- Together Times Student-family activity booklets reinforce lesson concepts and help students strengthen skills with the help of their families.

Classroom curriculum:

The eight-unit curriculum, available through attendance at a certification workshop, can be adapted to a variety of settings and formats

from a nine-week mini-course to a three-year program. The ideal three-year model provides booster lessons and continuous practice that reinforces the skill-building potential throughout the middle school experience. Service-learning contributes to students success and has a positive impact on their.

Research Shows:

- social behavior, habits, and attitudes,
 Service-learning holds the potential to address each of the underlying causes of low graduation rates, while incorporating the strategies most recommended for preventing students from dropping out.⁶
- Students who receive instruction in evidence-based social and emotional learning (SEL) outperform their peers: they get better grades; graduate at higher rates, have more positive peer relationships; and demonstrate caring, empathy, and social engagement.^{III}

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Skills for Action

The unique design and flexibility of the Skills for Action program provides a valuable curriculum for a broad range of school settings in grades 9-12. Skills for Action includes a service-learning curriculum. Skills Bank, Teacher Resource Guide, Advisory Team Handbook and Making a Difference student magazine. The program stimulates students' intellectual curiosity and academic growth and guides them toward active citizenship.

The Skills for Action development of personal, social and thinking skills, combined with service-learning, helps young people learn school-to-work competencies, improve self-confidence and build resilience, maintain connectedness to school, and engage in real-life issues while promoting social and cultural understanding.

Classroom curriculum:

Implementation options vary from a one semester separate course through a multi-year course integrated into subject areas such as health and personal development, social studies, or family and consumer sciences.

- Curriculum manual The core curriculum divided into four parts, Building a Learning Community, Exploring Personal and Social Responsibility. Taking Action Through Service-Learing, Evaluating and Sharing Service Experiences. Includes complete lesson plans, suggested activities, teacher resource sheets, student handouts and assessment tools.
- Skills Bank Contains four broad categories of skill sets Cultural Awareness, Interpersonal Communication, Personal Management and Responsibility, and Study and Writing. Skills are referenced throughout the curriculum, allowing the Skills Bank to serve as a supplement to Parts 1–4 above, or as a separate social, emotional and workplace skills development course.
- Teacher's Resource Guide Includes program rationale and session structure, implementation models, classroom strategies, assessment information, samples and resources.
- Advisory Team Handbook
- Making a Difference Student magazine provides readings, questions and inspiration for each part of the curriculum.

Q: How do we fit Lions Quest into our decreasing budget?

A: Professional development, competitively priced as low as \$180 per implementer, includes curriculum materials. Lions Quest programs are eligible for use with a number of state, federal and non-profit grant funds. Assistance may also be available from local Lions clubs.
