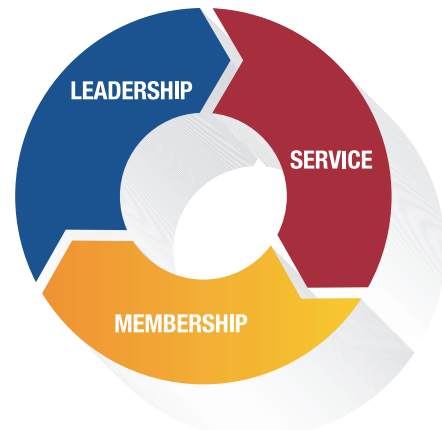

Lions MD5M Hearing Foundation, Canadian Division – Hearing Committee Update: December 2018

The Hearing Committee held their second meeting on December 7, 2018. It is our goal to communicate regularly with Lions throughout 5M10, 5M11 and 5M13. The Hearing Committee works within the structure of the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario. The Hearing Committee's purpose is: **To support, promote, develop and foster programs for the benefit of persons experiencing hearing loss, hearing disability or a hearing impairment.**

An overview of our current

work is as follows:

Support for Individuals In Need Purchasing Hearing Aids:

Support has been provided to nine individuals to purchase hearing aids so far this year. The Hearing Committee is proud to work with Lions Clubs throughout our districts in assisting in the purchase of hearing aids for those in need.

Collection of Used Hearing Aids:

153 used hearing aids have been collected across the region and delivered to the Lions Foundation office to be refurbished and distributed. Used hearing aids can be collected by Lions Clubs and given to Hearing Committee members or delivered to the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and NW Ontario office at 320 Sherbrook St., Winnipeg.

Report to Lions of Canada – LCI Trustee PID Garnet Davis

HIGHLIGHTS OF
BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING
JANUARY 16, 2019

1. Grants

(a) Approved 95 matching grants totaling \$5,820,035 serving an estimated 1,710,420 beneficiaries; approved 11 diabetes grants totaling \$1,168,086 serving an estimated 286,983 beneficiaries.

(Two grants totaling \$158,500 for Canadian applications were approved.)

(b) If your District is considering a Grant Application, please feel free to contact the LCIF staff get assistance in making your application; sometimes they can be of a service in prevention of grant applications which may be unacceptable to the LCIF Board of Trustees.

(c) District and Club Impact Grants are being received and approved; Leo Service Grants are being received and approved during this second year of the pilot program – to date 40 grants have been approved totaling \$40,836.

(d) Major Catastrophe Grants are regularly being awarded as major catastrophes are felt around the world – flood, earthquake, fire, hurricane, etc.

2. Measles

LCIF and Gavi have finalized a second phase of partnership and signed a Memorandum of Understanding to collaborate together to further measles eradication. A further \$500,000 to \$1 million was approved for purchase of measles vaccine.

3. Special Olympics

LCIF continues to be active with Special Olympics, having contributed over \$25 million since the partnership began in 2001.

4. Global Initiatives

LCIF continues to investigate the best ways of involving Lions in activities related to the newest global initiatives – pediatric cancer, hunger and the environment.

5. Campaign 100

(a) Worldwide Report Day – January – District and Multiple District Coor-

dinators are in the process of reporting to senior Campaign leaders on activities to date: total funds raised, progress in training of coordinators, model club activity, and planned fundraising events.

(b) Recognition – the Recognition format is nearly in place; it is anticipated that mail outs of forms of recognition (pins, certificates, etc.) will begin within a few weeks, and Lions and clubs which have made donations will receive the appropriate recognition.

Canadian Highlights

1. Website

Remember – all individual gifts made to LCIF through the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF are eligible for Canadian tax credit receipts.

If you want to make a direct submission by cheque, please send your cheque payable to Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF to PDG Stan Durward, PO Box 38 Sunderland, ON L0C 1H0; the website is also linked to the LCIF main web page so that information on LCIF, Campaign 100, and other information of interest to Lions is readily available.

2. Model Clubs

There are three Model Clubs in Canada so far – Chilliwack Mount Cheam, North East Eyeopener (Calgary), and Edmonton Host.

3. 24% of campaign goal of \$2.8 million

Since the Campaign 100 includes contributions over a four-year period

closing at the Montreal Convention in 2021, contributions toward the goal of \$300 million will often be reported cumulatively. To date, since the Campaign began in 2017, total fundraising is at nearly \$81 million. Canada has contributed a cumulative total of about \$660,000 – 24% of what is required to meet our campaign goal of \$2.8 million for the year ending June 30, 2019.

4. Over \$3 million, 63 grants approved

Over the past five years – 2013-14 through 2017-18, a total of 63 grants were approved for Canadian Lions totaling \$3,359,235; donations received over that same period totaled \$2,553,023 – we are net beneficiaries of the program.

