MY TAKEAWAY FROM THE USA/CANADA LIONS LEADERSHIP FORUM

First of all, this was a remarkable forum. The meal speakers were outstanding, and all were Lions. The seminars were many and varied. There truly was something there for everyone. I met one young lady who had been a lion only a couple of months, and she found it amazing. She was so excited about all the people she had met and all the seminars she had attended. She assured me it would not be her last forum. In fact, nearly 1/4 of the attendees were "First Timers". I asked every one I spoke with if they would be back, and they all gave an enthusiastic "YES!"

Personally, I thought the Thursday dinner speaker was the highlight of the entire forum. Billy Riggs categorized himself as a "Dis-Illusionist". He performed magic tricks and provided a lot of humor, but it was his message that resonated with me. He outlined the evolution of all organizations and great causes, applying it especially to Lions. Lionism, like all other organizations, started with one man who had an idea. Melvin Jones felt the "you can't get anywhere until you start helping someone else". Helping others thus became his mission, and Lionism was born in 1917. Helen Keller crystallized that mission in 1925 when she challenged the Lions to be knights of the blind.

According to Riggs, once the mission gets established, the focus of any organization turns to the method. It becomes important to figure out how to do what you do in the most efficient manner. At this stage in the evolution of an organization, there are still people around who are passionate and connected to the mission, but the focus shifts to doing more and doing it better. Many more people become involved in the organization in order to improve and expand the method. These people are dedicated, but may not be as closely tied to the mission, which can lead an organization into the next stage of development.

Riggs then went on to explain that once the methods are perfected, all organizations confront an existential danger: The focus shifts to the machine. Now the emphasis shifts to maintaining and growing the machine. People are brought in to the organization who may have little knowledge or passion for the mission. The goal becomes to have the biggest and best machine. It is at this point that one of two things can happen. One outcome is that the organization may collapse under its own weight and cease to exist or simply become irrelevant, losing sight of any true mission other than maintaining itself. The other possibility is that some people in the organization re-discover the mission. Once the mission is rediscovered, it may need to be refined or even re-defined, but it becomes the focus once more, and the organization becomes relevant and vital again.

In addition, the Forum no longer needed to print or burn to a disc the Forum session books since the information is available via the PAW.

MD5M was well represented at the Forum and won the plaque for most attendees. District 5M-2 can also be very proud of Cologne Leos Raven and Jordan and their advisor, Lion Anna. Not only did they present a session on starting a Leo Club but also participated in a panel of active Leos. Great job!!!!

Which leads me to the many, many youth oriented activities in which 5M-2 clubs are involved such as our Leo Clubs. We currently have five active Leo Clubs in the district - both school-based and community based. The community based clubs are: the Cologne Leos, organized in 2012 - sponsored by the Cologne Lions, the Northfield Leos, organized in 2002 - sponsored by the Northfield Lions, and our newest Leo club, the Watertown Leos, organized in 2016 - sponsored by the Watertown Lions. Centennial Service Challenge:

In case you haven't heard the news, ***we have made it past our 100 Million goal for the Centennial Service Challenge!*** In the individual areas, we have served 33 million by "Engaging Our Youth" and 29.5 million in "Protecting the Environment" to surpass the 25 million goals set for each of those areas. We also are getting close to our goals in the other areas, having served 21.5 million under "Relieving the Hunger" and almost 16 million under "Sharing the Vision". When Lions set a goal, we not only reach it, we exceed it. I'm hearing whispers of hitting the 200 million mark by the end of the challenge in June 2018.



Congratulations Courtland Lions! The Courtland Lions are the first club in 5M2 to report on projects in all four areas of the Centennial Service Challenge for the 2016-2017 year. Several other clubs have reported on projects in three areas. *Who will be the first to join the Courtland Lions????*

Centennial Community Legacy Projects

There are three levels of Legacy Projects, with increasing levels of size and impact. Clubs should choose the level that's right for their club and community:

Level 1: Raise Your Community Visibility – a public item such as donating a park bench, bike rack or a new sign

Level 2: Provide a Community Gift – a larger contribution such as refurbishing a park, establishing a community garden or providing medical equipment

Level 3: Make a Community Impact – a significant community impact such as building a clinic, school, eye-hospital or library

All Legacy Projects should be identified with a sign or plaque indicating the project was donated by a Lions club.

