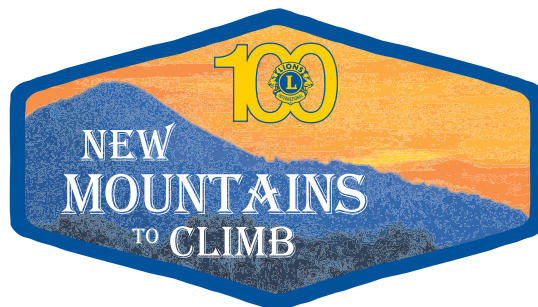

He was Chairperson of the Finances and Headquarter Operations Committee and has served on the Constitution and By-Laws Committee. Brian was a trustee on LCIF while he was an appointee. Lion Brian has been a Group Leader at DGE training in Toronto, Fukuoka and the upcoming DGE School in Chicago.

He has been a facilitator of the Advanced Lions Leadership Institute, Emerging Lions Leadership Institute and Regional Lions Leadership Institute. Currently he serves as GLT Area "D" Coordinator as well as the Sponsorship Chairperson for the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum.

In recognition of his service to the association, he has received numerous awards including Club Lion of the Year, the District 5M4 Diabetes Awareness Award, the MD5M Web Site Appreciation Award, the MD5M Al Jensen Leadership Award, the Founders Membership Growth Award, Cap Baker Award, numerous International President's Certificates of Appreciation, an International President's Leadership Award and five International President's Medals. He is a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, Second Century Ambassador, Melvin Jones Vangaurd and has received the Ambassador of Good Will award which is the highest award given out by Lions Clubs International.

In addition to his Lions activities, Past Director Sheehan is active in numerous professional and community organizations. He has served as president of Bird Island Civic and Commerce, director of the Learning Funhouse and as a member of various school committees. He also received the 2011 U.S. Small Business Association Minnesota Small Business Person of the Year Award.

Past Director Sheehan and his wife, Lori, also a Lion and Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have two sons and two daughters.

Brandon Lions Club serving the community for over 75 years!



The Brandon Lions Club was chartered on November 10, 1938. It was the first Lions Club in Brandon, and celebrated its 75 Anniversary in 2014. At one time, its membership was as high as 90 and sponsored projects to the likes of entertainers such as Gene Autry, Gracie Fields, Barbara Ann Scott and others. It was also responsible for initiating the canvas for the blind, which turned into a special door-to-door canvas night and, in addition to this, the Club inaugurated a Hole-in-One Contest at the City of Brandon Golf Course.

Moving into the 50's the Club sponsored the purchase of an ambulance for Brandon and built the Little League Baseball Park at 24th Street and Lorne Avenue. The Brandon Lions Club stood front and centre in serving its community through the construction of several playgrounds, complete with ball diamonds, play equipment, and picnic benches. Although not all playgrounds have withstood the test of time, the playground at 27th Street West and Park Avenue still exists and includes a dog run.

One of the largest projects, and most notable, was to raise money for a non-profit seniors life lease complex, known today as Lions Manor, located on the corner of 1st St. and Victoria Avenue, Brandon. Phase I was built in 1989 with 65 one-bedroom and 63 two-bedroom apartments. Phase II was built in 1999 and offers six apartment layout options and the convenience of indoor parking. Fund raising events such as LIONO, car raffles and house raffles, and the hard work of the many dedicated Lions members were the driving forces that raised money to support the mortgage of Lions Manor.

As members grew older, the Brandon Lions Club started to see a decline in membership in the 70's and 80's but within time the City of Brandon saw more Lions Clubs being organized - Wheat City Lions, Keystone Club, Centennial Club, Crocus Ladies Club, Brandon University Club, and

Prairie Pride Club. After the Brandon Lions Club celebrated its 75th Anniversary, three Clubs decided to join together and so it was made official that the Club, and Crocus Ladies Club would amalgamate to form the Brandon Lions Club. Lions Clubs currently in operation in Brandon are the Brandon Lions Club, Wheat City Club, Prairie Pride Club, and Brandon University Club.

The Brandon Lions Club has 35 members but, despite its size, it was a power-house in organizing and delivering fund raising events throughout the 2015/16 season in the Brandon community, such as:

10. Hosting special event dinners, such as Robbie Burns Nights, for the residents of Lions Manor with all money being raised from all the above events going to help applicants in the Westman area where needed.

