As you read this article, Lions are in the midst of Children's Dignity Week (August 30 – September 5). Lions all over the world are following International President Jitsuhiro Yamada's call for Dignity, Harmony, Humanity by

conducting service projects focusing on engaging our youth and providing dignity through service. Hopefully, your club had or is having a successful project in recognition of Children's Dignity Week. I believe that opportunities like this can enhance the harmony among the Lions of the world. They also give us an opportunity to tell the members of our community that we are part of a worldwide organization that can work together to accomplish great things for humanity.

Our next opportunity to participate in a Centennial Service Event will be "Worldwide Week of Service in Sight" (October 4 – 10). Dr. Yamada is asking the Lions of the world to join together that week to affirm our commitment as "Knights of the Blind", by contributing to a project to eliminate preventable blindness, restore or improve the sight of people in our communities, or extend dignity through service to those people who are blind or visually impaired.

I recently had the opportunity to witness first hand a program that provides dignity and increased independence to people who are blind. Debra and I visited Leader Dogs for the Blind in Rochester, Michigan with my fellow First Vice District Governors over the weekend of August 7-9. We flew to Detroit on Friday afternoon, spent all day Saturday at Leader Dog, and then flew home early Sunday morning. We all came away very impressed with the knowledge and dedication of the Leader Dog staff, and very enthusiastic about supporting their programs.

As you probably know, Leader Dogs is in the middle

of a Canine Development Center Renovation Project. They have asked the Lions to raise \$3 million of a \$14.5 million project to upgrade their facilities. The main reason they are doing this is to be able to provide a lower stress environment for their dogs. Yes, puppies can get stressed out by being transferred from the loving home of a puppy raiser to a kennel. And a stressed out puppy may become an excitable dog. People who are blind increasingly travel on airplanes, work in offices, live in urban environments, and use public transportation. The Leader Dog of the 21st century needs to be more adaptable and calmer. When the renovation project is complete, Leader Dogs will be able to provide more dogs that will better meet the needs of the modern person with a visual impairment.

As I write this article I look at the calendar and realize it's already the middle of August. Labor Day is just around the corner as is the end of summer activities and the beginning of the new school year for most Minnesota communities. As school begins and routines change for many, our Lions clubs

will be busy getting back into their own routines of fall activities and ongoing projects.

A few of the upcoming Lions fall activities to consider are the Region meetings in September and the Zone meetings in October and November. The three Region meetings are your opportunity to meet the program chairs and find out everything you always wanted to know about these Lions programs through personal contact and displays. It's also an opportune time to schedule a speaker for your upcoming meetings. The agendas for the Zone meetings are set by the Zone chairs and may include a speaker or discussion sessions or something pertinent to your zone.

The Region meeting is also the time of year that clubs receive their packet of "bird" pins from District Activities chair, PDG Eunice Rucks. Pins are distributed to each club to use as they choose and also available for sale to those of us who enjoy collecting pins. For 37 years the district pin has been a tradition in District 5M-2. Since Buzz Knudsen was District Governor during 1979-1980, each Governor has chosen a bird to display as the district pin for his or her year. Typically the bird chosen has been different than any others preceding it, although we have had two mallard ducks - one standing and one sitting in water. In 1984-1985, District Governor Dean Steiner had the mosquito on his bird pin. The mosquito is one of the more difficult pins to find if looking to complete a collection. Sometimes an official Lions pin trader will have one for sale but even the pin traders have difficulty finding a mosquito pin.

Look for the bird pin quiz in this newsletter and see how many you can identify. *Hint – for help, go to the district website at www.5m2lions.org and look under Historian.

Throughout my twenty years as a Lion I have seen many, many different pins in all shapes and sizes and for many different events – club pins, youth exchange pins, convention pins, district governor pins, award pins and more. Multiple District 5M has a snowman pin that changes yearly to depict the upcoming International convention. I'm eager to see what the 2015-2016 pin for Fukuoka Japan is like.

A third hat I am wearing this year is co-chair with PID Maynard Rucks of the MD5M Convention in Mankato in April 2016. The convention committee is working diligently on plans for the convention and will be asking for the help of all Lions in 5M2. Please give it some consideration! More information will be presented at the Region meetings in September.

The Lions University (http://www.lionsuniversity.org/) provides Year-Round Training provided by the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum.

As a Lions Club leader, you understand that building

strong communities through volunteer service is our objective. The Lions University program is about making sure that you have the skills and resources to meet this objective.

Through three educational program levels, Lions Leaders will enhance their knowledge and skills to better serve their community.

To complete each program, Lions must complete 10 required courses, at least 5 elective classes, and complete specific leadership experiences. To complete a course, the Lion takes part in an hour long training session. These sessions are offered online on this website, through periodic webinars that are posted on this website, and through live sessions led in Districts and Multiple Districts.

Once the training session is completed, the Lion takes a simple online test to confirm their learning. Upon completion, the Lion is awarded a certificate of course completion. Lions are welcome to complete the courses that interest them in any of the programs, and in any order they wish. Credit is given toward the program that the class is under.

