A little review from the 98th International Convention. Before the convention started, I spent two and one half days in training sessions. We started at 8:30 am and went to 5:15 pm each day. There were 30 District Governor Elects in my group, six countries plus Canada and USA.

The sessions were led by a Past International Director. It was good to hear ideas and exchange with Lions from other states and countries. There was some review of what our MD5m trainers had presented. Our District Trainers do an excellent job of getting Governor Elects ready.

The parade was Saturday morning. About 10,000 Lions were in the parade. A very hot, mile long parade. The International Parade was very colorful, with lots of interaction with the crowds of spectators. The opening of the Convention was Sunday morning. Tim Shriver, the chairman of "Special Olympics, was the main speaker. There were workshops, we learned about important issues facing the global communities, elected international officers, voted on constitutional amendments and helped set the future direction of Lions Clubs International.

There were about 18,000 Lions in attendance, 743 Governor Elects. The induction of Governors was the last event on Tuesday.

The theme of the new International President, Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada from Japan, is Dignity, Harmony and Humanity. Bringing Dignity to others through Humanitarian service.

I hope to see many of you at Jungle Days, August 3, 2015 at Shoreland Country Club near St. Peter.

will be hosting projects that benefit children in their communities.

There are three steps you should take if you want to maximize your impact during this International Event:

- 1. Plan your project Lions Clubs International has provided the "Lions Children First Planning Guide" to provide your club with project ideas and planning tips. You can download the guide from the LCI website or by clicking on this link in the newsletter pdf (http://www.lionsclubs.org/ resources/EN/pdfs/iad252.pdf). There are many other resources available if you search for Lions Children First on the website.
- 2. Promote your project Invite members of your community to serve with you to showcase your club and demonstrate the power of service. Too often we forget this part of the process. We do many projects, but fail to inform the community about what we do.

**Childrens Dignity Week** provides us with the ideal opportunity to let our communities know that we are part of a much larger organization. Not only will your club be supporting children, but 1.4 million members in 46,000 Lions Clubs

worldwide will be with us during this very special week when we will be calling attention to the needs of children. That sounds like a Front Page Article in the local paper.

**Share the news on Social Media!** Start a Club Facebook Page, post announcements of your project on the 5M2 and MD5M Facebook Pages. Use the hashtag #Lions100 and you may see your photos on the LCI Facebook page!

**3. Report your project** – Report your service on the MyLCI website to earn your **Centennial Service Challenge Banner Patch** and to get your club's name on the Centennial Ticker on the Lions100 website.

Reporting your project accomplishes a couple of things. It will add your record of service to that of other Lions, helping us reach our goal of serving 100 million people during the Centennial Service Challenge. Lions Clubs International will be publicizing the progress towards meeting that goal as we approach our Centennial Celebration. It also brings recognition to your club for your dedication to service, and affords you an opportunity to obtain some good local publicity.

It is my hope that all of the clubs in District 5M2 will join in this important mission of Lions. We often hear it said that our children are the future of this world. If we are to see peace on earth, if we are to see a sustainable environment, if we are to see a world free from preventable blindness, we must focus on children. **Children's Dignity Week** is an opportunity for us to do just that!

In 1917 Chicago businessman Melvin Jones organized delegates from men's clubs to form Lions Clubs International (LCI). His idea that "you can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else" began the history of Lions. According to LCI history, Melvin Jones felt that the lions stood for strength, courage, fidelity and vital action. A secret ballot vote chose the name Lions over several others. The association's slogan, Liberty, Intelligence, Our Nation's Safety was adopted at the 1919 convention.

While the clubs in District 5M-2 are not quite as old as the Chicago club, we do have some clubs that have been serving their communities and beyond for over 90 years. The oldest clubs in District 5M-2 are the Faribault Club, chartered on 10/11/1921 (soon to be 94 years old) and the Northfield Club, chartered on 10/24/1921 (also soon to be 94 years old). Other clubs in our district that have been making Lions history for 90 years or more are:

- Mankato Lions, soon to be 90 years old, chartered 9/26/1925
- Owatonna Lions, 93 years old, chartered 8/25/1922

# MINNESOTA LIONS EYEGLASS RECYCLING CENTER

The MN Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center greatly appreciates all the work the Lions, Lioness and Leos of 5M2 do to collect glasses for recycling. The Lions of MD5M have been collecting eyeglasses for recycling close to 25 years; all of the glasses collected have been delivered to the WI Lions Recycling Center. January 15, 2015 the Minnesota Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center delivered the 10 Millionth pair of glasses to the WI Lions Foundation for Recycling.

The MN LERC personnel are often asked what can and cannot be recycled. The following is a list of glasses and glasses related items that can and cannot be recycled. Used hearing aids are collected in the same boxes as the glasses.

Usable/Recyclable glasses:

- Glasses that have both lenses intact and the bows are not broken, both plastic and metal frames.
- Children's glasses

- Non-prescription sun glasses, including clipons.
- ✓ Readers
- ✓ Broken metal framed glasses

The following items are not recyclable and should not be placed in the recycling boxes:

- ★ Loose lenses, lenses not in frames
- ★ Broken plastic frame glasses
- imes Prescription sun glasses
- **★** Contact lenses
- $\mathbf{X}$  Cases for glasses

## JOIN IN THE LEGACY AT LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND

Since the first bulldozer pulled on campus in August 2014 (top picture) to where we are now (bottom picture) is the most comprehensive renovation project this building has undergone. The Canine Development Center is aptly named because it isn't just our kennel but houses puppy development, a veterinary center, breeding program and the staff and volunteers.

At any time, we can house up to 310 large dogs in this facility – it will, when complete, cover almost 80,000 square feet. Parts of the current

building date back to the 1950s.

"It was state of the art in the 1950s but today our



clients travel in more complex environments to get to work, school...we need to raise a much different type of dog to handle these changes," states president and CEO Lion Sue Daniels.

The Lions have reached \$1.6 million of the \$3 million goal in the first year. "This is such a huge commitment from the Lions and it is coming in gifts of all sizes. Lions started Leader Dog and their support is still as important today as it was in 1939", states Lion Mike Dengate, Lions capital campaign manager.

Contest is open to students who will be 11, 12, or 13 years of age on November 15, 2015. The kits are available through LCI Club Supplies Sales Department, and the cost is \$11.95 plus tax and postage/handling. Check on-line or in the Lions Magazine for more information. October 1, 2015 is the deadline for ordering kits.

- Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches.
- ✓ Do not mat or frame the artwork.
- All media are accepted. Chalk, charcoal, and pastel entries must be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.
- All artwork must be the individual student's original creation.
- ✓ Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted.
- The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster is not allowed.
- Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping. Do not fold artwork.

\*\*\*The students name, school, birth date and age must be on the "Winner Sticker" placed on back of the poster. Student must also have a quote on peace. Parent or legal guardian signature required.

Posters will be judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of theme.

33 youth from 20 countries are in Minnesota this summer through the Lions Youth Exchange program. They lived with host families for several weeks and attended Camp Spicer this last week (5M2 is a major supporter).
