• Kid Sight - PDG Rick Wagener - 5M2's newest project of off and running.

We will be purchasing 3 Plus Optic vision screeners for our district. This is for children 6 months thru 6 years.

Preliminary planning is to have each club have a chair person that wants to participate. Each of the Region chairs will have one of the screeners for them to use. There will be a training session for the leaders and then will become trainers to the trainees. We have all paperwork needed for a successful screening. And each participant will be notified of a "referral or non referral" to seek further attention from their eye doctor. 5M9 has had this project up and running for 2 months and have had tremendous response from the community.

We have received \$100,000 from the MN Lions Vision Foundation, and over \$16,000 in pledges from clubs so far. We will be applying for an LCIF grant of \$100,000 in January. We will also be seeking Corporate sponsorship for the budget of this project. As of now, there is no intention of seeking "Parade of Green" status.

Our initial investment is:

3 Plus Optix screeners @ \$6,475 each = \$19,425 District Credit ____\$11,000 Balance =\$ 8,425

The Multiple chair wants the order and payment in the next 30 days and the program up and running within 3 months. So we need some money. We could have 5M2 give the money up front and then assess each club a smaller amount; or the District could pay the entire balance, and will "own" the screeners.

This month's issue of the Lion Magazine featured an article about the MLVF donating \$4M to the U of M for equipment in a new surgical center. (Page 11 if you missed it.) Earlier this spring we were saddened to learn of the passing of Dr. Donald Doughman, the former medical director of the MN Lions Eye Bank. He served in the position 36 years, He was replaced by Dr. Joshua Hou in 2015.

5M2 Lions Clubs gave away about 25 Helen Keller Awards this past year. We hope this continues forth into the next year. As we do club visits, we will try to encourage clubs in the district to honor a member of the club or a member of their community who has made an impact on their club.

We will be manning a booth at the State Fair along with the MN Lions Hearing Foundation. Thank You to those of you who volunteered to work in that booth on 5M2's day at the fair. If anyone else would like to spend an hour or so in the booth, please stop in on Friday Aug. 26 and I am sure you will be welcomed by the volunteers in the booth.

Thanksgiving for Vision will be held on October 29.

PDG Mary Spille continues to write an informative monthly article for the newsletter. This was part of the new long range plan that was developed last year- that all directors have an article in their newsletters. We also will continue our club visits.

<u>Newsletter Editor</u>: Lion Cindy Walters reported that she thinks that things are going good. She has been getting a lot of information but can always use more. All newsletters have come out on time and were full of information. Please continue to send information to her from your clubs, zones, regions, committees, etc. Goals include: getting newsletter out on time; continuing to provide timely information to all Lions in 5M2.

<u>Project New Hope</u>: Chair Lion Darlene Wondra attended our quarterly meeting. They had to cancel one retreat for lack of participation. We do struggle with getting veterans to participate in the retreats. We are sponsoring a family fishing trip at the "Ely on the Lake" Veterans camp, which falls in line with our Project New Hope mission. Jack Webster is hard at work with the bike a thon for the 100 year celebration that will benefit Project New Hope.

Just a reminder to wear name tags as much as possible. While going around visiting with people in New Prague, several wanted to know more about Project New Hope because she was wearing her name tag.

<u>Protocol</u>: IPDG Marvin Grimm — Does your club have a protocol manual? If not see him. Someone from your club should be in charge of protocol so when Governor visits, or setting up your own meeting, proper protocol is used. Example: Where should the US flag be placed. Club banner? <u>Special Olympics</u>: PDG Joan Blank reported that summer is a slow time for speaking engagements for Special Olympics, but definitely is not a slow time to for Minnesota Special Olympians who have been training hard these summer months. Training takes place year round for many athletes. I was so hoping I could volunteer and participate at the Fall Games August 19th – 21st, but I will be at our first PDG Reunion in Duluth that weekend.

The Fall Games include Equestrian, Bocce Ball, Softball and Golf, in 4 different locations around the Twin Cities.

Her goal this year is to identify all the Special Olympic teams we have in our district and to promote each one to the clubs that are in the surrounding area. She does have a few speaking engagements already lined up starting in September. She also plans to form another team for the Polar Plunge in February. She is hoping to increase our group from 10 to 15 plungers.

Thanks, DG Steve, for asking her to continue for another year and she looks forward to spreading

the word about Special Olympics.

