
We have reached our goal of \$12,000!! You all are amazing! We will find out in August if we receive a matching grant for this project. When we all work together, we can do big things.

LIONS OF MICHIGAN SERVICE FOUNDATION POLICY MANUAL - PROPOSED AMENDMENT

To be voted on at the August 3rd LMSF Board Meeting

Amendment to Page 8, Program Services and Assistance Programs, **Emergency Disaster Relief Program**.

CURRENT WORDING:

The Grants and Assistance Committee may award an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant, not exceeding \$2,500, to a Lions Club or Lions District for an incident involving a single family.

The Grants and Assistance Committee may award an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant, not exceeding \$10,000, to a Lions District for an incident involving multiple families.

A Lions Club or Lions District may apply for an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant by making an application to the Lions of Michigan Service Foundation The application will be a brief summary of the Disaster and number of people/families affected by the incident. Within 30 days of receipt of the emergency funds the applicant Lions Club or District shall make a report detailing how grant funds were expended. Any portion of the grant that is not utilized for the purposes(s) outlined in the application must be returned in a timely manner.

If a deficit exists in the Disaster Relief Fund, budgeted Emergency Assistance funds may be used for Emergency Disaster Relief.

PROPOSED CHANGE:

The Grants and Assistance Committee may award an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant, not exceeding \$1,500, to a Lions Club or Lions District for a property loss incident involving a single family. All grants for single-family incidents must be matched with a contribution from the Lions Club or Lions District equaling, at least, 10% of the grant award from the foundation.

The Grants and Assistance Committee may award an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant of \$1,500 per family, up to a maximum of \$10,000, to a Lions District for a property loss incident involving multiple families. NOTE – The Lions Club or Lions District does NOT need to match the 10% of the grant awarded from the foundation for a multiple families.

A Lions Club or Lions District may apply for an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant by making an application to the Lions of Michigan Service Foundation. The <u>required</u> application will be based on the number of families affected by the incident. Within 30 days of receipt of the emergency funds the applicant Lions Club or District shall make a report detailing how grant funds were expended. Any portion of the grant that is not utilized for the purpose(s) outlined in the application must be returned in a timely manner.

If a deficit exists in the Disaster Relief Fund, budgeted Emergency Assistance funds may be used for Emergency Disaster Relief.

The Vicksburg Lions Club invited Project KidSight Coordinators Tanda and David Stiffler to come to their meeting on JUNE 13st as the Vicksburg Club voted to purchased Project KidSight a "new SPOT camera!" This club went above and beyond to give such an extraordinary gift to PKS to continue to



branch out to serve more schools in the five counties that 11B2 covers in Michigan. The evening was so special to visit and hear about projects this amazing club does for their community and their district. We truly felt blessed to learn one of their projects for this year was to enhance the PKS teams with another camera to get into schools in search of the students

that need glasses. Words cannot express how thankful we are to this amazing Lions Club.

Then much to our surprise, Patrick McFarland decided to purchase "two more SPOT cameras" as he wanted his legacy to be Project KidSight, his passion is and always has been to help take care of children that need to be seen by an eye care professional. Pat has purchased our 11B2 trailer and had purchased a camera before as well. He told me he wanted the cameras to be dedicated to Lions Bill Kowalski and Frank Murray. In the early days these three, Bill, Pat and Frank worked together at events offering free vision screening. I'm sure Bill Kowalski has been watching down from the heavens above on the PKS team doing such amazing things for this project.

Our goal was to teach more and more volunteers in our district to be able to eventually have two teams and this vision is coming into effect starting for the new 2024-2025 Lion year with now 8 cameras. It will be wonderful to get into larger schools such as Mattawan, Paw Paw and Edwardsburg as one team can go into one school and the second team into another school the same day or if two schools in different counties want the same date, we can make it happen. Now the challenge will be to get plenty of volunteers...SO, if you are interested in volunteering, now is the time to get your background checks done to be ready for the fall!

