs for medical professionals and the public.

"SHINE YOUR LIGHT"

LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND

Founded by three Detroit area Lions Clubs members in 1939, Leader Dogs for the Blind provides guide dogs to people who are blind and visually impaired to enhance their mobility, independence and quality of life. Each year, over 270 students attend our 26-day residential training program to be paired with a guide dog. This is a life-changing event that opens the door to independence, safety and self-worth for many of our students. In addition to our guide dog program, we offer programs that enhance a person's independence and quality of life in



other ways, including orientation and mobility training, GPS training, and seminars for Orientation and Mobility professionals. Currently, Leader Dog is the only facility in the Western Hemisphere to teach Deaf-blind students to work with a guide dog.

Thanks to generous donations from our supporters, our guide dog services are provided free of charge, including room and board and travel to and from our campus in Rochester Hills, Michigan, for students living in North America. Leader Dog is recognized as a "Best In America" Charity by the Independent Charities of America.

What happens at Leader Dogs for the Blind?

People come to Leader Dog from all over the world to learn skills to enhance their mobility and independence. We teach people how to travel safely with a white cane and/or with a guide dog and how to how to use Kapten PLUS (GPS navigational tool)

What kinds of dogs do you use?

Most Leader Dogs are Labrador Retrievers, Golden Retrievers and German Shepherds; occasionally we use Standard Poodles when dog allergies are a concern. Sometimes we are able to use dogs that are mixed breeds that have been donated by individuals, shelters or other service dog organizations.

How do you train the dogs?

Leader Dogs are educated in the same way as many pets, with lots of repetition and positive reinforcement. For the first year of their lives they grow up in homes with volunteer puppy raisers. The raisers teach them basic obedience and expose them to the world. Leader Dogs are in harness training for four months with a professional instructor in Rochester Hills. During this time, they learn guide dog skills, such as finding sidewalks and avoiding obstacles.

How does someone get a Leader Dog?

Leader Dog recipients must be at least 16 years old, legally blind, physically and emotionally capable of caring for a dog and must agree to use the dog in the intended manner. Leader Dog recipients must have safe traveling skills.

Do you only train dogs for people who are blind?

Yes. Leader Dogs are trained to guide people who are blind and visually impaired. You must be "legally blind" to be considered to receive a Leader Dog. We also train guide dogs for people who are both blind and deaf, but the role of the dog is as a guide and not a "hearing" dog.

Is there a charge for the services?

There is no charge for any of our services, including the guide dog, equipment, transportation to and from our school and room and board for 26 days.

How does a dog know when to cross the street? Can they read traffic lights?

Leader Dogs don't know when to cross the street and they can't read traffic lights. They wait until their handler gives them the command to go forward. Then the dog decides whether or not it is truly safe to cross. If the Leader Dog doesn't see any approaching traffic, it will cross the street and stop at the curb. Then the dog's handler will tell it again which way to proceed.

How does a dog know where to go?

Leader Dogs rely on their handlers to know how to get to destinations. During a walk, the handler is constantly telling the dog to turn right, turn left or proceed forward. Sometimes when a team has frequently walked to a certain destination, the dog will remember the route. It is always the handler's responsibility to become oriented to the environment.

Can people take their Leader Dogs anywhere?

Just about! There are federal access laws that protect a guide dog user and his or her partner from discrimination. Any public place is accessible by a guide dog team.

Where do you get the dogs that become Leader Dogs?

Leader Dogs for the Blind has its own breeding program. Occasionally, Leader Dog will also accept puppies from breeders whose dogs conform to our rigorous health requirements. Leader Dog moms and dads live with volunteer host families in their homes. They are bred at the facility, then return to their homes where the mom whelps (births) her pups. At any given time there are approximately 70 Leader Dog moms and dads.

Where do the puppies grow up?

Future Leader Dogs (puppies) grow up in the homes of volunteer puppy raisers. There are about 400 puppy raisers in 22 states and Canada. Volunteer raisers teach the puppies basic obedience, house manners and expose the puppies to the world. Puppies are returned to Leader Dog when they are 12 to 15 months old.

What is a career changed dog?

When a dog is not able to serve as a Leader Dog, we refer to that dog as "career changed." Most times these are wonderful dogs that make terrific pets but are not well-suited to be guide dogs. Oftentimes these dogs are not able to pass the scrutiny of our medical exams or personality assessments. Some dogs just don't have the desire to work in this way.

Where does Leader Dog get its funding?

Funding is attributed to 3 areas: individual gifts, endowment interest and service organizations, such as Lions Clubs. Much of the success of the Leader Dog program relies on the generosity and dedication of our faithful donors. We receive no state, federal or United Way funding.

What other programs does the school offer?

