This bridge will provide access to 2.5 miles of hiking/ biking nature trails along the Greenway Trail. This project will provide a high visibility testament to the Host Lions Club reinvestment of funds raised from the community back into the community.

CAMPENTON LIONS INSTALL COLLECTION BOX

The Camdenton Lions have installed a used eye glass collection box at Save-A-Lot. The donated eye glasses are used by missions to very poor areas of other countries. The glasses help individuals to be able to work for support of their families and to enjoy everyday life. The Lions also have a collection box at First National Bank's main facility. Hurricane Deck Lions have a collection box at Central Bank of Lake of the Ozarks in Camdenton.

Used hearing aids may also be donated at these boxes. They are given to the Missouri School for the Deaf in Fulton. After they are refurbished, they can be used by the students who cannot afford to buy hearing aids.

The Camdenton Lions thanks everyone for the support of their activities. The fundraisers that this community has faithfully supported provided eyeglasses for the needy children in our community. We have an agreement with the Camdenton school nurses to provide us with the names of students who need glasses and cannot afford them and are not eligible for any government funding. We also support the Lions Eye Tissue Bank that provides corneas for doctors throughout the world to restore the sight of seven to eight individuals daily. These and other charities such as Leader Dog, Lamb House and Sue's



Shoes have been supported because of your support. We want the community to know that we want to meet the needs of our community in any way we can. Our motto is "WE SERVE" and with your help, we are.

I know I have made their day, which makes my day too. One of the full care residents mentioned to my guardian how much better she likes us smaller dogs, over the big ones, we're not as overwhelming. The only down side to visiting is my guardian makes me take a bath before we go but I have so much fun there, it's worth it. I wish I could visit these fine people more, but since I can't drive, I am at the mercy of my guardian, Betty.

You can find me at Fulton Presbyterian Manor nearly every Saturday or Sunday, where I try to visit with as many residents as possible. So, if there are any other canines out there who would like to volunteer, please have your guardian's call the local nursing and rehab center. They will let them know what it takes for you and your guardian to make the canine grade.

Engaging our Youth

Lions Global Service Action Campaign Planning Guide

Overview

For nearly 100 years, Lions have served their communities with dedication and contributed to the development and wellbeing of millions of people around the world. As we look toward our centennial celebration, Lions are encouraged to serve 100 million people by December 2017 through participation in the Global Service Action Campaigns.

- August- Engaging our Youth
- October- Sharing the Vision
- December/January- Relieving the Hunger
- April- Protecting our Environment

During August, we invite you and your club to join Lions around the world in recognizing the power of youth involvement. Demonstrate your commitment to youth development by planning activities in connection with United Nations International Youth Day (www.un.org/youth), recognized each August. Or, organize projects throughout the month that engage and mobilize youth in the process of helping communities.

Getting Started:

The steps outlined below will help you complete an "Engaging our Youth" Global Service Action Campaign project.

Step 1: Create a Planning Committee

The "Engaging our Youth" Global Service Action Campaign is an opportunity for Lions and Leos to bring together communities and connect through a common commitment to youth and service. Creating a planning committee will help drive the success of your campaign project. Together, the committee can share the work and help motivate your members to participate. You might want to consider asking local schools, businesses and youth-service organizations to get involved, and designate a chair to lead the committee's efforts.

Make sure to include youth as members of your planning committee. If your Lions club sponsors a Leo club, asking Leo members to serve on the committee is a perfect place to start. When working with youth, it's important to ensure that they have an opportunity to share in the decision-making process along with the adults serving on the committee.

Step 2: Pick Your Project

Choose a service project that helps meet a community need and reflects the interests of club members. When developing your project, make sure it is a hands-on, highly visible activity that Lions and youth can easily get involved with. Perhaps your club already has an activity that could be expanded to engage youth. Or, choose from this list of ideas:

- Assemble care packages for homeless shelters or a children's hospital.
- Help clean or repair a community center.
- · Collect and donate supplies to a local school.
- Organize a youth forum or town hall meeting to highlight topics that youth have identified as critical community issues.
- Paint a playground.

To ensure the success of your project, be sure to set specific goals that you would like to accomplish by the project's conclusion. Some examples include:

- Supplying 250 children in your local school district with supplies to start the school year;
- Or, if your club chooses to repair a community center, it may decide on the specific repairs it wishes to make such as painting the outside of the facility.

Step 3: Publicize Your Project

Give your club the recognition it deserves! Tell the local community about upcoming club events to promote your service project.

Consider:

- Posting flyers
- Contacting local radio or public access television stations
- Sending press releases to community newspapers
- Posting project information on your club or district's website or other social networking sites such as Facebook
- Inviting local media

Step 4: Implement Your Project

Involve your club members! Invite family members, friends and co-workers to help which can also generate new membership interest.

On the day of the project, make sure someone is ready to answer questions from volunteers, elected officials, special guests, local media and other members of the community. Because your project will center around engaging youth, consider asking youth on your planning committee to serve as spokespersons for highlighting the project and its importance to the community.

Step 5: Report Your Activity

Report your service activities through MyLCl's Online Service Activity Report. For more information, visit MyLCl at http://mylci.lionsclubs.org and review frequently asked questions about service activity reporting.

Step 6: Celebrate Your Success

Remember to share your project's accomplishments with people who helped make the project a success. Distribute a news release to local media and send a newsletter to community members who supported your project. Be sure to send thank you letters to those who participated. You may also want to present certificates of appreciation. Hosting a volunteer and partner awards ceremony is also a nice way to recognize everyone's contributions. And, don't forget to share your success with your Lions family – post photos on the Lions or Leo Facebook Fan Pages.

Saving Sight & Missouri Lions Team up With Giant Steps

Giant Steps of St. Louis, a nonprofit organization that offers therapeutic school and summer camps for children and teens with autism spectrum disorder, is teaming up with Saving Sight and the Missouri Lions. The Lions collect thousands of pairs of used eyeglasses every year. Saving Sight then channels the usable glasses to humanitarian groups that recycle them abroad by giving them to people in need, free of charge. But before the glasses can be sent abroad, they must first be cleaned and sorted by type. Through a special partnership with Giant Steps of St. Louis, children and teens are volunteering their time and developing their vocational skills by helping sort the used eyeglasses so they can be recycled. We look forward to an ongoing and mutually beneficial collaboration with Giant Steps.

Want to Support the Eyeglass Recycling Effort in Missouri?

You can support Eyeglass Recycling in several ways:

- 1) Continue to collect used eyeglasses, including sunglasses, in your community. When you collect a significant amount, bring them by any of Saving Sight's offices.
- 2) If you're near Columbia, get your club together to visit Saving Sight in Columbia to help sort and clean used glasses, which is a great opportunity for club members to serve together. To schedule a sorting party, contact Lion Sheila Fields (573-443-1479).
- 3) If anyone in your community is planning a medical mission trip abroad, encourage them to contact Saving Sight to acquire recycled eyeglasses.