Final Tallies Put 11B-2 PKS Over 22,000 Students Screened in 2023-24

We are officially done with screening at the schools as it is the end of the school year. The PKS Teams have done amazing work at the schools. Our final tally is 22,308 screened, 19,893 passes and 2,415 referrals. This is a lot of referrals, but we are ever so glad that we have found the students that need to be seen by an eye care professional. Our goal at the beginning of the Lion year was to screen 20,000

kids. We shocked ourselves by screening another 2,308 kids. We finished off the year with screening at the Dowagiac Middle School.

Our task now will be to contact the schools that we did last year as "every" school that we have gone to has asked us to come back next year. We laugh as we say, next year we shoot for screening 25,000 students. I think we will because we are trying to contact schools that we have not been able to get to this year.

With three new cameras this year, we now have "eight SPOT cameras" to work with, which will open the doors to more schools and at times work at the same schools but taking care of two or more of their schools the same day.

Our new challenge will be to get "more" volunteers to help us make our mission possible. Please consider helping, especially when the school is in your community. All our volunteers that have worked this year are more than willing to teach the "newbies" when they come to an event. We have a core team but next year we need to broaden our numbers to become more core members.

Pictured here are 17 PKS members that came for our last school to screen at for the year. Everyone came and worked perfectly together to get in and get out before the lunch hours started. We were actually done by 9:05 so we all celebrated our win of 22,308 by going out to breakfast. What a great team. We are like family now and hope that many of you will join us.

TORNADO DISASTER RELIEF

Portage Lions Lead The Way In Tornado Disaster Relief

On May 7, 2024, Tornadoes touched down in Portage, Centreville, Colon, Dowagiac and Kalamazoo. A state of emergency was declared by Gov. Gretchen Whitmer for Cass, Kalamazoo, and St. Joseph Counties, which fall within District 11-B2. A total of 280 structures were impacted, 80 homes are uninhabitable, and

more than 100 families have been displaced, which is approximately 239 individuals.

The Portage Community Outreach Center is collecting food, clothing, and personal care products. The American Red Cross has established a shelter for displaced residents at the First Assembly of God. The City of Portage is focusing and assisted with cleanup efforts and safety of residents.

The Salvation Army in Kalamazoo and Portage Zhang Senior Center conducted a Resource Event for displaced families to learn what assistance is available.

Portage Lions Club applied for an International Lions grant for \$10,000 and also received a \$10,000 grant from the Lions of Michigan Foundation, both were approved for a total of \$20,000. Relief goods to be provided are: hygiene/toiletry products, infant needs, food, paper goods, cleaning supplies, new clothing items, footwear, and toys. A displaced elderly person needed help to clean and move her things to a storage facility. Members boxed her things, cleaned, and organized her storage unit. It is so good to see our community and especially our Lions Clubs come together in the wake of a disaster. Where there is a need, there is a Lion!

Meeting notes for the special meeting, held on Saturday, 5/18/2024, to discuss relief using the LCIF grant for those impacted by the tornadoes in Kalamazoo, St. Joseph, and Cass counties are as follows:

Attendees: Laura Berry, Amy Blankshain, David Dibble (Dowagiac), Traci Frazier (Colon), Warren Frazier (Colon), Nancy Garman (Mattawan), Wes Garman (Mattawan), Vonni Hisey, Noemi Kudzia, Elvie Marfil (Zoom), Holly MacEwen (Zoom), Ruth Phillips, Sage Shaw, Laurie Sweitzer, Santa Sweitzer, PID Jenny Ware (Zoom), and Amberlee Wesseling.

After welcome and introduction of guests by Lion V. President, Amy Blankshain, invocation by Lion L. Sweitzer, and pledge by Lion Sage Shaw, Amy shared her experiences being located near an area of devastation in Portage, support that was being provided, and the first community resource event held at the Salvation Army on Friday, May 17th, to help those impacted by the tornado.

