Six Elements of a Successful Club

The value your club places on its activities and the perception the public has of your Lions club have direct impacts on your ability to attract new members and retain your current members. Here are some questions your Lions should be asking themselves and sharing with the club's leadership.

- 1. The club members conduct service projects that are meaningful to them.
- 2. The club achieves a net growth in membership and quickly involves the new members in meaningful activities.
- 3. The club communicates effectively with the members and the public.
- 4. Meetings are held regularly and are meaningful and positive.
- 5. Club officers participate in zone and district leadership training.
- 6. The club is in good standing and reports regularly.

Did You Know?

Between July 1, 2011 and February 2012,

- 39 persons in the District 26-M7 counties received a corneal transplant.
- 2,422 children between the ages of six-months and six years had their vision screened for amblyopia (218 children were referred to an ophthalmologist for further testing).
- Over 380 adults had their vision screened for glaucoma or macular degeneration.
- Five individuals in the District 26-M7 counties were helped through the Eyecare Assistance Program. This assistance included paying for surgical costs to treat a torn retina, paying for cataract surgery, and providing drops needed for corneal transplant recovery.