Our International President Bob Corlew's goal is to have 20,000 clubs do Centennial Community Legacy Projects. In order that we do our part, I have set a goal of having 50% of clubs in the district report on Centennial Legacy Projects. So far, we have five clubs who have reported at Centennial Legacy Projects:

Level 1 Projects:

- The **Amboy Lions** spent 9 hours picking up debris in major road ditches.
- The **Ellendale Lions** held a picnic in the park on national Night Out.
- The **Lake Crystal Lions** walked three miles of roadside picking up trash.
- The **Norwood Young America West Carver Lions** purchased a bench to be installed in the Wilkomen park.

Level 2 Projects:

- The **Shakopee Lions** committed a significant amount of money towards the planned "Fun For All Park" improvements at Lions Park.

Now is the time to be planning your Legacy Project. Remember, it needs to be a **"Visible gift to your community that commemorates our Centennial and creates a lasting legacy of your service contribution"**. It is a great opportunity for some positive public relations, especially if you hold some kind of dedication ceremony and invite the public. It also provides lasting visibility for the presence of your club in the community when a Lions sign or plaque is included in the project. Lion Elvera Trettin passed away suddenly on September 17 in Duluth. As District Governor in 2001-2002 she asked me to serve on the District Cabinet. She was an involved mentor then and also when I was District Governor. She gave me advice on working with and motivating the District Cabinet, wearing the "Blue" jacket and so much more. She was always encouraging, busy and up for a new service challenge, as demonstrated by her involvement in Vision Honduras and Food for Kids. Lion Elvera continued to be a servant leader even after her passing, donating her body to the University of Minnesota for research purposes.

2016 POSTER THEME "A CELEBRATION OF PEACE" CONTEST RULES

From Lion Paula:

I hope you have had a fun filled summer with lots of personal and Lions successes. Back to school is a busy time for families but I am excited as we gear up for our fall activities, especially the Lions International Peace Poster Contest.

The Peace Poster contest provides clubs with an opportunity to reach out to our youth and their families. It is a fun way to promote Lions and have some fun. I love opening up the tubes and seeing the posters and the student creative thoughts and artistic talents.

Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest in a local school (s) or organized, sponsored youth group(s) such as YMCA programs, Boys & Girls Clubs, Scouts, etc. The contest cannot be held in youth groups that a Lions club sponsors, such as a Leo club. However, individual members of these groups (such as Leos) may participate if the contest is held at their school or other organized youth group.

A kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored. Each kit includes a sticker to be placed on the back of the winning poster prior to forwarding it to the next level of judging. Entries not featuring an official sticker on the back or meeting the rules listed below will be disqualified.

The kits are available, and the cost is \$11.95 plus tax and postage/handling. Check on-line or in the Lions Magazine for more information.

Contest is open to students who will be 11, 12, or 13 years of age on November 15, 2016. Eligible birth dates are November 16, 2003 through November 15, 2005.

Artwork must be no smaller than 13 inches by 20 inches and no larger than 20 inches by 24 inches. Drawing paper can be found at Office Max. Do not mat or frame the artwork.

All media are accepted. Chalk, charcoal, and pastel entries must be sealed with a fixative spray to prevent smearing. Do not laminate entries.

Only one entry per student per year and each entry must be the original work of one student. Three-dimensional entries will not be accepted. Nothing may be glued, stapled or attached to the artwork in any way.

The use of lettering or numbering on the front of the poster is not allowed. All artist signatures or initials should be written on the back of the poster.

Artwork should be done on a flexible material, so it can be rolled for shipping. Do not fold artwork.

Participants accept all responsibility for late, lost,

misdirected or illegible entries. Entries sent with insufficient postage will be disqualified. Lions Clubs International is not responsible for entries damaged, destroyed or lost during the judging process. Entries cannot be acknowledged or returned; they become property of Lions Clubs International upon receipt. Peace Poster Contest images cannot be used without written permission from Lions Clubs International.

In consideration for the opportunity to enter the Peace Poster Contest, participants agree to allow Lions Clubs International to use their names and photographs for promotional and publicity purposes. In addition, the international grand prize winner, two family members (one being a parent or legal guardian) and the sponsoring club president or a club member (as designated by the sponsoring club president) are required to attend the award ceremony at Lions Day with the United Nations. An international grand-prize winner is not eligible to receive subsequent prizes in future Peace Poster contests sponsored by Lions Clubs International. By entering, participants agree to be bound by these rules and the decisions of the judges and Lions Clubs International.

