This summer I had the privilege to attend the summer conference for the "Leader Dog for the Blind" in Rochester Hills, Michigan.

The Leader Dog program was started in 1939 by three Detroit Lions members. Since that time the program has raised, trained, and paired with clients 14,500 (+) guide dogs. The institute supplies 275 trained dogs each year and 4-6 dogs that are trained for deaf-blind individuals.



The cost of a Leader Dog to the client is "NOT ONE DOLLAR". Their only cost is their transportation from their home to the airport. The client receives 26 days of training along with a dog valued at approximately \$45,000.

Next year the Leader Dog program will be having their 75th anniversary. At the present time they are asking for special donations to build new kennel facilities.

THANK YOU TO OUR LIONS VOLUNTEERS IN AUGUST

August was Children's Eye Health & Safety Month, and the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation celebrated by offering free Children's Vision Screenings throughout the state. Healthy vision is crucial to success in the classroom, and these free screenings can be helpful for parents to find out before school starts if their children are at risk for vision loss.

The program technicians screened 3,380 children at 68 events in Missouri last month. This included 2,233 children at 23 public events, such as county back-to-school fairs and a two-day event at the St. Louis Science Center. It's at these large-scale public events that Lions volunteers can make a significant impact on the screening process by helping to make sure it's fast and effective. In fact, at the Boone County Doc Bear Back-to-School Fair in Columbia, MLERF staff and Lions volunteers screened 298 children in 5 hours, which translates into an average of 1 child being screened during each minute of the fair.

Staff from the Children's Vision Screening program received a tremendous amount of help from Missouri Lions last month. They expressed special thanks to participating Lions from the following clubs:



MLERF RECOGNIZES THE JEFFERSON CITY HOST LIONS



The Jefferson City Host Lions Club was recognized by the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation (MLERF) on August 14, 2013 with an award for its generous donations and support over the last several years. To date, the Host Lions Club has donated \$ 133,773.00 to the foundation, and ranks second in donations among 350 Missouri Lions Clubs. Donations support MLERF programs that provide vision screenings for children, cornea transplants and eye care assistance for all ages. In the past three years, 4,548 Jefferson

City children have received free vision screenings with 360 of them being referred for full eye exams. Fifty five residents have received cornea transplants and three residents received special eye care assistance. In addition to financially supporting various MLREF programs, the Host Lions Club actively participates in the eyeglass recycling program by maintaining four drop boxes located throughout Jefferson City.

The Host Lions Club has 148 members who are committed to MLERF's mission statement of "WE CHANGE LIVES BY SAVING SIGHT".



From Hampton Inn, turn right on Country Club Drive towards US-50 Bus. West

Turn right onto US-50 Business West

Go approximately 0.2 miles and turn left onto Apache Trail. Apache Trail will become Big Horn Drive. At top of the hill, turn left to stay on Big Horn Drive.

Go approximately 0.1 miles to turn right onto US-50 West

Go approximately 6.2 miles to Murphy's Ford Road. Turn left onto Murphy's Ford Road. Apple Creek Farm will be approximately 1.1 miles ahead on the right.
