Legacies of Eye Donor and Eye Bank Colleague to Be Honored at 2012 Rose Parade

On January 2, the lives of two incredible women close to the Heartland Lions Eye Banks family will be honored during the 2012 Tournament of Roses Parade.

The Eye Bank is participating in the **2012 Donate Life Rose Parade Float** by sponsoring a floragraph- or floral portrait- of donor, Mariah West. After Mariah lost her life in a texting while driving accident, her family made the generous decision to donate her eyes, organs and tissue through the Eye Bank and Midwest Transplant Network. Today, Mariah's mission of helping others is being carried on through her parents' work with AT&T's "It Can Wait," texting safety campaign and the Mariah West Educational Foundation. The Eye Bank chose to honor Mariah's donation in memory of hospital services coordinator Darian Vanderhoofven who lost her life in the Joplin tornado. Darian worked closely with both St. John's Regional Medical Center and Freeman Health System in their annual local rose dedication ceremonies tied to the Donate Life float. At an April 2011 Celebration of Life event at Freeman, Darian was touched by the story of Mariah's donation after meeting her mother.

Because of Darian's direct involvement with planning for the local hospital rose dedications and her connection with Mariah's family, the Eye Bank felt that sponsoring a floragraph of Mariah would be a very special way to also honor Darian's work in promotion of eye donation. Donate Life America has also chosen to recognize Darian by placing a rose on the float in her memory – a dedication usually reserved for donors and recipients.

This year's float theme is "One More Day," which will encourage viewers to imagine one more day to remember a loved one, celebrate life, keep hope alive, and make a difference to others. The float will feature six floral clocks adorned with 72 memorial floragraph portraits of deceased donors. A large 33-foot clock tower with an animated minute hand will move backwards in recognition of the many donors memorialized in tributes in the float's dedication garden. Need a New Year's Resolution?

Each year, we promise to take steps to improve ourselves. As the new year approaches, it is also a good time to promise to help your Lions club grow stronger by adding new members and renewing your dedication to service. New Lions bring new ideas and add greater strength to a Lions club. Make a 2012 New Year's Resolution to "Make my Lions club stronger!" Perhaps the answer is in letting more people in on "the greatest kept secret" – Lions club's successes.

Here are a few ideas you may consider:

An information table at your next project: At your next service project or fundraiser, provide a handout explaining what your Lions club is all about and where the funds you raise are used. Have a display of your activities. Engage your customers so that they see first hand the work you do and at the same time, can inquire about membership, read about Lions and look into serving.

News releases: Tell your community about upcoming club events, awards and programs and about your accomplishments.

Club contests: Create a competition out of "Who can invite the most new members?" Will it work for your club?

Recruit one-on-one: Meet with prospective members individually to inform them about the club. Invite them to take part in the next meeting or club project. Offer to bring the guest to your next meeting or project. Follow-up with the prospective member.

Keep in touch: Do you have Lions who haven't attended a meeting or worked a project in a while? Give the Lion a call, updating them on the club's activities and inviting them to the next club event.

Believe in yourself and your Lions club: Have courage to make a renewed commitment to Lionism and take positive actions to grow your Lions heart.



LCIF Responds to Your Suggestions

Up until now, only unrestricted donations to LCIF (with a few notable exceptions) were credited towards a Melvin Jones Fellowship. In response to suggestions from Lions, LCIF will now ask donors which area they wish to support with their donations. Five specific areas are identified for designation; all donations to the areas will be credited towards Melvin Jones Fellowship recognition:

- Area of Greatest Need Supports all program areas and gives LCIF the flexibility to supplement initiatives where additional funding is necessary or where the need is most urgent.
- **Disaster** LCIF will direct the funds to the areas most in need following disasters to provide for immediate, mid- and long-term relief. LCIF is able to immediately provide funds for large-scale disaster relief, rather than collecting and distributing funds over a period of weeks or months.

- **Sight** Funds support hundreds of sight-related activities ranging from equipping eye clinics to providing Braille computers for the visually impaired.
- **Youth** Supports Lions Quest and other initiatives such as educational infrastructure improvements and programs to assist at-risk youth.
- **Humanitarian Needs** Funds projects meeting diverse community needs beyond sight, disaster and youth, such as the measles program, water wells and vocational training programs for the disabled.

Restrictions beyond these five special areas will be honored by LCIF, but will not be eligible for fellowship recognition. For example, a donation that is restricted to a specific disaster, such as an earthquake or tornado in a particular region, will not be eligible for credit to a fellowship.

The Melvin Jones Fellowship program was established by LCIF in 1971 to recognize unrestricted donations of US\$1,000. Today, more than 75% of the funding received by the foundation annually is given through the fellowship program. By expanding the recognition program, LCIF is able to recognize more individuals while continuing to support its many programs.
