Last week I and Lion Loretta had the honor of representing District 5M2 at Leader Dog for the Blind in Rochester Hills Michigan. We are one of 5 or 6 Districts in our Multiple that have 100% participation by our Lions Clubs in donating to Leader Dog. It makes a person feel proud when they call out your District's Number and you can be recognized for the great work that the Lions of your District do to make this happen. This was part of the program that they had at the end of the day Banquet. One of the highlights of this portion of the program was a conference call they made to a Lions couple from Washington State. They were the couple who road their motorcycles through 48 states in 24 days raising moneys' for Leader Dog. The exact amount they had raised from this Ride had not been calculated since moneys' are still coming in for it. We purchased a couple of pins as did most other people who were there that day, so that will add to their total. They told how she always would ride on the back of his motorcycle, so she said if we are going to do this together we both should be riding our own bikes. So she bought a bike and got her license to ride it in the spring. If you could imagine just getting a motorcycle license, then taking on a ride through the 48 states shows a lot of courage and dedication. They rode through the deserts of Arizona, Nevada, and California when the temperatures were well over 100 degrees; they very drained after they completed those days. Throughout the trip they were welcomed by many Lions who supported them with food and lodging. His brother and wife were there to accept an award for the couple. There was a Lion from Barnesville, MN, he was invited to Leader Dog for his involvement with Leader Dog and the support he gave for the ride through the area. The year before this same young man rode a bicycle across the United States to raise funds for Leader Dog. Sounds like our own Lion Jack Webster when he started Journey for Service.

They had a couple speak who came from the Detroit area. He had just become totally blind a couple of years ago. His wife called Leader Dog and asked how much it cost to raise a dog, and when she was told that it was about 35,000 to 40,000 dollars she just hung up. The next day the lady from Leader Dog called the couple back and explained to them that yes it cost that much to raise one, but to them there was no charge. He told about how he had a tape made of him going around town, so they could see how he got around with a white cane that had been furnished by Leader Dog. I went over and mentioned to him how I had assisted in making a video for a man in Prior Lake just few years before. He had adapted very well to his dog and traveled to many places like the college where his daughter was attending. He said she was very proud to meet him there for lunch.

We had a tour through all parts of the facility and a chance to walk blindfolded with a dog. It shows how you have to complete faith in your dog. We traveled to downtown

COLOGNE LEOS BOOK DRIVE Saturday, October 5th & 6th

Did you know that in an average income Minnesota neighborhood there are 13 books per child. In a low income neighborhood there is one book for every 300 children! Every member of our club has owned a book. Because of that we cannot fathom hundreds of children, some the same age as us, not owning a book. Please join us and help make a difference.

The Cologne Leos will host a used book drive on the weekend of October 5-6, 2013. When we heard about Immediate Past International President Madden's literacy project we became very interested. When we found out it will be a 10 year campaign we decided to do something about it. We are inviting your club to host a similar book drive on the same weekend. Here's how:

1. You would advertise it throughout your community.
2. Then set up a drop off site and sort the books into two categories: children's and adults.
3. Finally, you would arrange transportation of the books collected to the Mankato Ziegler Equipment drop site on Tuesday October 8, 2013.

We are challenging each club that participates to collect 100 books and make a donation of \$50-\$100 dollars. The money will be used towards the cost of shipping the books both nationally and internationally.

The books collected will be distributed in the following manner: 25% - Internationally, 25% - Locally, 50% - Nationally

Ziegler Equipment has very graciously offered to help us gather the books in one location and hold them until they are picked up for distributed. Books will be divided and donated to different organizations including: Bernie's Book Bank in Chicago (www.berniesbookbank.com), Operation Paperback and the Reading Action Program (supported by LCI) to help start a library in Africa.



Lions support helps Buddy Program Sight-impaired campers experience rural life

The last three weeks of July were a mind-boggling experience for seven campers and three counselors involved in BLIND, Inc.'s Buddy Program. Through the program, the teens and pre-teens shared a myriad of new experiences, both in the Twin Cities and in rural Minnesota.

Charlene Guggisberg, a Lafayette native and a former occupational therapy assistant at New Ulm Medical Center, coordinates the program. Blind since the age of two, Guggisberg has never expected special treatment because she's blind—and wants other sight-impaired people to live life the same way. Through the visit to the New Ulm area, she helped the campers and counselors experience some of the same things she did while growing up on a farm.

Program participants travelled by van from the Twin Cities to visit the farms of Guggisberg's cousin, Tony Guggisberg, south of New Ulm, and that of her brother Al, north of Lafayette. The campers and counselors met chickens, chicks, geese, goats, and kittens at Tony's, then touched calves and fed hay to the cattle at Al's place. Their excitement was apparent, as they repeatedly asked for another chance to touch, pet, and feed the animals. At Tony's, they also felt the branches of Christmas trees grown on the farm.

Through the Buddy Program, youngsters from nine to 14 years old spend three weeks in Minneapolis, living with the counselors in apartments in uptown Minneapolis and commuting by city bus to the BLIND, Inc. headquarters in South Minneapolis.

"It takes a brave step for their parents to send them here," Guggisberg said. "We get the kids to problem solve—we get them to say 'I can,' not 'I can't.'"

During the July 13 to August 3 program, the students learned Braille and cane travel—as well as things their sighted peers do. They had computer and cooking classes, did their own laundry, learned home and personal management, built bird houses, and went rock climbing, paddle boating, and on the water slides at Wild Mountain. They took outings to McDonalds and an ice cream parlor to

practice independence.

Guggisberg added, "At the end, we call the parents in for a seminar. The kids expect more from themselves than they did at the start—those three weeks give them a taste of where they can go. We encourage parents to give the kids the freedom to do things for themselves."

Charlene's enthusiasm for her work, and the program in particular, is contagious.

"Blind kids of this age get overlooked. Most youth programs aren't funded until age 14. There are only three programs like this in the U.S.," Guggisberg explained. "We had grants but, with the economy, some of them were cut back."

This year's program got a big boost from the Lafayette Area Lions Club, of which Charlene's dad, Wallace, has been a member since 1980. Upon learning of the funding shortage, the club contributed \$5,000 to this year's program, allowing it to reach out to youngsters to make them more self-sufficient. Lions members also met the kids and counselors when the group visited the area.

Three of this year's campers were from Minnesota and one each from Texas, Utah, Michigan, and New Jersey. The three counselors, who are also blind, came from Nevada, New Hampshire, and Illinois.
