We recently met in Roseville for our third Council of Governors meeting. For those that are not familiar with the terminology and hierarchy of Lions, the Council of Governors (COG)

are the twelve (12) Governors from all the districts that make up our Multiple District, MD5M. It's like a Board of Directors on the local level and the Cabinet on the District level. I was so proud of our district during that meeting. The Multiple Global Membership Team chair recognizes membership milestones for the previous quarter at the beginning of each COG meeting. For second quarter 2017-2018, District 5M2 was recognized for 1) New club chartered - thank you to PID Maynard, PDG Marv, PDG's Bill and Donna (5M8) and Lion Evelyn for their work to make this happen and to the Waconia Lions for sponsoring the new club. 2) Most new women members; 3) Highest new members and 4) Plus Net membership. Thank you to all of the clubs in 5M2 for helping to make the membership growth a reality. To date, we have added 125 members during 2017-2018; however, we have dropped 120. Club secretaries – please make sure you have entered all your new members into MyLCI. You still have time to Ask someone to join Lions and learn about the wonderful service we are providing!



At the March COG meeting, the council voted to add the new Lions Club International service program, "Pediatric/Childhood Cancer" as a Multiple District project. The upcoming District Governors (DGE Diana's group) will now be responsible for appointing a chair for this position on the Multiple level. Stay tuned for additional information as we move into this new service area for Lions.

Although we are heading into the final quarter of our 2017-2018 Lions year, we still have much to accomplish! Your club should be having elections of new officers for the 2018-2019 Lions year so your secretary can input the new officers into the correct tab in MyLCI. LCI would like this information by May 1st. The Vision and Hearing Foundations also have major fund raisers in the next quarter – Voices for Vision in April at the State Theater/Minneapolis and the DeFeet Hearing Walk in June at the Arboretum/ Chanhassen.



Centennial Community Legacy Projects:


As a District, we have now reported on 25 Level 1 Projects, 17 Level 2 Projects and 5 Level 3 Projects. *There's still time to have yours included!*



2018 Lions Clubs International Convention

June 29 – July 3, 2018 MGM Grand Hotel Las Vegas, NV

Delegates:

Each club is allowed 1 delegate for every 20 members (who are in good standing and have been a member of the club for at least a year and a day) or major fraction thereof, however *every club* (in good standing) is entitled to at least one delegate.

Registration:

Register online at www.lionsclubs.org. Click on "LCICON" in the top menu line then "FOR ATTENDEES" in the yellow menu line. You can also download a registration form from the same site. Please note that the registration fee will increase by \$25 on April 1. Get your registration in now!

Registration Fee:

- Through March 31, 2018: \$200
- April 1, 2018 through onsite registration: \$225
- Leo Registration is \$20 (for age 17 and under)

Hotel:

Our delegation hotel is the Luxor. A "Standard Pyramid" room is \$100 for Friday & Saturday, and \$56 other days. "Tower" rooms are \$118 and \$63. There is also a "Resort Fee" of \$18 per day. You can register for a hotel at the same time you do your convention reservation. A \$200 deposit is required to reserve your hotel room.

Flights:

Delta Airlines is offering a 2-10% discount for anyone using the Lions Booking Code (NMRHD) for flights to and from Las Vegas between June 24 through July 7. Go to www.delta.com/meeting and select "Book Your Flight" at the top menu bar. This will bring you to the "Book A Flight" page. Cub Foods Diabetes Alert Day Events

Find out if you're at risk for Type 2 diabetes and connect with resources that can help.

The Minnesota Lions Diabetes Foundation and local Lions Clubs will join Cub Foods to raise awareness about Type 2 diabetes. During Diabetes Alert Days, members of the public can find out if they have prediabetes or diabetes and connect with resources that can help. They will also receive free goodies and chances to win a Fitbit.

One in three Americans are on their way to developing Type 2 diabetes and most don't know it. Others already have it. Diabetes Alert Days are an opportunity for people to find out where they stand with diabetes and take steps to prevent Type 2 diabetes. People who lose a modest 5-7 percent of their weight can cut their chances of getting diabetes in half. For a 200 person, this amounts to only 10-14 pounds. People who already have diabetes can successfully manage their conditions and live long, healthy lives.

Cub Foods pharmacists will provide screenings, free blood glucose tests, free blood pressure tests, and information about their My Diabetes Coach Program, which includes four one-to-one consultations with a pharmacist, a one-time class and a grocery store tour. The program is free and available at participating Cub stores listed below.

The Minneapolis Health Department, Healthy Northland, YMCA, and the University of MN Extensions Services will also be partnering with this event to provide resources and provide healthy and delicious food samples!