<u>Technology</u>: Lion Laura Maki reported that the start of each new year is always busy with creating the new letterhead, DG visit form, updating the website and creating cabinet email list along with club officer email lists. She will try to get the directory downloaded as soon as it becomes available so all the email lists can be created.

She will also be contacting the Project Chairs to look over their flyers for the website and see if any updating is necessary. Since we have several new chairs, their contact information will need to be added.

She continues to work with clubs on getting an e-clubhouse website or setting up a Facebook page. One of DG Steven's goals for his term is to get 75% of the clubs to have a presence on Facebook. Following is data on how 5M2 is doing toward this goal: In 2012, she gave a presentation at the Mid-Winter about the e-clubhouse websites offered for free by LCI and also provided some information about the social media site Facebook. You can see by the chart below that the workshop had an impact on the clubs in our district

Youth Exchange/Youth Camp: Lion Jim Walters reported that 29 youth from 16 different countries came to Minnesota this summer. Five were placed in 5M2. The students enjoyed the Camp week very much. As in the past, this is the highlight of their trip to the US. Special thanks to clubs in 5M2 for assisting with Camp Spicer by providing meals and other supports – Mankato Key City, Mankato Sunrise, Chaska, Courtland, and St. Peter; also, thanks to the clubs in 5M2 for the parade of green donations and donations directly to Camp Spicer. Goals include: finding more host families in 5M2, creating promotional material for the project, and continuing to promote the 501C3 Lions International Youth Exchange Camp Spicer Foundation.

Youth Outreach, LCI Essay Contest: PID Debra Wasserman reported the 2016-2017 Theme: "A Celebration of Peace". This year's Peace Poster and essay theme is certainly appropriate for the Centennial year of Lions. An email including the contest theme and rules, as well as PID Debra's contact information, will be sent to Minnesota Teachers of the Blind/Visually Impaired, at the beginning of the school year. The District Governor will be copied on this email. 2016 MD5M Convention Final Report

We would like to extend a thank you to the District Cabinet who gave us the approval to bid again for the privilege of hosting the Multiple Convention again this year. The 2016 Convention committee was more than pleased with the venue and particularly the staff with whom we worked. Everything went very smoothly with only a few minor issues. We recognize that the speaker system in the arena was far from ideal, depending on where you were seated; however, we do know that, if we are fortunate to host another Multiple at the Verizon Center, we will no longer need to deal with the arena sound system. The new, banquet/theater area is finished and will have ideal sound for all types of venues, including banquets and speakers.

The total number of registered participants for the convention was 547, only two less than when we hosted in 2011. We had 389 at the Saturday morning breakfast, 453 at the Saturday noon Awards luncheon, which coincidently was the same number we had for Saturday noon at the 2011 convention, 395 at the Saturday evening banquet and 386 at the Sunday morning brunch.

The Friday service project Food for Kidz was again successful, packaging 21,168 packets, and the Northfield Leo project featuring WWII veterans had many, many positive comments. These two projects, along with the recycling of paper products and collection of eyeglasses during the weekend fulfilled Lions Club International's Centennial Service projects: Engaging Our Youth, Protecting Our Environment, Sharing the Vision, and Relieving the Hunger. The Sunday morning tail-twisting by the Leos raised \$600.00, which was donated to Food for Kidz.

The raffle room this year was the responsibility of the MN Lions Vision Foundation and Camp Confidence. They reported income of \$19,070 on the raffle and \$8120.00 for the auctions and red ticket raffle items.

PID Maynard and 1st VDG Nancy met with members of the 2017 convention committee on July 22nd to review this past year, specifically the budget. A copy of the final budget is included with this report. Our proposed budget had been \$65,660.00 and we ended up with actual expenses of \$60,347.55. We did not receive the anticipated grant from the Mankato Visitors Center but were fortunate to have the Verizon Center work with us on the rental fees. The Verizon Center is interested in having the Multiple Convention return to Mankato every five years or so.

Hosting the convention as a district gave us the advantage of asking for financial support from both our clubs and the district. A total of \$8250.00 was received from the clubs and cabinet of 5M-2. Those monies made it possible to keep the registration package below \$100.00 as well as assist in paying for costs of the convention. As a result of the total monies brought in for the convention, the committee was able to pay back \$4000.00 to the district. In addition, we have been able to keep \$4000.00 of the monies collected from the clubs as start-up money for hosting a future Multiple Convention. The money has been placed in an interest bearing account by District Treasurer/2016 MD5M Convention Treasurer, Lion Sue Vos.
