OCTOBER IS WHITE CANE MONTH

WHITE CANE

History

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible. In 1930, the late George A. Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. The Peoria Lions approved the idea, white canes were made and distributed, and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the rightof-way to cross the street. News of the club's activity spread quickly to other Lions clubs throughout the United States, and their visually handicapped friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea by the blind and sighted alike guickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration among their sighted counterparts. Also in 1931, in France, Guilly d'Herbemont recognized the danger to blind people in traffic and launched a national "white stick movement" for blind people. She donated 5,000 white canes to people in Paris. Today white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US and many other countries, providing blind persons a legal status in traffic. The white cane now universally acknowledges that the bearer is blind. For specific information contact your local government office for motor vehicles.

White Cane Safety Days

To make the American people more fully aware of the meaning of the white cane and of the need for motorists to exercise special care for the blind person who carries it, on October 6, 1964, the U.S. Congress approved a resolution authorizing the President of the US to annually issue a proclamation designating October 15th as "National White Cane Safety Day." *

The National Federation of the Blind (NFB), a leading organization for the blind, has established the **third week in May as "White Cane Week."** * During this week, a special concentration of efforts to educate the public concerning the hopes and aspirations of the blind is emphasized. In keeping with the Lions' established tradition of assisting the blind, your Lions club can do much to promote community awareness of the white cane law by seeing that all driver education manuals prominently include the law. Request that local radio, TV and newspaper media periodically feature news of the law's existence and its wording in detail. Contact offices of local government officials to request a proclamation. In the United States, the President's annual White Cane Safety Day proclamation may be found on the White House web site www.whitehouse.gov

DISTRICT 14-W HEARING AID NEWS

(The information is from late 2009, was not verifiable and may not be accurate)

When you, as a Lion, are approached about someone in need of a hearing aid, it is nice to be able to answer the questions presented. It is also good to be able to do this on your own, without needing to go running to someone who will only give you the barest minimum of information. Also, when someone asks you "What are you guys and gals, all about?" you can start by telling the questioner all about our wonderful hearing aid program. And then move on to the courtesy eye glasses program. It is "Great to Be a Lion." An informed Lion is a Happy Lion and a Happy Lion stays a Lion. Credit for this program goes to *PDG Bill Kozerski*, and now the work passes to *Lion Tom Major*, our District Hearing Aid Chairperson.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Step # 1 in this process is to meet with Dr. David Wadas for a hearing test and evaluation. This MUST be done before anything else. Applicants who start with their own doctor's recommendation must still go through the entire process with Dr. Wadas, and if determined eligible must pay Dr. Wadas the listed fees in order to secure a device from LCIF.

Club Presidents and Secretaries are advised to keep the enclosed updated Hearing Aid Form, which changes the financial qualifications for Hearing Aid participants. The attached form takes into consideration the Federal Guidelines for Poverty Level Programs, such as our District 14-W Lions Hearing Aid Program. The program qualifications are based on 135% of the Federal Poverty Level effective January 1, 2009.

Our program has been beneficial in providing Hearing Aids to those who cannot afford a Hearing Aid because of their income or family incomes. Applicants under our program are required to fund those costs affiliated with acquiring a Hearing Aid which are considered personal items such as, testing, prosthesis, and Doctor's fees. A fee of \$36 is charged for the hearing test; \$76 for the inear prosthesis; \$200 for Dr. Wadas' Performa fees. These costs have been negotiated with the Audiology and Hearing Aid facility operated by Dr. David Wadas, located at 34 South Main Street, Wilkes-Barre, on the first floor, rear of the Provincial Towers Building. In addition to the fore said cost, individuals are required to provide proof of income by either: recent W-2 Form, current pay check, or yearly income statement from either and/or pension funds and social security.

Dr. Wadas, a noted audiologist, has been working with the Lions over the past years in helping provide hearing aids to those in need when we were recycling used Hearing Aids, which we still do, if they are less than four years old. In the ear Hearing Aids are **not acceptable**, because of the different shapes of individual's ear canals.

Our LCIF Hearing Aid's are the latest digital hearing aids available and must be programmed to the individual's needs. There are two types, a 3P for normal hearing loss and a 3HP for deep hearing loss. The 3P comes in colors of Beige, Brown or Gray. The 3 HP come is Beige, or Gray.

Applicants for Hearing Aid are requested to call Dr. Wadas' Office for an appointment at 570-822-6122. Forms are also available at Dr. Wadas' Office in the event clubs do not retain or make copies to give to potential recipients.

P.S. FYI, any child up to the age of 18 in the State of PA is eligible for assistance through the Department of Welfare for Hearing Aids if eligible for an ACCESS Card.

DISTRICT 14-W COURTESY EYEGLASS PROCEDURE (Not A Free Procedure)

Blindness prevention and eyesight preservation are what Lions took as a challenge by Helen Keller in 1925, when she asked them to become "Knights of the Blind" Providing free and/or reasonable priced eye glasses to needy residents have become a major part of what Lions do. Here is the procedure. Whenever a club, a member, our help line 208-LION, receives a request for eyeglasses, the procedure never varies. The individual is referred to the *Association for the Blind* in Exeter. Call 570-693-3555; ask for Denise and she will walk them through. There is a financial eligibility screening, and when qualified, an appointment is made for a vision test. When all is completed the individual leaves with new eyeglasses. The Lions Club in the town where the individual lives is billed for a nominal amount, which is the unfunded portion of all of the costs. Single vision lenses are \$35 and multiple vision costs the hometown club \$55-\$58. Transition lenses, Polycarbonate lenses and Varilux are not provided unless the individual pays for the upgrade.