MD5M Council of Governors

The Council of Governors meeting was held in Roseville on March 10, 2018. Political Liaison opened the session at 7:30 a.m. PID Lion Brian Sheehan stated that the Executive Officers from Lions Clubs International have endorsed PID Patty Hill from Edmonton, Alberta, Canada for Lions Clubs International 3rd Vice-President in Milan Italy in 2019. If you have registered to go to Las Vegas NV for the 101st International Lions Convention, PID Lion Brian & Lori have parade shirts for you that you may obtain before going to the convention. At convention you will receive hats/visors and rally towels for the parade. We currently have 240 registered. Our goal is 500 Lions from MD5M to attend. Brian's campaign is in need of auction items for the MD5M Convention in Winnipeg. Our parade band will be the Dassel-Cokato Band. It is costing them \$700 per youth with 90 members attending.

PCC Todd Neumann, MD5M GMT Chair, presented a report on Membership for the 2nd quarter- Highest Retention-5M13; Highest Net Membership Growth-5M2; Highest New Women Members- 5M2 +23; 2nd Quarter Membership Retention-5M1; Highest Membership Growth-5M1; New Club- 5M2. Districts finishing in a Plus Membership are 5M 7, 6, 4, 2, 1. MD5M needs to STOP THE DROP and retain members. Our Multiple is still the 2nd largest in the US.

Meeting was called to order by CC Dennis Heinen. Minutes were read and approved. It was requested that no eye glass recycling be sent to the Multiple Convention in Winnipeg as transporting them through customs is hard. Please turn in your eye glass collections at the Centennial Celebration in Anoka in June. It was requested that each District contribute \$250 to the Leo Conference to help defray the cost for those who would like to go to NY to attend the International Leo Conference. It was requested by PDG Dave Moen, Minnesota Lions Vision Foundation (MLVF), to have permission to submit a LCIF grant request for the Vision Medical School because the classes have doubled in size and they need more space. They are already in 4-5 locations at the U of M. We now have the surgery area built but no equipment to go into that area so this would also be part of the grant.

The Centennial Celebration for Lions Clubs International by MD5M will be held on Sunday, June 10 from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. at the Anoka County Fair Grounds, 3200 St Francis Blvd, Anoka MN. Events being held are: Record Setting Pancake Breakfast 8 a.m.-12 p.m.; Red Wagon Parade 1 p.m. Every club is asked to bring red wagons (like the radio flyer size need to be red) decorated in the 5 areas of service: Hearing, Vision, Environment, Diabetes, and Pediatric Cancer. To be in the parade it costs \$20.00 per wagon pulled by a club member. Clubs can participate in all 5 areas for the cost of \$100.00. \$5,000 in donations is needed to provide the food to pack food for Feed the Hungry. There will be KidSight screenings, food wagons, Bands, Special Olympics, Leos, tables for displays, puppet show, and maybe even a car show. Mark your calendars and spread the word to all your Lions members.

PDG Jim Mulroy went on a mission's trip to Nicaragua & El Salvador with the Wisconsin Lions to distribute recycled eye glasses. It costs \$1500.00 to take the trip but the experience is something every Lions should have. If we can get enough interest then WI & MD5M could partner on this experience.

Can Do Canines is holding their annual Wooferoo on Saturday Sept 29 at the Can Do Canines complex. They are looking for teams from every District to participate.

KidSight in MD5M has held 342 events, with 14,016 children, with 1,599 children referred.

Canada Eye Bank has collected 34,060 pairs of eye glasses in 3 areas of MD5M Canada. Dog Guides of Canada has graduated 96 dog teams and are holding a walk on May 27th at the Dog Guide location.

MN Lions Hearing Foundation walk is hosting their 7th Annual Defeat Walk at the Arboretum on Saturday June 2. The MN Lions Vision Foundation has collected 10.6 million pair of eye glasses since 1993. Voices for Vision on April 21 is a Fundraiser. Life Source has developed their own eye bank and has dropped working with Lions. Minnesota now has 2 eye bank systems in MN. Three hospitals in MN have gone with Life Source and also dropped Lions.

The official count for those attending the Chicago International Convention last year was 30,115. The Peach Bowl in Georgia was started by Lions and is still sponsored by Lions. This will continue in the future.

2018 MD5M website has the information for the convention being held in Winnipeg MB on April13-15. So far there are 452 registered. April 1 is the cutoff date for registrations for meals at convention. We will be voting on destinations for future MD5M Conventions in Winnipeg. May 1-3, 2020 in Rochester; April 30-May 2, 2021 in Mankato; 2022 in St. Cloud with International President Brian Sheehan as guest.

