

All Lions clubs are permitted to conduct meetings via an alternative meeting format.

Lions Clubs can conduct elections via phone, email, or any other method that will permit the club to move forward.

Practically speaking, as each Lions Club is an independent legal entity, it can conduct elections (or choose not to conduct elections) at the discretion of the club - provided the decision is supported by the membership and no complaint is filed, the actions of the club will be accepted in good faith.

You have heard me speak about the Lions Legacy Project at Lions Manor in Winnipeg and you've seen it in this newsletter.

I'm pleased to let you know that the support from Districts 5M10, 5M11 and 5M13 has been very positive. As a point of inter-

If your club cannot meet, you can still conduct your annual election of club officers.

Unless prohibited under a club's constitution and by-laws, the Standard Club By-Laws permits all Lions clubs to conduct meetings via alternative meeting formats. This allows each Lions club to choose a method of conducting elections that is suitable for those members. This can be via phone, email, a combination of the two, or any other method that is acceptable to the Lions club members.

Over the winter, before our world has been exposed to Covid19, we were able to get in some very enjoyable visits to Lions Clubs in our district. It never ceases to amaze me as to how busy the Lions are in our district.

Our visits include talking about things that are happening with Lions but one of the duties I enjoy most is presenting the Milestone chevrons to deserving Lions, after 10 years you get recognized in 5-year increments. Online Meeting Etiquette

Hello everyone,

In this time of evolution of the regular club meeting, we need to remember how to work in a new environment. Some clubs are choosing to have meetings via email, and via platforms like Zoom, Go To Meeting etc...

Below, you will find a short list of etiquette to remember when

having your online meetings. This is by no means complete, but more of a reminder and a starting point for everyone.

- 1. Have one person set as a moderator and to chair the meeting
- 2. Have an agenda.
- 3. Be on time. Some platforms/subscriptions to them can only have one meeting at a time. So please make sure that you stick to your time slot and try not to go over time.
- 4. Have your device plugged into a power source, video takes a lot of power.
- 5. Place your device on a hard surface to avoid shaking all

- 6. Make sure that you are comfortable and have all that you need close at hand so that you don't have to leave.
- 7. Be aware of lighting if you choose to have the camera on.
- 8. If you are able to, go to a quiet room in the house where there won't be as many distractions and/or people/pets coming and going.
- 9. Remain muted until you are asked to speak, raise your hand to ask permission to speak. Being muted helps limit the risk of having feedback.
- 10.If you are joining the meeting via phone, identify yourself before speaking.
- 11. Discussion is for everyone. Be respectful of others and the time that you have for your meeting. No need to hog all of the time.

I hope that you are all able to evolve with all that is going on in our world right now. If you have any questions about hosting an online meeting, please contact your zone chair, or anyone on Cabinet. We'll be happy to help you out, in any way we can.

LIONS EMERGENCY AMENITIES DELIVERY SERVICE

RECOMMENDED PROGRAM PROTOCOLS

The following LEADS is being introduced during this worldwide, Covid-19 outbreak, and in order to offer Lions helpful, safe and timely protocols for activities such as food drives, collections and making deliveries to our homebound, infirm, elderly or quarantined neighbors. Of utmost importance is that we, and those we are extending this service to, are not harmed by our actions. Avoid contact and strictly observe social distancing recommendations.

Intent:

While this document has been prepared with a delivery service in mind, LEADS Lions may be asked to serve in other ways, for example, at a food drive. All the same principles will apply: NEVER serving if you are in the higher risk group, or sick at all. Maintain social distancing, utilize gloves or hand cleansing and observe respiratory etiquette such as sneezing into your elbow.

Recommendations:

To reduce risk, Lions performing this service should be in excellent health with no cold or flu symptoms, should not be from the age group that is the most susceptible (65+) to the flu and/or Covid-19, should not have knowingly been exposed to Covid-19 or the flu in preceding 14-days, shall not be a diabetic or have respiratory disease, or any other underlying health condition that you know is a risk factor, and will conform with NO EXCEPTIONS, to Social Distancing & Drop-Off Protocols.

Social Distancing:

LEADS Lions will deliver the pre-paid amenities, step at least six feet back from the door, and wait for occupant to get the package, then move on. No hand-to-hand exchanges or payments, in either direction, will be allowed.

If the occupant does not come out to get it, Lion will call.

Take precautions to avoid conveying Covid-19, the flu or a cold from to our delivery recipients, or vice versa, through coughing, vaporized air particles, exchanging items or other direct contact.

Again...maintain at least six feet of distance from each other.

Drop-Off:

Contactless collections and/or drop-offs are the rule, NO EXCEPTIONS.

Ring the bell and step back at least six feet until product is taken inside. Deliveries will be left at the door or a designated, predetermined place outside. NO EXCEPTIONS.

No entering into the neighbor's home. Hang items on door handle, place on a table/shelf or set near door. Intent is to keep items off the ground.

And again...Keep at least six feet of distance from each other. NO EXCEPTIONS.

Conform to the CDC's latest recommendations for best hygiene and appropriate precautions.

Miscellaneous:

Assess yourself for Covid-19, cold or flu symptoms regularly...Any indications, call your MD.

