My Thoughts

Within the past ten days, I spoke to three women about becoming members of a Lions Club.

The first lady was approximately sixty years old. Her response to me was, "We don't have a Lions Club in our town anymore and when we did have one, its members were old men!" It just so happens that I know a man who belongs to her town's club so we spoke about him and I told her there were ladies in the club as well.

My second encounter was a mother of four children. We talked about membership, she was very interested because of her past involvement in the Missouri Lions Band but time was obviously an issue with a full time job during the day and a full time job at home after 4:30 p.m.

My final encounter was someone that had lots of institutional knowledge of Lions Club – a relative was an active member. She informed me people her age needed to feel their membership was not so much as attending meetings but doing service projects that benefitted a group they knew. She is in that under 40 age category. She also told me that that no one had ever asked her to join.

Do we have a common thread here for all of our clubs? Yes, we do – we have a failure to communicate! In the first instance something as simple as a 30-inch road sign on the main highways into our towns tells the old timers and the newbies that Lions are here. An added bonus, this qualifies as a 100th Anniversary Legacy Project. In the second instance, we need to communicate we are willing to "think outside the box" to attract new members. In all three instances, we must do the simple task – JUST ASK!

In November 2016, 2VDG Mark traveled to Houston, TX to join with other Lions from around the Untied States and Canada to complete the Lions Faculty Development Institute. She is a retired English teacher in the Hermann community. At 107 years young, she is certainly the matriarch of the Hermann Lions Club.



Donal Knipp told the early history of Auxvasse and also about the local Lions Club. Lion Noel Crowson gave the history of the project.

Representative Jay Houghton from Missouri House District 43 attended the ceremony and talked about the importance of small rural communities in the state. He also thanked the Lions Club for their continued service.

Phyllis Domann, local resident for many years, whose father was a long time doctor in the community and a charter member of

the Auxvasse Lions Club told of his involvement in the city and also made a presentation to help with the project.

Lions Mentoring Program Helps Prepare for the Future

Most often, we see our sponsors and other experienced Lions offering advice to newer Lions. This "informal" mentoring is important, but not always efficient or as productive as it could be. To help us focus our efforts to make our newer Lions more knowledgeable and eager to accept responsible positions in our clubs, Lions Clubs International developed the Lions Mentoring Program.

The objective of the Lions Mentoring Program is to help every member achieve the goal of better serving his or her community. It does so through a program of personal development that helps members realize the potential that their unique skills and knowledge offer. The Lions Mentoring Program prepares them for leadership in clubs and in their personal life. For your Lions club, this means more hands and better service for the people who need it most.

The Lions Mentoring Program is completed in two parts, basic and advanced. This article will discuss the Basic Mentoring Program. The next issue of *Between the Lions* will discuss the Advanced Mentoring Program.

Basic Mentoring Program. The goals of the Basic Mentoring Program are to gain responsibility and to build relationships. The Basic Mentoring Program can be considered a stepping stone to a leadership role.

- Level One, The Responsibility of Being a Lion: This level is devoted to developing an understanding of who Lions are, their vision of humanitarian service, the traditions, the organizational structure and the responsibility of being a Lions club member.
- Level Two, Relationships: This level is for developing relationships and organizational skills in preparation for leadership at the club level.

Lions club presidents are vital to the success of the mentoring program. The president has the responsibility of identifying qualified Lions to serve as a mentor and encourage those Lions to accept the opportunity to help develop the knowledge and skills of our new Lions.

Participating in the Lions Basic Mentoring Program

You can be a mentee in your club. Here's how:

- Contact your club president or sponsor to let him or her know that you are interested in the program. He or she will help you find a mentor. Your sponsor may be able to serve as your mentor.
- Request the Lions Basic Mentoring Guide (MTR-11) from the Membership and New Club Programs
 Department or download the guide from the LCI Web site: www.lionsclubs.org/resources/EN/pdfs/mtr11.pdf
- Complete the Basic Mentoring Program.
- Submit the Achievement Form in the back of the guide to LCI to receive a certificate of completion.

Keeping Score – Jefferson City Host Lions Club Centennial Legacy Project

The Jefferson City Host Lions Club partnered with the Jefferson City Coca-Cola Bottling Company to donate new electronic scoreboards to the Lewis and Clark and Thomas Jefferson Middle Schools.

The schools' old scoreboards needed to be replaced. They were original to the schools when they were built in 1994. The digital letters were getting difficult to read and the scoreboards were outdated. The new electronic scoreboards use LED lights and are easy to read and use.



When the JC Host Lions Club was looking for a Centennial Community Legacy Project they discovered that the scoreboards needed to be replaced in both of the middle schools gyms. Because of the cost of the two scoreboards, the original plan was for the club to donate funds for a scoreboard at one middle school. However, in memory of his father, the late Lion Carl Vogel, Jacob Vogel, Vice-President of the Jefferson City Coca-Cola Bottling Company, decided to work with the Host Lions Club to purchase new scoreboards in both middle schools. Together, the JC Host Lions and Coca-Cola donated the funds for scoreboards at both schools.

These new scoreboards will have a direct and positive impact on the community of Jefferson City. The gyms are used for numerous sporting events including basketball, volleyball and wrestling and are used by both students and adults. Students from area schools use these gyms as well as adults participating in the Jefferson City Parks and Recreation sporting events.

A dedication ceremony was held on December 7, 2016 at Lewis and Clark Middle School during their basketball game. At the dedication ceremony, Jacob Vogel and the JC Host Lions Club were presented appreciation plaques by Larry Linthacum, Jefferson City Public School Superintendent. The JC Host Lions plaque reads: "In recognition of and sincere appreciation for your outstanding contributions - Our improved facilities would not have been possible without your extreme generosity. Your dedication to serving our community truly reflects the Lions "We Serve" spirit.

Lions Centennial Commemorative Coin

Coin collectors – 11:00 a.m. Central Time on January 18th is the release time for the Lions Centennial Coin. You can purchase the coin from the U.S. Mint (https://www.usmint.gov) or the LCI Store. The introductory prices are \$46.95 for an uncirculated silver dollar and \$47.95 for a proof silver dollar. The prices increase by \$5.00 each on Feb 15. The prices include a \$10 surcharge for the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF).

Coins are sold on a first-come, first-served basis and there is no limit on the amount of coins purchased.

If all 400,000 coins are sold, LCIF will receive a maximum of \$4 million from the sales.

Special recognition is extended to the Lohman Lions Club for having the highest percentage (50%) of their membership ringing bells.

For several years now, the Clubs have partnered on one day in December to undertake this service project, initiated by the Jefferson City Host Lions' Club, to help raise money to ensure the continued good work of the Salvation Army in our community. Every year, we Lions set a kettle donation goal higher than the previous year's, aspiring to ever better the outcome of our endeavor.

Donning Lions vests over Salvation Army bell-ringer aprons, **158** of our Lion clubs members cheerfully staffed kettle stands all day for a total of **194** hours (many Lions rang two or more hours) of ringing during the year 2016 Lions Bell-Ringing Day. Unfortunately, we had some cold icy weather to contend with and fell a little short of our goal. But when the day was over and done, we were most pleased to learn our efforts resulted in cumulative kettle donations for the day of an astonishing **\$13,795.67**.

This was yet another proud day to be a Lion, knowing you are truly helping those in need, especially during the Christmas season.
