Lions of Tennessee:

We have a unique opportunity to continue our leadership legacy, as the Lions of Tennessee assist in the financing of the campaign to elect PID Bob Corlew as the 2nd Vice President of the International Association of Lions Clubs in Toronto, Canada July 2014. This is a financially expensive endeavor with estimates ranging between \$150 to \$200 thousand dollars.

If we are successful in our endeavor, we the Lions of Tennessee can proudly say we had a Club (Memphis Downtown) in Dallas at the beginning of Lionism, proudly provided the 50th International President (Ed Lindsey), and the 100th International President (Bob Corlew) and also two other International Presidents (Clifford Pierce and Austin Jennings) who served as part of our Lionistic international leadership legacy.

Individually, I ask that each Tennessee Lion consider donating the amount necessary to acquire one of the Century Team pins.

They will be available in 4 designs: 1. Brass pin for \$100 =+ donations, 2. Silver pin for \$500 =+ donations, 3. Gold pin for \$1,000 =+ donations, 4. Gold pin with stone in end of handle for \$5,000 =+ donations (depicted). These Century Team pins will be available at the MD-12 Fall Rally November 1-2, 2013. They will be available in each district through a District Campaign Pin Coordinator.

Collectively, I ask that every Club/ District consider having a Campaign fundraising event and donate those proceeds to the Campaign. Each district Campaign Events Coordinator will assist in planning Campaign fundraising events. Many Clubs have unique situations and are knowledgeable about the type of event that would be successful for them. One such possible event is: BURGERS FOR BOB: Clubs with their own meeting facilities could easily put on a burgers and sides, with refreshment type meal. Then sell tickets for \$50 each aiming for a minimum of 50 tickets sold. All event proceeds turned in to the Campaign will be eligible for the Century Team pins in the, combination suitable to the method the Club or District cares to award them.

Have you ever visited the Tennessee School for the Blind? If not, you have missed a very impressive place.

The school is located at 115 Stewarts Ferry Pike in Nashville, Tennessee.

TSB is a state special school established in 1844 to meet the unique needs of visually impaired students living in the state of Tennessee. The school provides academic and professional services tailored to benefit students placed in its care through the Local Education Agencies across the state. Beyond a tradition of academics, TSB specializes in the instruction of expanded core-curricular areas such as Braille, mobility, technology, career education and independent living skills. Students at the school also enjoy the opportunity to participate in team sports, campus clubs, organizations and many leisure-time activities. In addition, the school provides outreach services to visually challenged students, their parents, teachers, schools and other agencies assisting the visually challenged.

- 1 Eight new staff members have joined the team of TSB this year.
- 2 TSB recognized 16 members of the faculty and staff for their years of service by the state (State Service Awards Program)
- 3 Persons of Character Awards are given to students who demonstrate behavior that exemplifies following the school rules: Being safe, Respectful and Responsible.
- 4 The Life Skills classes organize and participate in Life Skills Olympics.
- 5 You may notice a new face lift in the halls, class rooms, cafeteria and parking lots.
- 6 Parental Involvement-The staff at TSB works diligently using various methods to keep parents informed about their child's life and activities at school. When parents and families are involved at home and at school, the children seem to perform and cope better in school activities.
