



MD5M Council of Governors update

The MD5M Council of Governors met in Minneapolis, MN on Saturday, March 11, 2017 and in Bemidji MN on Friday, April 21, 2017.

We will address March's meeting first: Council Chair Todd Neumann reminded us of the "Community Peace Project Challenge". District 5M4 had a community discussion with police officers. Can Do Canines are in need of more funding because of a 12% increase in their graduation of more dogs.

GMT announced that in 8 months, 5 new clubs have formed, 6 districts are in the plus, 5M5 is at +87, 5M3 +12. Texas membership is at 24,938 with a loss of -606; MD5M-21,482 with a loss of -31; California 20,531 with a growth of +444.

There is a new Mac Degeneration/Glaucoma - Age related website: MNEYELINK.org

They are in need of donations as there is a waiting list for supplies. 90-92 cents of every \$1.00 donated goes for supplies. Link on the website for information. It was M/S/P to allow them to solicit donations from Lions Clubs.

The Redwing Lions Club is hosting a huge eye glass collection on June 25. They would like to collect over 100,000 pairs of glasses so they are asking that clubs bring their glasses to the MD5M Convention in April or to Redwing on June 25.

Youth Exchange has added Foundation in their name. Leo's are celebrating 60 years since they formed in 1957 and will be celebrating at the USA/Canada Leos Leadership Forum in NY August 2-6.

MD5M-COG-Bemidji MN

Lions Clubs International is looking to make a name change by removing Clubs from their title. They will be known as Lions International. This will be voted on at International Convention.

PID Brian Sheehan announced that he is seeking 3rd International Vice President position in Las Vegas.

Nominations and demonstrations were held. Voting was held by ballot

with Lion Brian receiving 276 votes. PID Brian will not throw his hat into the ring for office until after the Chicago Convention so no endorsement for Lion Brian will be done at this International Convention. PID Brian will need help at the Las Vegas convention to win the vote.


Bemidji Convention had 448 full registrations, with 665 Lions participating at convention. 280 participated in the 0-K walk which raised money for Diabetes.

presentations from staff, met graduates and their dogs, and saw assistance dog demonstrations during the three hour visit. Lions Clubs of 5M provided \$152,000 in support for Can Do Canines during calendar year 2016, enough to sponsor six new assistance dog teams! Lions ROAR!

Thanks to the support of Lions Clubs across 5M, Can Do Canines continues to train dogs for people with disabilities and provide them to those in need, free of charge. Here are two recipients of a Can Do Canines assistance dog, who both now have a greater sense of freedom, independence and peace of mind thanks to their Mobility Assist Dog. Read their story below.

JAMES BRAINERD & mobility assist dog OAKLEY

James Brainerd, of MN is living with multiple sclerosis (MS), a chronic disease which attacks the central nervous system. "Because of my MS I have problems with balance and I fatigue easily," says James. Without family close by James and his loved ones were living with a lot of worries; with Oakley around James has an assistant to help him with tasks as well as providing greater peace of mind for both himself and his family.



Mobility Assistance Dog Oakley is a gorgeous three-and-a-half-year-old black Labrador. James notes that she is very polite, well-behaved, and a great worker. Oakley was trained by Can Do Canines staff. She retrieves dropped items for James such as his cane or cell phone, helps tug off clothing, opens and closes doors, and braces to help James up if he falls. Having Oakley as his Mobility Assist Dog fills James' life beyond the daily help with tasks, "Oakley is my best friend."

"Retrieving items for me and taking my socks off at night are some of the most significant things she does for me every day."

Oakley has changed James' life immensely. "I feel like I'm not alone in this anymore. I have someone who loves and cares for me. I didn't realize how much it would help my psyche," says James. Oakley and James are a successful team because he made Oakley's training a top priority.


REMINGTON CHRISTOPH & autism assist dog CANDY

Candy is a lovable, outgoing, energetic two-year-old chocolate Labrador Retriever that has been paired with Remington (Remy) Christoph and his family from Victoria, MN. Remy is a lovable, energetic seven-year-old who has autism. At an early age mom, dad and other family members noticed Remy's language skills were not developing as well as they should have and his lack of eye contact was concerning. His diagnosis sent his mom searching for a



way to not only help Remy but their family as well! After a three-year wait, almost to the day, the Christoph's met Candy!

As luck would have it, Candy is a perfect match for Remy! Both are high energy, love to be outside and chase after balls. Candy does not currently attend school with Remy but she does wait for him when he comes home. Remy is able to give Candy commands such as sit, wait, and go, so that she may eat. This simple activity enables Remy to use and develop his fine motor skills, improves his vocabulary and contributes to his sense of accomplishment. Candy has given the family back their freedom. A trip to the store may seem like a simple task but a child with autism can become overwhelmed by stimulations and often times a meltdown results. With Candy tethered to Remy, she is able to keep him close to mom and dad and also provide a way to comfort him if he comes agitated when errands take just a little too long.

Local Lions attend Leadership training at Mahnomen

I had the opportunity to attend the Lions RLLI (Regional Lions Leadership Institute) session in Mahnomen MN, the event took place March 30 – April 2.

There was 62 participants in total and I was able to spend some time getting to know all of them. However, we were separated into three groups for ease of training.

Lions Roar for Hearing

Did you know?

The most common sensory deficit in childhood is HEARING.

Newborn deaf babies look like babies with normal hearing.

By treating hearing loss before 6 months of age children develop language skills at the same rate as other children with normal hearing.

Once at school children of 5 years with hearing loss and treated with hearing aids cannot be distinguished from those with normal hearing; therefore

they are not identified as learning disabled.

Early testing of newborn children for hearing deficits is vital to their future growth and development. The Lions Universal Newborn Hearing Screen Program (which began in 2000) to providing testing equipment in neonatal units of Brandon and Thompson became a fully funded Government program in September of 2016 for all birthing centres in the Province. This announcement was made by Kevin Goertzen, Minister of Health Services and Active Living.

As Lions are aware the Lions Roar for Hearing fundraising group have been working since 2014 to establish a Hearing Aid Loaner Bank for infants and newborns. This Infant Hearing Aid Loaner Bank will be available to infants and children identified with permanent hearing loss in Manitoba. Hearing aid loaner priority will be given

to infants and children ages zero to three years with an immediate need for hearing aids. This will typically be as a result of the child's personal hearing aid(s) needing repair or replacement or as arrangements for initial permanent amplication is being secured through third party reimbursement. Hearing aids may be loaned to children over the age of three years subject to individual circumstances and availability.

The Lions Roar for Hearing committee have held their initial planning meetings for their up coming pancake breakfast (10 am), poker derby, classic car and motorcycle ride followed by a supper (4 PM) on September 9th, 2017.