Campaign 100

The attached table shows the donations for 2018-19. It also includes some information of a comparative nature, specifically for the Lions of Canada. This information is available on the 'dashboard', and is regularly updated as donations are processed. Please note the Canadian donations made through the Lions of Canada Fund for LCIF take a few weeks to pass through the Canadian fund and the bank through to the LCIF head office, and to be recorded on the dashboard. Lion's Eyeglass Recycling

Did you know, that according to the World Health Organization, WHO, there are 154 million people in the world who have uncorrected refractive vision errors meaning short or far sightedness. These vision impairments are quickly assessed and easily treated with corrective lenses.

Those are staggering statistics. I would like to tell you how the Lions in Canada are helping those less fortunate to gain better eyesight from recycled glasses.

The Canadian Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centre, C.L.E.R.C. for short is one of 18 Lions collection centres around the world. Lions Clubs and our partners all across Canada collect used eyeglasses which are sent to our Canadian eyeglass facility in Calgary, Alberta. The program was launched in 1996 with the Alberta government providing a facility, a corrections officer and volunteer offenders.

The facility receives, sorts, sanitizes, repairs, and reads the prescription with a Lensometer, produces and attaches a prescription. Then the glasses are packaged for shipping. The facility shipped it's one millionth pair in 2002, 2006 saw 2 million, 2010 reached 3 million and the fall of 2017 CLERC had shipped over 5 million eyeglasses since its inception.

In 2012 Lions Clubs have joined work parties at the facility to help process eyeglasses.

In 2015 CLERC opened their own new facility with PID Patti Hill cutting the ribbon. The Mission Statement is to provide offenders with an opportunity to contribute in a meaningful way to the global community through the Lions Eyeglass Recycling program.

For children, clear vision means better education, for adults it means being

stronger economically and for seniors it means less dependence on others.

Who knew that in 1925, when Helen Keller encouraged and challenged the Lions to become Knights of the Blind, that eyeglass recycling would be so important to the 150 million people by providing them with a chance for improved economics, education and social advantages. Lions around the world are proud to be part of this amazing initiative.

Our Lions collect all types of prescription glasses including new and used reading, single vision, bifocal, children's,



safety goggles and sunglasses. There is a constant and overwhelming need for all types.

Lions also collect loose lenses which become part of the glass recycling stream. These are ground up, mixed with reflective paint and used for painting highway lines.

I mentioned our Lions partners and you can find collection boxes for used glasses across Canada at Walmart, Superstore, most optometrists, and smaller Lions communities everywhere.

I cannot forget to mention our trucking companies like Versa Cold, Day and Ross and



Banstra, that haul from all over Canada to deliver to the Calgary CLERC location.

Another CLERC partner, with 160 Canadian locations, is Hakim Optical who donate annually approximately 50,000 pairs of prescription eyeglasses to the Calgary facility.

I would like to leave you with CLERC's motto: "Don't throw away someone's chance for a clearer tomorrow. Donate your used glasses today."

Ella Waldner Rivers Lions Club Benefit Supper

Tips on serving and interacting with people with hearing loss

People who have hearing loss may identify in different ways. They may be deaf, oral deaf, deafened, or hard of hearing. These terms are used to describe different levels of hearing or the way a person's hearing was diminished or lost. A person with hearing loss might use a hearing aid, an amplification device or hearing ear dog. They may have preferred ways to communicate, for example, through sign language, by lip reading or using a pen and paper.

Once a person has self-identified as having hearing loss, make sure you face the customer when talking and that you are in a well-lit area so the person can see you clearly.

As needed, attract the person's attention before speaking. Try a gentle touch on the shoulder or wave of your hand.

Maintain eye contact. Use body language,

gestures and facial expression to help you communicate.

If the person uses a hearing aid, reduce background noise or if possible, move to a quieter area.

Don't assume that the person knows sign language or reads lips.

If necessary, ask if another method of communicating would be easier (for example, using a pen and paper).

When using a sign language interpreter, look and speak directly to the person, not the sign language interpreter. For example, say "What would you like?" not "Ask her what she'd like."

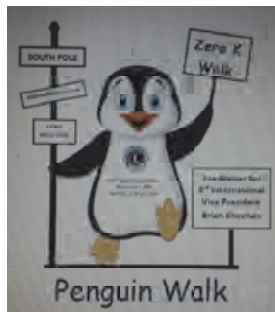

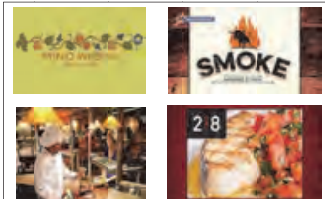