In the Accelerated Mobility Program (AMP), people participate in a mobility course designed to accelerate the learning process with one-on-one instruction in cane travel. AMP offers opportunities for people to experience various travel environments. Leader Dog provides a free Kapten Plus GPS device to clients in our guide dog and white cane training programs who live in the U S and Canada. Kapten Plus is handheld, personal navigation device that enhances travel by verbally announcing names of streets, intersections, route instructions and other clues.

The Foundation Mission is to raise funds for eye and diabetic research projects and equipment for clinical procedures. 80% OF THE WORLD BLINDNESS IS PREVENTABLE AND THROUGH RESEARCH WE WILL FIND A CURE.

OUR HISTORY

The Pennsylvania Lions Sight Conservation and Eye Research Foundation was founded in 1959 by a unanimous vote of the Pennsylvania State Council of Lions Clubs. The Board of Directors consist of six Lions, two members from each region (west, central and East) in Multiple District 14 and appointed by their respective District Governors and approved the State Council. Each member of the Board of Directors serves a three year term and is eligible to be reappointed by a recommendation of the District Governor and approved by the State Council.

The Foundation and the Lions of Pennsylvania have made major contributions to Wills Eye Hospital, the Pennsylvania Lions Laser Center at the Eye and Ear Institute, the Pennsylvania Lions Low Vision and Research Center, the Center for Molecular Ophthalmology at the University of Pennsylvania, The Scheie Eye Institute and the Molecular and Regulatory Biology Research Laboratory at the Pennsylvania of College Optometry

PENNSYLVANIA LIONS HEARING RESEARCH FOUNDATION PURPOSE

To initiate and support research in Pennsylvania on hearing problems covering a range of research from embryonic through adult ages.

In keeping with the Lions of Pennsylvania interest on youth activities, special emphasis is encouraged on research to prevent deafness and hearing problems amount our youth. All grants are awarded with the state.

HISTORY

The Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation was created by the action of the 1978-1979 State Council. It was incorporated as a non-profit corporation on August 21, 1979. The 1979-1980 State Council appointed the first Directors to the Board, and the first Board meeting was held on January 20, 1980. To determine if it was the will of the Lions of Pennsylvania to own and operate such an organization as a non-profit corporation, the 1979-1980 State Council placed the question on the ballot at the State Convention. The delegates to the convention held in May 1980 overwhelmingly approved the question, thereby mandating support of the Foundation by the Lions of Pennsylvania. The Foundation awarded its first research grants in July 1982 and continues to award research grants each subsequent July. To date, over \$1.5 million has been awarded.

HOW FUNDS ARE RAISED

Funds are raised by the Lions, Lioness and Leo members from Multiple Districts of Pennsylvania. Pennsylvania's Multiple District 14 is comprised of 18 sub-districts which are identified by letters, such as A, B, C, etc. Each district governor appoints a District Hearing Research Chairperson who is responsible for arranging the collection of funds from within the district. All funds are forwarded to the Foundation treasurer or the Foundation P. O. Box 127, Mechanicsburg, PA 17055 for deposit.

HOW GRANTS ARE AWARDED

Researchers submit grant proposals to the Foundation to compete for available research funds. All proposals received are reviewed and critiqued by the Medical Advisory Board members comprised of up to three out-of-state hearing professionals and 11 in-state professionals. The Directors of the Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation, using the critiques received from the Medical Advisory Board, make the final decision as to which proposals are to be funded and in what amount. Our Board serves without remuneration in keeping with the Lions motto: "WE SERVE"

MEMORIAL ENDOWMENT FUND

The Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation provides clubs or individuals an opportunity to establish an Endowment in the following manner: A contribution of \$100 (or more) would establish said Endowment, however the amounts contributed after the Endowment is established could be made in any amount and at any time without restrictions. The name to be given the Endowment must be made know to the Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Foundation at the time of the initial contribution.

SPEAKERS AND PROGRAMS

The Pennsylvania Lions Hearing Research Foundation has speakers and programs about the foundation and its accomplishments. The Programs can be secured from the District Hearing Research Chairperson or from any Foundation Board Member.

CALL FOR INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR CANDIDATES

At the State Council Meeting held in Harrisburg, PA on August 6th, 2011, the State Council of Governors took action to endorse a candidate for International Director at the 2012 International Convention in Busan, Korea. This candidate would be an advocate for Pennsylvania and Lionism on the International level. State Council is requesting all eligible districts with no less than 1250 members and 35 Lions Clubs to consider endorsing a candidate for this high office. (District 14-C qualifies but cannot nominate a candidate because the district will be hosting the State Convention in May 2012)

A candidate must meet the requirements for International Director as outlined in the Lions Clubs International Constitution & By-laws. "A candidate for the office of International Director shall:"

- "Be an active Member in good standing of a Lions Club in good standing
- Have completed or be completing a full term or major portion thereof as district governor of a full district of this association
- Secure the endorsement of a convention of his/her district. Provided, that the convention of the sub-district shall be eligible to endorse a candidate
- Secure the certification of endorsement of his/her district (sub and multiple) in accordance with the by-laws or constitution"

Interested candidates should send their resumes along with the endorsements of their club and district to the State Office no later than January 20, 2012. All qualified candidates should contact their district governor or the PA Lions State Office for further information.