Lions Clubs International may cancel the contest without notice at any time. The contest is void where prohibited, taxed or restricted by law.

Posters will be judged on originality, artistic merit and expression of theme.

If your club has more than one school participating, a Peace Poster kit is needed for each school. The more schools the merrier!

Contest Deadline:

The posters must be sent to the Peace Poster Chairperson Lion Paula Stephens, 313 Louis St E, Cologne, MN 55322 and must be postmarked on or before November 15, 2016. Posters sent to the 5M2 District Governor will not be judged. The 5M2 winning poster will be sent to the Council Chairperson by December 1, 2016

Monetary gifts will be awarded to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place (\$300, \$200, \$100 respectively) from 5M2. A plaque, certificate of appreciation and invite to Saturday lunch at Mid-winter Convention for 4 will also be given to the first place winner.

Groups can work to help keep Minnesota highways clear of clutter through the Adopt-A-Highway program. Groups adopt a section of highway (excluding areas with heavy traffic or that are inaccessible to pedestrians) and volunteer to clear their section a minimum of two times a year for two years. The MnDOT website (listed above) lists the steps to becoming involved with Adopt-A-Highway as follows:

1. **CONTACT YOUR LOCAL ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY COORDINATOR** (<http://www.dot.state.mn.us/adopt/contacts.html>); coordinator will help club select highway
2. **CHOOSE A REPRESENTATIVE FROM YOUR CLUB**; rep will sign club agreement and be responsible for distributing safety information to participants
3. **MNDOT PROVIDES VOLUNTEERS WITH SAFETY VESTS, TRASH BAGS, AND SAFETY INFORMATION**

Another option is “Pick a Highway” which allows individuals, families, businesses, or groups/clubs the option to try out the highway cleanup program with a one-time pickup of litter along an un-adopted section of state highway.


Criteria for the award -

- If deceased, must have been a member in good standing of a MD5M Lions or Lioness club at the time of his/her death.

Process

- Nomination fee of \$150.00 for each candidate nominated must accompany the nomination to the District Governor.
- All nominations must be received by District Governor Steve no later than 30 days, prior to our Mid-Winter Convention. No later than January 10, 2017.
- An election for the recipient from 5M-2 will be held during the annual meeting at the Mid-Winter convention on February 11, 2017. The winner of that election will be inducted into the Hall of Fame at the 2017 Multiple District Convention in Bemidji on April 22, 2017.

Each of your clubs has a Lion who fits the criteria needed for a nomination to the Hall of Fame. While only one 5M-2 Lion will be awarded the honor in 2016, every Lion nominated will be featured at the Mid-Winter convention when their bios are presented to the membership. LEGACY LOG CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

Today the mission of Lionism is "To be the global leader in community and humanitarian service". That's a far cry from "To be knights of the blind", but having survived the "machine" stage with over 1 million members, I think we were in need of a broader mission.

I can also feel lions re-connecting with the mission through such initiatives as Campaign SightFirst II and now the Centennial Service Challenge. I can remember being told many times in the past that we need to get more members (build a bigger, better machine) while there was little emphasis on why we need new members (the mission). I can honestly say that I have seen that turn around, and now nearly all Lion Leaders speak of needing more hands for more service rather than just needing more hands.

I think that the essential power of the model is that it applies equally well to our individual Lions Clubs as it does to our organization as a whole. Your Lions Club was started by someone (or some people) who believed in a mission. That mission was to meet some need or needs in your community and, most likely, beyond. Your club has adopted and perfected methods to accomplish that mission. You sell pork burgers or flip pancakes in order to buy dictionaries to give to those third graders, in order to meet the need in your community of providing a better education for our youth, thereby making our community a better place for all to live. Your club is somewhere along that path between defining/refining its mission, perfecting the methods, and building the machine. The key is to never lose sight of why you are doing what you do. Are you perfecting a method of fulfilling your mission? Or are you building a well-oiled machine? No machine can last forever, but community needs will. If we keep focus on our mission, we will as well. Our communities need us, because "Where there's a need, There's a Lion!"