USA/Canada Forum will be held in Columbus Ohio in September. See the MD5M website.

"SELLING YOUR LIONS CLUB!"

"How can I get things into the local newspaper? They just don't print anything that I submit."

This can be a problem. I would suggest you designate one person to represent your Lions Club for submitting information to the newspaper. You can even give this member an official title of "XXX Lions Club Public Relations Chair". It does sound impressive, doesn't it? That Lion needs to head on down to your local newspaper and introduce themselves and find out who they are to submit articles to for your club. Find out what the newspaper will accept to print. Some daily newspapers have Community Happenings printed on one day a week. Be sure to get your contacts email address so when you send in your information in, you know someone is receiving it.

If you are from a very large metropolis, you will have more of a problem getting items into print since they are looking for national news to sell their newspapers. Does the area that your club is in have a local community newspaper or newsletter? I would use them first.

What are you submitting to the newspaper that they are ignoring you? Is it your own club awards to members? Newspapers will only print things that are news worthy and the public doesn't care about internal club awards although we love them (send those to your District Newsletter Editor). Submissions should be for things like Peace Poster presentations, donations to schools, other organizations, etc. Be choosy on what you submit for if the newspaper receives something from you every week, they may choose not to print it.

It is always good to purchase advertising when the need

merits it such as a Pancake Breakfast, Diabetes Walk, etc. Those ads can become costly but they are what keep

the newspaper in business. A way that your club can get articles into the newspaper and not have to pay for it, is by submitting items as "Press Releases". Send in that email with the subject line: PRESS RELEASE-"XXX Lion Club. Your first sentence in your email should address the person who is receiving the email such as-"Susan, Please publish the attached press release in your newspaper the week of XXX before our event happens. Thank you so much, Lion John Doe, XXX Lions Club, area code, phone number. Then add your press release which could read:

"Wine & Canvas for Diabetes"

The XXX Lions Club will be hosting a "Wine & Canvas for Diabetes" night on Wednesday, November XX, 2017 at 7 p.m. at the XXX Lions Hall in XXX. You will have the opportunity to paint one of two pictures and enjoy a free glass of wine while you paint. All supplies will be furnished. Be sure to bring your favorite wine glass with! The cost of this event is \$40.00. Please call Lion XXX at XXX to sign up for this event. There will also be a display on Diabetes with a short presentation. You need not paint to participate in the Diabetes display & presentation. Come join the fun and help cure Diabetes!

No matter what you send to your newspaper, make sure it is news worthy. Think outside the box-"If I was not a Lion, would I want to read this in the newspaper?"

CAN DO CANINE SPEAKER AT LAFAYETTE LIONS

Kelli Heimerl of Chaska told a powerful story when she and her service dog, Justeen, visited the Lafayette Area Lions Club Tuesday, March 13. Members and visitors alike were moved by Heimerl's story of living with Parkinson's Disease—but having her life made easier by the dog she received through the Lions' supported Can Do Canine program.

Since Kelli can't bend down to pick up dropped items, Justeen has been trained to pick up things as small as a dime, then give them to her. Justeen can also drag Kelli's laundry basket to where she needs it and do many other tasks. For Kelli, having Justeen has been a lifesaver.

Since 1989, Can Do Canines of New Hope, Minnesota has placed more than 660 dogs to enhance the quality of life for people with disabilities. Mutually beneficial partnerships with specially trained dogs are created after the dogs are trained. Can Do Canines provides assistance dogs, free of charge, to people with disabilities. The fully trained dogs—often adopted from local animal shelters and trained by prisoners in five prisons in Minnesota and Wisconsin—are provided to clients with mobility challenges, hearing loss or

deafness, seizure disorders, diabetes complicated by hypoglycemia unawareness, and children with autism.

Lion Andrea Oldenburg of Belle Plaine, representing Can Do Canines, shared two short videos on the program. One explained the numbers—in terms of time, people, etc., required to train the dogs—the other how a dog can retrieve a pouch of juice for a person needing it—from two blocks away, upstairs, down a hall, and through a door. The dogs are truly well trained.

Visitors from Winthrop, Fairfax, and Brownton joined the Lafayette Lions for the program.

In connection with the presentation, Oldenburg presented four "Top Dog Awards" to Lafayette Lions who have gone above and beyond in providing service to the club and community. Recipients were Scott Portner, Neal Hoffmann, Sally Webster, and Ruth Klossner. All are very involved leaders—Portner heads the club's breakfasts, Hoffmann heads the club's project committee, Webster is club treasurer, and Klossner is club secretary.