LCI LIFE MEMBERSHIP

a. All applications for Life Membership shall be reviewed and qualifications confirmed by the international office for approval.

b. Life Members approved after July 1, 1980 will receive, in addition to the silver card, one Life Member tab without cost. Additional tabs can be purchased.

c. Authority to approve Life Memberships is granted to the executive director, acting on behalf of the board of directors.

d. Life Membership may be revoked by order of the board of directors when due cause is shown.

Any member of this club who has maintained Active membership as a Lion for 20 or more years and has rendered outstanding service to this club, his/her community, or this association; or any member who is critically ill; or any member of this club who has maintained such active membership for 15 or more years and is at least 70 years of age; may be granted Life Membership in this club upon:

(1) Recommendation of this club to the association,

- (2) Payment to the association of \$500.00, or its equivalent in the respective national Currency, by this club in lieu of all future dues to the association, and
- (3) Approval by the International Board of Directors.

Nothing herein shall prevent this club from charging a Life Member such dues as it shall deem proper. A Life Member shall have all privileges of active membership so long as he/she fulfills all obligations thereof. A Life Member who desires to relocate and receives an invitation to join another Lions club shall automatically become a Life Member of said club. Former Lioness members, who are now Active members of their Lions club or who become Active members of a Lions club on or before June 30, 2007, may apply all of their prior Lioness service toward Life membership eligibility. Lioness members who become Active members of a Lions club after June 30, 2007, will not be eligible for Lioness service credit for the purposes of Life membership eligibility. This membership category shall be included in the club delegate formula calculation.

As 2011 comes to an end, it is a time to reflect on our many successes during this year. Last year our Foundation was able to help millions of people around the world. Our Lions Quest program has grown to six more countries, now totaling 69 countries, and is reaching more than 12 million children around the world. Our SightFirst program has expanded to include new program areas, such as education, rehabilitation and research. Our partnerships



have increased, including a record donation from the Gates Foundation to help us fight measles. We have helped rebuild lives following some of the worst natural disasters in recent history. These are just a few of the numerous highlights in the past year.

It is because of your generosity that LCIF is able to expand to meet even more needs worldwide. Last fiscal year, donations were up by 40 percent. I am excited to tell you that through the first four months of this fiscal year, our donations are up an additional 62 percent, from \$15.1 million to \$24.1 million. Many more people worldwide are benefiting from your kindness and humanitarian service. Nearly 1 million people will benefit from the grants awarded at the October board meeting alone.

One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative Update

Every day a quiet storm needlessly takes the lives of 450 children. Yet for less than US\$1, we can provide life-long immunity and the chance at life. Lions, we can save 157 million children through One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative, a partnership with the Measles Initiative. The Gates Foundation is challenging Lions to mobilize US\$10 million with a matching grant of US\$1 for every US\$2 raised by Lions. Last month LCIF received two large donations to help meet this challenge: US\$250,000 from Multiple District 300, Taiwan, and US\$10,000 from International Director Seiki Yamaura from Japan. All Lions are encouraged to support this program and help meet the challenge. Donations are eligible for MJF recognition. Many others around the world are also expressing their support. Last month International President Tam met with the President of Nepal and Vice President of Kenya, both of whom pledged their support to vaccination campaigns planned in their countries

Disaster Relief Update

Nearly two years following the earthquake, Lions in Haiti remain committed to rebuilding lives and the economy. The nursing school is now complete in Haiti and students will move into the facility this month. The school includes four classrooms, a practice laboratory and a resource library. The homes being built in collaboration with the organization HELP are nearly complete. In addition to the 620 families who are benefiting from a new home, 102 Haitian construction workers are benefiting through employment from this project.

Lions Quest Expansion Pilot

Lions Quest continues to expand beyond typical school programs. LCIF is beginning to pilot our new Lions Quest program in six community schools in the Chicago Public School system, in partnership with the YMCA of Greater Chicago, Illinois. This marks the first step in bringing Lions Quest to community centers, afterschool programs and other organizations -- the very places where Lions help youth every day. Lions Quest is eager to partner with Lions clubs everywhere to expand this new initiative. Lions continue to play a key role in expanding the program worldwide. Training was recently held for Lions leaders from South Asia. In January, meetings will be held in Europe and Africa. The meeting in Africa marks the formal launch of our \$150,000 project with the U.S. State Department to expand the program in five countries.
