my baton, and ...


Will we make beautiful music together this year? I

Centennial Service Challenge Update


Centennial Service Challenge:

As you can see from the graphic on the right, the Lions of the world are closing in on our Centennial Service Challenge goal of serving 100 million people in our four Challenge areas (Engaging Our Youth, Sharing The Vision, Relieving The Hunger, and Protecting Our Environment). At the halfway point in our four-year challenge, the Lions of the world have now provided service to **90,045,786** people in the four Centennial Service Areas! We have already exceeded our 25,000,000 goal in the areas of "Engaging Our Youth" and "Protecting The Environment". Globally, 59% of all clubs have participated in the Challenge. Clearly, the goal will be not only met, but obliterated! ***"Where There's a Challenge, Lions Will Meet It!"***



It was another great year of Service here in District 5M2. **57 clubs** reported on projects serving **112,586 people**. **41 clubs** reported on projects in all four areas of the challenge and have earned their **four diamond patches** for the 2015-2016 year. **54 clubs (84%)** participated in two or more areas, so our District will once again qualify for the District Banner Patch.

"Where There's a Need, There's a Lion!"

A Legacy of Service!

Webster's Dictionary defines legacy as "something transmitted by or received from an ancestor or predecessor or from the past". I have chosen the theme "**A Legacy of Service**". I believe our legacy comes from the past, exists in the present, and can be projected into the future. It's never too early to start thinking about our legacy, and never too late to establish or change it. I see our **Legacy of Service** as having three stages: "Build The Legacy", "Celebrate The Legacy" and "Enhance The Legacy".

Build The Legacy

As we approach the Centennial of Lionism, it is important to look back at the **Legacy of Service** that has been built over those 100 years. Lionism began with an idea formulated by our founder, Melvin Jones in 1917. His guiding principle was that "You can't get very far until you start doing something for somebody else". In 1925, Helen Keller built upon that legacy when she challenged lions to be "Knights of the Blind". Our modern legacy includes establishing the LEO Program in 1957, the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) in 1968, two SightFirst Campaigns targeting preventable or reversible blindness, and now the Centennial Service Challenge to serve 100 million people in four key areas by June 30, 2018.

The **Legacy of Service** of our district goes back as far as 1921 when the Faribault and Northfield Clubs were chartered. We have built a legacy of supporting research through the Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation, the MD5M Hearing Foundation, and most recently, the Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation. We support Leader Dogs for the Blind, Can Do Canines, Project New Hope, and many Youth Activities. Our district's **Legacy of Service** also includes community service projects in 12 counties of South Central Minnesota.

The **Legacy of Service** of your Lions Club is revealed in the service projects you do in your community. Perhaps your club's legacy includes the "Dictionary Project", Highway Cleanups, or a Scholarship Program. Perhaps you are known for providing meals for those in need, for supporting extracurricular activities in the local schools, or for supporting the local Police, EMTs or Fire Department. What do the people of your community associate with your club? That is the **Legacy of Service** your club has built.

Celebrate The Legacy

Lions worldwide will celebrate our **Legacy of Service** during the 2017 calendar year. We will celebrate meeting the goals of our Centennial Service Challenge. Our Peace Poster theme will be "A Celebration of Peace". There are many Centennial Commemorative items for sale in the Lions Store. The US Mint will be releasing a Commemorative Lions Centennial Silver Dollar with Melvin Jones image on one side and three lions on the other. The Centennial Convention in Chicago from June 30 – July 4, 2017 will be the culmination of our celebration. Come join the fun!

The Lions of District 5M2 will celebrate our **Legacy of Service** at the Midwinter Convention February 10 – 12, 2017 in Mankato. In addition, Lions from Minnesota, Manitoba and Northwest Ontario will gather at the Mall of America on June 3, 2017 to celebrate the **Legacy of Service** of all of MD5M. These two events promise to be very exciting and very fun. You won't want to miss them!

Your Lions Club can celebrate its **Legacy of Service** during the 2016-2017 Lions year as well. You might want to have a party on or near your club's charter anniversary even if it's not a traditional milestone. You could invite fellow Lions and/or community members for cake & ice cream. You might have a parade float as part of a community celebration or festival. However you choose to celebrate your **Legacy of Service**, make the 2016 – 2017 Lions' Year memorable in your community!

Enhance The Legacy

While we may reach the top of one mountain in 2017, our International President, Lion Bob Corlew, from Tennessee reminds us that "long after our Centennial celebration is over, we will continue to be faced with new mountains to climb". A new strategic plan has been developed called "LCI Forward" that (has?) will have a primary goal of enhancing the lives of 200 million people annually.

One way we will be enhancing our **Legacy of Service** in District 5M2 is by initiating Project KidSight. This project will involve screening children from 6 months to 6 years old for a variety of eye conditions that, if left untreated, can lead to permanent vision issues. Another new district wide project that will enhance our **Legacy of Service** is the Bike Ride for Project New Hope. While we have supported PNH in the past, the Bike Ride will take our support to a whole new level.

Hopefully, your Lions Club will initiate new service projects that will enhance your **Legacy of Service**. Conducting eye screenings for preschool children in your town is certainly one opportunity to do so. There may be other needs going unmet in your community, and you may want to take advantage of the many resources and tools offered by our organization. The 5M2 Zone and Region Chairs, the District Cabinet, and the District Governor Team are all available to assist your club. New ideas and inspiration are available at the MD5M and USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forums, the MD5M Regional Leadership Institute, and the 5M2, MD5M, and LCI Conventions. Many other resources are only a click away on the LCI Website.