- Bachelor's Program: This program allows
 Lions to develop the skills necessary to lead a
 vital Lions Club. Courses are directed to the
 skills needed to be great club leader.
- Master's Program: This program focuses on giving support to clubs through district leaders. This program is aimed at District Level leaders: District Governors, Vice District Governors, Zone Chairs, District Committee Chairs, Certified Guiding Lions, and other leaders that are ready to foster quality clubs in their District.
- Doctorate Program: This program focuses on skills needed to be a training facilitator for adult volunteers. In effect, Lions who have completed the Doctorate Program are prepared to be great trainers of other Lions.







Tinnitus Research with Acoustic and Noninvasive Neural Stimulation

The University of Minnesota's Departments of Biomedical Engineering and Otolaryngology are seeking individuals who have tinnitus to participate in research involving acoustic stimulation, electrical stimulation of different skin surface regions, and noninvasive brain stimulation to potentially decrease the tinnitus percept. Participation involves up to 16 testing sessions that typically occur once every 1-2 weeks at the University of Minnesota. Each testing session will require up to 3 hours. Participants will complete questionnaires, perform several tests to determine their hearing and tinnitus characteristics, be presented with different stimulation paradigms, and describe changes in their tinnitus from the different tests.

Partipants must be an adult between 18 and 65 years of age, have tinnitus preferably for less than 5 years, have no history of seizures, not be pregnant, and not have any implantable devices or indwelling metal. Participants will receive compensatation for their participation in each testing session in the form of a \$60 Visa gift card that may be used at any retailer that accepts Visa. The first informational visit will take approximately 1.5 hours and will be compensated with a \$40 Visa gift card. There is no charge for participating in this research. 

Sniffing Out Disease: Diabetes-Alert Dogs Are On the Rise

A dog's snout is a powerful weapon. So strong, in fact, that pooches trained to smell low blood sugar are being used to manage diabetes.

For 27 years, Sarah Breidenbach had a foolproof way of knowing when her blood sugar level was dangerously low.

Diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes as a child, she could spot the early warning signs — feeling shaky and anxious.

Then one night, her internal detection system failed. While sleeping, her blood sugar level plummeted, causing a violent seizure that sent her to the hospital. Her body recovered, but her inner monitor did not.

Over the next 18 months, paramedics made 178 trips to her home.



That's when her doctor prescribed an unusual tool to help manage her diabetes: a dog. Enter Moxie, a 5-year-old service dog who sits at her owner's side around the clock. The black Labrador can tell when Breidenbach's blood sugar is too high or too low just by smelling her breath. Read the full article:

Let Your Plate Be Your Guide

Here's a quick and easy way to make sure you're getting the right amount of nutrients in the best portions for optimal blood glucose control:

- -Draw a vertical line down the center of a dinner plate. On one of the halves, draw a horizontal line to cut one side one side in half, dividing the plate into three parts.
- -Fill the largest section with non-starchy veggies such as spinach, broccoli or carrots.
- In one of the small sections, put your protein such as seafood, chicken or turkey.
- In the other small section, place starchy foods such as whole grain bread or beans.

PROJECT NEW HOPE

The Lions of Multiple District 5M have adopted a new project, Project New Hope. In the opinion of many Lions, this undertaking is one of the most impressive, and necessary with which the Lions have become involved in years. Project New Hope was founded by caring individuals right here in Minnesota. This project has established military family retreats for veterans and their families.

There are several such retreats around Minnesota, which are available to all U.S. Veterans and their families. The cost of these camps is FREE to all veterans and their families and all meals are provided at no charge. The entire family is involved, and counseling is available to all. The effects of combat service are often felt throughout a soldier's entire lifetime, and can have an impact on each family member as well, often in ways that may be quite subtle or hidden from view.

The process of healing and understanding is a vital component to a successful life after their service. Each family member, including the returning soldier, deals with what has happened in their own way. This is where the Lions hope that our camps will be of help, as counseling is available to individuals or to the family as a group. The counselors are licensed by the Veterans Affairs Association, but they are volunteers and available to all who attend the camps. An added feature is that ALL of these camps and facilities are handicapped accessible.

The established camps are: Camp Friendship, Annandale; Camp Eden Wood, Eden Prairie; Camp New Hope, McGregor; Camp Courage, Maple Lake; Camp Courage North, Lake George; Camp Vanasek, Brainerd; Inspiration Point Camp, Clitheral; Ironwood Springs, Stewartville. These Camps are located among woodlands featuring lakes, wide-open spaces, waterfronts, hiking trails, fire pits, and most have year-round recreation opportunities.

It does not matter in which era the soldier served, starting with WWII and right on through Korea, Viet Nam and the recent wars in the Middle East. All U.S. veterans and their families are welcome at our camps. As stated, all services are free and financial concerns will never prevent us from offering our services to soldiers and their families. In some cases, there are gas cards available.

All of the staff members are volunteers, and there is no administrative cost. Absolutely no cast is passed on to the attendees at these camps. As an added touch, families are presented with a handmade quilt at the end of their weekend. Again, volunteers have made the quilts and donated them to the camps.

Project New Hope began its journey back in 2007, and one of the driving forces behind this newest Lions' project was Lion Dale Johansen of the Underwood Lions. 