Reporting your activities UPDATE:

STEP 2: Select Add Activity

STEP 3: Enter Basic Activity Information Fiscal Year: The current fiscal year is displayed. Activity Date: For activities that occur over multiple days, select the beginning date of the activity.

For Centennial Community Legacy Projects that were completed between July 2014 and June 2015, enter "July 1" and include the actual date in the Description field.

Signature Activity: Signature activities are those that clubs engage in on a repeated basis. If the signature activity type has already been identified as a CSC activity, the corresponding CSC campaign will automatically be selected in the Detailed Activity Information section. If the signature activity type has not already been identified, manually select the appropriate CSC campaign in the Detailed Activity Information section.

Activity Type: Click on the "Select Type" button to view all service categories and subcategories. Activities that count towards the CSC have a special CSC logo next to them.

Centennial Community Legacy Projects are located under the "Community & Cultural Activity" category and also have a special logo next to them.

LEVEL 1 Legacy Projects raise your club's community visibility, such as donating a park bench, bike rack or a new sign.

LEVEL 2 projects are larger contributions, such as refurbishing a park, establishing a community garden or providing medical equipment.

LEVEL 3 projects make a significant community impact, such as building a clinic, school, hospital or library. Select the box that best reflects your activity. If an activity is both a CSC activity and a Legacy Project, select the appropriate Legacy Project box and then select the relevant CSC campaign in the Detailed Activity Information section below. Crystal City Lions centennial project – \$85,000 park upgrade

In early 2015 the Crystal City Lions Club took on a very ambitious initiative with the support of the LUD of Crystal City to expand and upgrade the local community park in Crystal City.

The Lions Club had seed money to set things in motion but then the fund raising efforts had to happen in order that the estimated \$85,000 needed could be realized.

The Lions Club wanted to build a new public washroom with showers that could be utilized by the visitors to our community and by people in town who may have got caught short. We identified that power outlets needed to be upgraded to be able to service the new camping units that require much more hydro than the older units. We also realized the park was pretty tight for the bigger trailers and therefore needed to be enlarged. Of course for a new facility, power and water needed to be installed.

We went to our community requesting financial support, filled out grant applications,

wrote letters, made a video and promoted the project to many. Once again our community, the province and organizations heard our requests and came through.

If you have been past the park of late you will see the old washroom is gone, the new facilities are in place, the fence has been relocated to enclose the playground and some landscaping has been done. New hydro hook-ups are in place, upgrades to former hook-ups and wiring are complete and the washroom is functional. We still need to do a bit more groundwork but the majority of the work, in the first two phases of this project, are complete.

How did we do it?

We held a most successful barbeque in Crystal City that was attended by many and people were most generous in their donations. The Crystal City Benevolent Association used funds donated by the community to help us out. The Richardson Foundation, who supports many community projects, gave us a most generous grant. The Royal

Bank provided a grant, the LUD of Crystal City through the Municipality of Louise assisted us both financially and in kind and the Manitoba Liquor and Lotteries provided sponsorship funding support towards the accessible washrooms.

That's how we did it!

It's amazing when a group of concerned, dedicated individuals and organizations want to make things happen and get to work, it happens.

The park enhancement is a major effort and we have dedicated it as the Crystal City Lions Centennial Legacy Project. 2017 is the Lions Clubs International 100th Anniversary and the park enhancement will be a lasting legacy for use by not only visitors but also by those who live and work here.

Utilizing local contractors, numerous volunteer hours put in by many, encouragement and positive support, many, many, many generous individuals and giving organizations made our park enhancement project a success.

This initiative will incorporate all Provincial Audiologists in 5M11 and 5M13 and their services to children. The senior Audiologist at the Central Speech and Hearing Clinic (an affiliate of Victoria General Hospital and the WRHA) will be managing this pilot project throughout the Province.

The Hearing Committee thanks all those Lions Clubs who have stepped forward to support this new initiative.

Work of the Hearing Committee:

Ten requests for assistance to purchase hearing aids has been facilitated so far this year. 5M10 collected and delivered 22 hearing aids for recycling. The 100 Hole Golf Tournament hosted by the Lions Club of Winnipeg was a success with monies going to the Lions Hearing Foundation. The Architect for the Day event was also successful whereby 25 Grade 6 and 7 students spent the day learning how to be an architect. This event was in support of our Lions Hearing Foundation and raised over \$700. The 3rd Annual Lions Roar for Hearing was held this past September with all proceeds going to the Lions Hearing Foundation.

The next Hearing Meeting is set for March 24, 2017.
