
The Power of WE

- 2. The district will conduct club officer workshops for the 2018-2019 club officers. While many job duties of club officers remain the same, each year brings new requirements and activities. The workshop is a convenient and informative way for the incoming officers to keep up-to-date with these changes.
- 3. The district will conduct zone chairperson training for 2018-2019 zone chairpersons. Lions have the opportunity to work with other nearby Lions clubs as a representative of the District Governor.
- 4. Expand the district pool of certified guiding lions by six. We need dedicated Lions who can help establish new clubs and work to strengthen struggling clubs.

Membership Goals – 2017-2018


Lions, we have some lofty membership goals to reach by June 30, 2018. However, we are Lions and Lions can reach any goal we set for ourselves. Our district needs your support to reach the following goals so that we may increase our services.

- 1. Recruit a minimum of 155 members (last year, we added 155 new Lions). Every club is encouraged to actively recruit new Lions to help serve. Every club with fewer than 20 Lions is encouraged to reach that number.
- 2. Increase women membership by 40 in our clubs. Currently, our women membership is 254 or 18% of our district membership.
- 3. Reduce loss of membership to fewer than 155 members (last year, 141 Lions left our clubs). Our clubs and their services must meet the needs of our Lions and interest others to join us in service.

Our district officers and Global Leadership Team Coordinator are ready to assist you in planning and conducting membership activities. Each club president and secretary has the contact information for these dedicated Lions. Please call on them.

District 26-M7 Lions Honored at the State Convention

At the recent Missouri Lions State Convention, three District Lions were recognized for their continued service to their communities and Lions Clubs. Two awards were presented on behalf of International President Bob Corlew – the International President Medal and the International Leadership Medal. Both awards recognize Lions who accept increased responsibility for leading and building Lions clubs. As part of its strong support of the Central Missouri Honor Flight, the Wardsville Lions hosted a golf tournament on June 2nd with all proceeds designated for the Central Missouri Honor Flight. The four-person scramble tournament is in its fourth year. Each year, the tournament is growing in strength, thanks in large part to the many dedicated Lions conducting the event.

The Honor Flight provides veterans the opportunity to visit the Washing, D. C. monuments built to honor their service and sacrifice.

Chairperson Lion Bob Linnenbrink said that an average Honor Flight taking veterans to Washington, D. C. costs between \$55,000 - \$60,000.

The Honor Flight is provided at no cost to the sponsored veterans. Among the team accompanying the veterans are medical support personnel and guardians. The guardians traveling with the veterans pay their own way on each trip.

The tournament is named in remembrance of Wardsville Lion Stanley Adams. Lion Stanley served in the U. S. Air Force from 1968 – 1972 and was a driving force behind the creation of the annual golf tournament.