Lion Laura Berry detailed the specifics of the LCIF Emergency Grant (see attached approved grant). This \$10,000 district grant was approved to provide infant needs, new undergarments, footwear, children comfort items, hygiene products, food, paper goods, and cleaning supplies. The needs survey used at the first community resource event that details the specific items for each category was shared (see attached survey). Laura noted that an "other" line item was added to capture needs not identified on the form. Lion Nancy Garman suggested that a line be added to the form to indicate that this was not an order form and that we would do the best we could to fulfill the needs identified. Laura noted that (1) we had 30 days after grant approval (6/16/2024) to spend the \$10,000 or return the unspent funds, (2) deviations from the preliminary budget needed to be approved before spending the money, (3) a minimum of 100 recipients would benefit from the grant, and (4) LCIF wanted to make sure that we promoted this approved LCIF project. Laura noted that no checks from the grant would be turned over to other service organizations.

Laura shared that at the first community resource event, 19 surveys had been filled out that impacted 59 people (mostly from Pavilion Estates Trailer Park)

Laura noted that the need survey promoted the LCIF Emergency Grant and that we wanted to make sure to have Lions present for deliveries/pickups, capturing in photos (if permitted) for promotion of Lionism/L-CIF. Amy suggested that a letter be included in each package delivery/pick up to acknowledge LCIF.

Project Timeline is as follows:

6/1/2024 - Identify grant beneficiaries and specific needs in our communities (Interactive PDF Needs Survey available HERE)

6/3/2024 - Approve revised budget with LCIF

6/8/2024 - Complete shopping of needed goods

6/15/2024 - Complete distribution of goods to recipients

To expedite revised budget approval, as we collectively identify the beneficiaries and their needs, we need a team to start identifying the products being purchased, where they will be purchased from, and the costs for each item. Portage Lions Vonni Hisey, Laurie Sweitzer, and Amberlee Wesseling (future member) volunteered to start window shopping. There was discussion about ways to get the best price for some items. Although being cost conscious was important to stretch the dollars and serve as many people as able, the idea was to not spend too much time getting the best deal and to stick to big box stores, i.e. Sam's Club, Costco, Wal-Mart, to get the goods into people's The group agreed that purchases would be made locally (stay away from Amazon!)

Once the revised budget is approved, the clubs identifying the beneficiaries and needs should be procuring and delivering the goods to those in their communities.

Logistics on how to obtain grant funds was unknown at the time. Subsequent to the meeting, Lion Elvie Marfil contacted District 11-B2 Treasurer, Carol Patridge, to determine options. All checks will be written by Carol and require two signatures (hers and DG Amy Thackston). A district credit card is available but all purchases using the card will be made by Carol. Additional meetings will be scheduled to support the spending of this grant in our communities.

A \$10,000 Lions of Michigan Service Foundation Grant has also been approved for relief of those impacted by the tornadoes in our community. We had not received the funds for this grant at the time of the meeting. This is also a district grant so much of what was discussed still applies. The LMSF grant is less restrictive than the LCIF grant. LMSF allows food, shelter, clothing and other personal needs. Gift cards and pet care are permitted.

Lion Wes Garman suggested that the Needs Survey be added to the disaster relief website noted at the bottom of the survey and noted that if converted to a Google form, requests would automatically be sent to the club and be tallied.

The meeting concluded after everyone shared their understandings of the impact that the tornadoes had in their communities. Portage and Colon reported significant damage. Dowagiac reported some damage but was unclear to what extent.







HOSTING STUDENTS IN MICHIGAN

"Hosting" is having the student stay in your home for all or part of the time. Share your culture and experiences as a Michiganders with an international student through our hosting program. Participating students are invited to live as a member of your own family and be part of your day-to-day life.

SUMMER 2024

The Lions Youth Exchange Program was started to provide today's youth, our leaders of tomorrow, an opportunity to learn about people and countries other than their own to promote world peace. The goal is to have each participant return home, apply greater awareness and appreciation of others to fellow students, friends and family. In doing so, we hope to foster harmony and understanding toward goodwill in international relations.

The Lions Clubs International Youth Exchange Program was officially adopted in 1961 as a unique cultural learning opportunity for our youth and not conducted for tourism, formal education or employment. It is promoting World Peace, One Student at a Time.

To our very exceptional and generous host families, we cannot thank you enough. Without you, this program cannot work. You are taking these students to become a part of your family. We would like to recommend that you take two students from two different countries. This is so that they will need to speak English to each other. When taking Japanese students, it is wise to pick an older and younger student so the older can help the younger speak English.