Where There's A Need, There's A Lion!

Lions are there, wherever and whenever there is a need. We are in over 212 countries around the world. After natural disasters, we are the first ones on the scene and the last ones to leave. Wherever there is preventable blindness, Lions are striving to eliminate it. Lions in over 46,000 clubs are meeting community needs every day. Every penny of every dollar that is donated to Lions goes toward meeting needs. That is the **Legacy of Service** Lions have built. **Let's Build! Let's Celebrate! Let's Enhance!**

Dear Lions Club President:

The Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation, Inc. (MLDF) is launching a **2017 Calendar Fund Raiser** to raise much needed funds to help accelerate the prevention, cure and better treatment of diabetes! On behalf of the Fund Raising Committee of the MLDF I am writing to you today to ask your club to sponsor a date or an entire month of diabetes research! The date you sponsor just might be the date that diabetes is cured!

The MLDF recently made a second \$75,000 payment on its three year pledge of \$250,000 to the Schulze Diabetes Institute(SDI) of the University of Minnesota for its ongoing funding of the Minnesota Lions Islet Imaging Laboratory. Next year a \$100,000 payment will be due on this pledge to help develop a bio-artificial pancreas and critically needed magnetic resonance imaging assessment tools to advance the cure for diabetes.

Most recently the MLDF awarded a \$70,000 grant to the University of Minnesota SDI to fund a Quality Assurance Manager position for obtaining licensure to manufacture and distribute human pancreatic islets for the treatment of Type 1 diabetes. The following three \$25,000 grants were also awarded to the SDI for:

- Identifying and selectively removing the self destructive immune cells responsible for causing diabetes before irreparable damage to the islets has occurred.
- Development of negative vaccines to eliminate the need for chronic immunosuppression in preventing rejection of porcine islet transplants for Type 1 diabetics.
- Investigation and testing of a new drug used to lower calcium levels and restore insulin control in the treatment of Type 2 Diabetes Mellitus.

So that we can continue to fund this critical diabetes research we are asking your club to participate in our new calendar fund raiser. Please refer to the attached documents to see how your club can sponsor a date for diabetes research by selecting Option 1 for \$100 or Option 2 for \$200. There is also a document with message ideas for how you can use Option 2. There are months available for you to sponsor an entire month of diabetes research for \$500 and at the same time promote your club's activity on the calendar. The deadline to sponsor dates on the 2017 calendar is **September 30, 2016**.

We are also continuing our **“Feed the Pig Fund Raising”** fund drive. Please encourage your members to deposit their loose change in this piggy bank at your meetings.



Save the date of ---**SATURDAY, SEPT. 24** --- for the fun time of your Lions Year!

This Bike-a-Thon will be a 100 mile Bike-a-Thon on the beautiful Sakatah State Trail, traversing from Faribault to Mankato. The west end of the Trail may be under construction in late summer so we will travel the trail only from Faribault to Eagle Lake, back tracking a couple of times in order to reach the 100-mile goal.

The actual route is: leave Waterville (starting point is the parking lot south of the school and just north of the Catholic Church right on the Sakatah Trail route) about 6:15 or 6:30 a. m. for Faribault, arrive to meet Gov. Lion Steve and Lion Debra along with other Faribault Lions (at the DQ/Country Kitchen parking lot) about 8 a.m. or sooner. Head back towards Waterville and continue on west to the Eagle Lake turnoff. Along the way there will be parking lots (adjacent to the Sakatah State Trail) at Elysian and also Madison Lake (adjacent to the Trail and also a great restaurant for those who desire lunch) where Lions from outlying Lions/Legion Clubs could join up or start their own 'journey' in whichever direction they please. From the Eagle Lake area the group will head back to Faribault with stops along the way at designated 'parking lots' for water and possibly energy bars as desired. When the Faribault parking area is reached (for the second time) riders will return to the original starting point in Waterville for the grand finale of the 100-mile ride!

I would like to stress a few things about this Bike-a-Thon Fundraiser: It is not a race; it is not a 'must' that all riders complete the full 100-mile course; riders can join at any point along the route and ride as far/long as they desire; in fact it would probably be better if not too many riders rode 'as a group' due to other riders using the trail; there will be shirts of all sizes, complete with Bike-a-Thon logo, available at all points along the route as long as the supply lasts---\$10 per shirt; and it is stressed **THAT ALL RIDERS REGISTER IN WITH LION LORI KLEIN** at the Waterville site sometime during the ride. Lion Lori has graciously agreed to act as the main contact person for this event the day of the Bike-a-Thon to register all riders, collect all donations/pledges/gifts, monies from riders and clubs. Also when you sign in with Lion Lori, please give her the name of your club or organization so all can receive recognition. Lion Lori will also have the majority of the shirts at her location --- and for \$10 it would make a great memento of a Fabulous Fundraiser.

A couple of other things to remember: as I said earlier this is not a race --- the only winner is Project New Hope and our Combat Veterans. Also rest assured that 100% of the funds collected will go to aid our Veterans at the week-end Retreats for our returning Combat Veterans and their families!

In the Newsletter stories the next two months there will be more detail as to the sag wagons, phone numbers of contact personnel, location for picking up cold bottles of water, and maybe granola bars, etc. Shown below is a map of the Sakatah State Trail that we will be conducting the Bike-a-Thon on and also mileage between parking areas.
