

## Petersburg Lions Train Future Leaders

The Petersburg Lions Club conducted a workshop for future leaders from Lincoln County on September 27<sup>th</sup>. The training was conducted under a contract with Motlow State Community College and was principally for the 2008-9 class of Leadership Lincoln. Leadership Lincoln is the countywide leadership development organization. The Petersburg Club has been providing leadership skills training for Leadership Lincoln for the past two years, but this training represented a couple of important 'firsts.' It was the first time we have had a full 4 hours for training. Previous training was conducted in 45 minute segments at

monthly meetings. This was also the first time we have performed the training under contract, and the first time we've been paid for this service. The lesson plan was based on a survey the trainers conducted to identify the needs of the students.

In the weeks leading up to the Leadership Lincoln retreat, which was held at Henry Horton State Park, the trainers conducted a survey of the students to identify the types of training that would be most valuable to them. The survey questionnaire was prepared by Lion Green and former Liion, Larry Payne. The result indicated that the most relevant training would be Time Management, Goal Setting, and Motivating & Empowering People. President Roberson taught the modules on Time Management and Goal Setting. Lion Troy Green taught Motivating and Empowering People. The photo below was taken during Lion Green's presentation.



Following the training, Lion Green helped the participants to create *personal action* plans. Those plans were based on the information presented and help the participants come away from the retreat with several specific actions that they plan to take in order to become more effective leaders.

The workshop ended with participants completing an evaluation. The evaluation form was developed by former Lion Larry Payne and he tabulated the results. We received 25 evaluations. Eighteen of them were from the class of Leadership Lincoln and seven were from Lions and guests from the Petersburg area. We received an overall score in excess of 4 on a scale of 1-5 for the workshop.

Lion Troy Green Describes How to Motivate & Empower People.

Leadership Training is one of the services that the Petersburg Club provides to the community. President Roberson says, "We began this type of training in 2004 as an internal project to help our members prepare for leadership roles in the club. We quickly realized that other organizations needed the training, so we conducted seminars involving 12 hours of training in Petersburg. Now, we have an arrangement with Leadership Lincoln whereby we provide the training at their locations but we are allowed to bring several people from our community to the training sessions. This has been one of our most successful projects."