Upon arrival and before anything else, please explain the house rules to your new family members. This is so that there is no misunderstanding as to whether smoking, drinking, etc. is allowed in your home.

Other suggestions we have are:

- 1. Your Lion Youth Exchange Chairperson will require you to attend an orientation meeting prior to being accepted as a host family. This meeting will cover Youth Exchange Policies and things to assist you and your student and to become acquainted with our program. Other families will be there too so that you can get acquainted and share activities together. If you have hosted before, your input will be appreciated to help the new host families.
- a) It is required by the Youth Exchange Policy that you accept the visiting youth as a member of your family, not as a guest. Meet your new family member on arrival and share your home with your new son or daughter. They are not to be used as babysitters or housekeepers; however, they should help with chores and to keep their room clean. Males and females

should be hosted in separate homes and/or bedrooms. They should be provided with a bed not a couch or an air mattress. Youth JUNE share a bedroom with host siblings of the same sex and over 10 years of age.

2. Arrange a schedule of things to do and places to go. Ask your new son or daughter if there is anything special or places they would like to see or do. If you are able, try to accommodate them as you would want your own children to be accommodated if they were also being hosted. They are not, however, to leave your care to travel on their own to other countries, or to travel to meet close friends or family if they are in this country. Match your schedule with your local Lions club or district so as not to overlap planned activities. Keep in mind that you are not a travel agent or tour guide, and the concept of the program is a cultural exchange. Your new family members would like to interact with students their own age if possible. Look to your community and surrounding areas for events other than the Lions events.

Please call your district Lion Youth Exchange chairperson to see if they have a planned itinerary.

- a) Plan to spend time at home getting acquainted with your student. Do not make the hosting period a continuous round of events. Time to rest and relax at home is important for both students and family. They will need time to wash clothes and write in their journals.
- b) The Lions Youth Exchange Program is meant to be a learning experience. Allow your visiting youth to have ample opportunity to learn about the nature of our people, our democracy and our heritage and culture. Be sure to learn about theirs but please do not get political or try to proselytize.
- c) Allow them periods of privacy each day.
- d) Your student should have adequate funds for personal expenses. You will be responsible for their meals and entertainment when you are with them as you are with your own children. When and if they are not with you, the funds they brought should be used for whatever meals, entertainment, and souvenirs they wish to purchase. The students will also be responsible for their own phone bills and any other expenses they JUNE incur in your home. They are not to leave you with any of their bills. If there is a problem, please contact your Lion chairperson.
- e) It is important that you take your youth to a Lions Club or District meeting, if possible. Arrange with the District Governor or Club President to have your student speak as a program. Your student JUNE have pins and/or banners to exchange with the District Governor or Club President.
- 3. The hosting process is normally four-five weeks but can be split into multiple families. Our international camp (Lions Bear Lake Camp) will be in between hosting periods.

THE LION MINTS PROGRAM

How To Approach Merchants

- Ask if the merchant is familiar with the Lions mission.
- Request Counter space for Lions Mints, and be sure to say it will only take a small space.
- Look around—find a desirable spot which has visibility and accessibility.
- Assume a humble attitude, don't be pushy or demanding.

How To Service Accounts

- Always keep your candy displays filled with candy. Some will only need monthly service, while others will need service every 3–4 days in high volume places.
- It is not a good policy to leave too many extra mints at a site for employees to fill trays with as too much money will accumulate.
- If theft is suspected, seal the bottom of the tray with a sticker that would have to be broken if the tray is tampered with. This tends to deter such activity.
- Keep your display clean, signs should be clean and have supplier's name and phone number on the back. Collection trays and containers should be clean, if not, switch for a clean one. Boxes sometimes collect debris be sure dust hasn't collected, and remember, empty trays are lost sales.

How To Build Public Support

•Form a relationship with business owners and their employees. Tell them about Lions and the things your Club does for the community – glasses, hearing aids, youth programs (baseball teams, swim teams and band camps). People will be more inclined to monitor the mint displays for you, and it is a great way to recruit new members for your Lions Club.
