OMG – Oh my goodness! Can you believe it? I can't believe it! Yes, I CAN BELIEVE IT!


THE COUNTDOWN IS ON and there is only 160 days until the 32^{nd} Annual Lions 5M-13 Convention.







Aud Theatre as well, Whyte remarked on its beautiful architecture saying, "We have several projects always going on at the Aud. There's constant upkeep that needs to happen." A floor project is in the offing.

For the Westman Branch of the Canadian Diabetes Association –John Lorgeio said the funds go to providing education sessions in the area and, sending kids to D-Camp. This summer camp is for kids with Type I Diabetes, where doctors, nurses, nutritionist and dieticians are among those available to give the "care they don't normally get at a regular camp."

Cancer Care Manitoba Foundation representative Kate Gameiro explained CancerCare provides service to 16 locations across the province, bringing care

closer to home for those that live in rural Manitoba.

She said, "Through the Manitoba Foundation we bridge a gap that the government cannot fill. Every dollar that comes in, it goes to the front lines."

Dear Disillusioned Lion...

We know you're out there. You haven't been to a meeting in months. You are dodging calls from club members, and most importantly, you are wondering why you ever joined the organization. You feel disheartened, disillusioned and let down. You are hoping that your non-attendance means that your club will drop you from its membership rolls.

How did it come to this?

When you were asked to join, you thought you could make a difference and have fun doing it. Unfortunately, you are not alone. Hundreds of Lions leave this great Association each year because we are not meeting their needs. Here's a recent email from one such member that came in after he read, 'The Key To Membership' story in the March 2016 Wisconsin Lion. This now former Lion's story will be all too familiar to some of our members and hopefully, a revelation to others.

The Web Site has many purposes: to share information of District activities. Club activities, announcements, and any other information that a Club or individual member wishes to share.

The Web Site includes a Calendar of events, Projects, District Executive Committee, Zone Chairs, Cabinet minutes, Cabinet members and links to Lion Sites. The site also includes links to Lions International for your information and reference.

I submitted my termination letter to the Lions club last week. After 14 years, I couldn't take the good old boy way of doing things

I traveled quite a bit during most of those years and wasn't able any more. to attend meetings on a regular basis, which probably hurt my

credibility in the club. But I always paid my dues and sometimes a bit more. When possible, I participated in the club activities like picking up trash along the roads in our town, working at the annual pancake breakfast, and helping out with the vision screening at our local grade

But over the years, the membership numbers continued to drop. school. Old members died, people moved out of the area, and other members did not like the way the club was run and found other outlets for their spare time. The club was able to recruit new members, but was never able to replace the people that they lost.

In 2014, I was able to get more involved in the club and offered

quite a few ideas to improve visibility of the club in the community and attract new members. Most of my suggestions were challenged or ignored. In 2016, I retired and began attending meetings on a regular basis. I also was able to hear several members complain about the way things were being run and their threat to leave the club if nothing changed. After hearing their complaints, I again offered suggestions to increase membership, several of which were mentioned in your

During a special meeting of the Membership Committee last article. December, I highlighted the need to advertise our club and used the term "we" in my discussion, as in "there are several actions 'we' can take to improve membership". After laying out some of my ideas, one of the senior members of the club said to me "what do you mean 'we'?." That's when I knew where I stood. And that was my last

It's unfortunate that the club is dying. Over the years it has done meeting. tremendous things for the community, like vision screening and scholarships. But the leadership of the club hasn't had what it takes to fix the problems. Like other civic organizations that have failed to get new blood and new ideas, the end is in sight.

Unfortunately, the story behind this heartbreaking email is not unusual; Wisconsin Lions Clubs lose members from situations like this almost every day. While the challenges represented by these situations are varied, they all involve a culture that must change if we are to meet the needs of the next generation of Lions.

The first, and probably the hardest step, is recognizing that there is a problem. Discussions about Club culture are emotional and personal.

Many long-standing members in clubs with culture problems believe that they, and only they, know what is best for the Club. They have put untold hours into making the Club what it is today and many

times they are hesitant to listen to a new member and his/her ideas. After all, based on past history, who knows how long that new Lion is going to stay. 'We've always done it this way' or 'We tried that 20 years ago and it didn't work' are common responses to new member ideas in these Clubs.

For the most part, these long-standing members really want the Club to succeed and truly believe that what they are doing, is for the good of all. They truly cannot see the damage they are doing to the Club and the negative impact they have on newer members.

The reality is, that new members come in full of enthusiasm and ideas and want to get involved. Once a longstanding member squashes this enthusiasm, it is virtually impossible to bring it back to its original level. From that moment on, unless steps are taken, the odds are that new member is soon to be a past member

The good news is that once a Club recognizes that they need to change their culture, there are a multitude of resources available to help. Everything from self-directed learning modules and webinars to membership and retention tools are available 24/7 at lionsclubs.org. Quite honestly, there are so many tools available, that it's sometimes hard to find what you are looking for. That's when it's time to reach out to your

District Global Membership Team (GMT) Coordinator, Zone Chair, District Governor or a Vice District Governor for assistance. They can work with you to help identify the root cause of the challenges your Club is facing, identify the appropriate tools, and if you want, help you create/ implement a plan to overcome them.

In the case of a club trying to change their culture, more often than not, bringing an outside Lion expert in really makes a difference. For interested Clubs, the District Governor can appoint a Guiding Lion who can assist the Club through this process.

One of the easiest ways to begin changing the culture is to 'play nice in the sandbox'. Treat all your members and their ideas with the respect they deserve. Adopt a new project or refresh an old one that interests younger members. If you don't have enough members to get the job done on your own, team up with another community organization.

For some Clubs, they are simply too stuck in their ways to change the culture. At this point, it might be a good idea to start a Branch Club or even another Lions Club that will help meet the needs of that community and its members well into the next century of Lionism.

Now, for the disillusioned Lions out there, know that you are not alone. There is help out there and your service is valuable to your community and the Association. You joined for a reason, don't walk away from what could be the best thing you ever did just because of an old boys club.

Look for a like-minded senior Lion who can mentor you and help you to implement positive changes. Create a network of other younger Lions in your Zone or Region that can support each other through the good and bad.