Go right home if ill or if knowingly exposed to Covid-19. Contact your physician.

Practice careful and frequent hand hygiene. No touching your face with unwashed hands.

Use the provided protective gloves (if available) or wash hands with sanitizer EVERY time you touch foodstuffs or money.

INTERESTING TIMES

We are living in interesting times! Never has this been more true than right now for almost all of us. For some people it is very scary and totally unpredictable from one day to the next. For others it is so very lonely as family and friends can no longer visit in person and hugs are not forthcoming. For businesses almost everything is changing from day to day. We all know these realities and do what we can to help our community members.

For Lions around the World, there is no shortage of ways that we can and are serving. One thing that Canadian Lions might not have thought about is the plight of our Canadian Charities- Lions Quest Canada and Lions Foundation of Canada, Dog Guides.

With Conventions in many areas being cancelled and most people staying at home, the major fund-raising activities for our Charities are being severely impacted. Spring is usually the time of year when many clubs do events and fund-raising activities for **Lions Quest Canada** and **Lions Foundation of Canada**. Without those opportunities to promote our Charities, the cash flow for the daily work of these important Canadian Foundations is impacted severely.

Lions Quest Canada relies on its annual Promotional Contest for 25 % of its budget. When Clubs are not meeting in person, it is hard to have members purchase the tickets. Some Clubs purchase all the tickets sent out but again, without meetings they are not always purchased. When you add that loss of revenue to the fact that there cannot be any workshops held due to the situation, our Lions Quest Canada is struggling to meet its financial obligations.

Lions Foundation of Canada, with a much larger operating budget, is also struggling with cash flow. There are still dogs to be fed and looked after, so staying away from work is not an option for many of our staff members. Cute little puppies are still being born and need specialized care. Their moms may provide the food but the care of the mothers is even more critical at this time when even volunteers who help with exercising etc. are not able to walk and play with them.

There are many ways we, as Lions of Canada, can help both personally and as part of our clubs. Personal donations to our Lions Charities are eligible for tax receipts. No matter how large or small a donation you might be able to afford, it could make a difference for these Organizations. Your Clubs can help by ensuring that any funds designated to purchase an award , Lions Quest Fellowship, Q Bear Fan Club, Lions Foundation Fellowship or Judge Brian Stevenson Fellowship are forwarded to the Foundation now. The recipient can be designated later. Funds are needed now.

Lions Quest Canada and Lions Foundation of Canada need our help. "We Serve" needs to extend to our Foundations at this time. Please do what you can as an individual Lion and as a Lions Club.

Dear Lions,

The Board of Directors has voted to cancel the 2020 Lions International Convention due to concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19).

This means that the next International Convention will be held in 2021 in Montreal, Canada.

After evaluating a variety of different options including moving the convention to a different venue or postponing the convention to a later date, the Board of Directors voted to cancel the 2020 convention. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind.

Canceling the International Convention for 2020 impacts international officer continuity and candidate elections. After review of the International Constitution and By-Laws, this impact is outlined below:

Executive officers and international directors will continue in their respective positions until the 2021 convention in Montreal. All candidate elections for these positions shall comply with the provisions of the International Constitution and Bylaws for election at the convention in Montreal.

An international director from the areas of Africa and Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia and the Islands of the South Pacific is permitted only in even-numbered years. As a result, no director from Africa or Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Indonesia and the Islands of the South Pacific would be eligible for election until the 2022 convention.

Barring any district election complaints, district governors,

first vice district governors and second vice district governors elected during a convention of their respective districts will be accepted by Lions International. The International Board of Directors intends to authorize commencement of the DG terms beginning July 1, 2020.

We are disappointed that we will not be able to move forward with this international event, but we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions we will continue to find new ways to put our kindness in action while safely serving our communities.

In the meantime, our Convention Team will be working diligently to assist you. Lions International will issue full refunds for all registration fees paid. At this time, we kindly ask that you do not contact LCI Registration to inquire about your registration, ticket or housing cancellations as we establish our cancellation details.

We are disappointed, but we will continue to move forward as a global organization, keeping the health and safety of our members in mind.

Why report service

How do clubs and districts individually benefit from reporting service?

- » Reporting service helps transfer knowledge and best practices to your club's future leaders. Club officers can review past service activity reports, learn from the successes of the club's previous activities and better plan for their future activities.
- » Reporting service is a matter of local pride. Reporting puts your club on the map as leaders in your local community, and it's an important way to share success with other clubs in your district and around the world.
- » A high percentage of clubs reporting service is a sign of a healthy district.
- » Reporting service allows you to become eligible for service awards.

How do clubs and districts collectively benefit from reporting service?

- » Reporting shines a light on how and where local clubs are making a difference. This elevates the profile of Lions Clubs International as a global service club organization.
- » Service reports provide tangible evidence of our global engagement and impact to prospective partners of Lions Clubs International. These relationships strengthen the organization and yield benefits at the local level.
- » People want to participate in real, visible change. Service reporting allows clubs to continually engage communities, tell stories more effectively and ultimately grow their member base.

How does reporting service benefit the people we serve?

- » Service data helps everyone understand the needs of communities around the world and how our Lions and Leos are serving those needs.
- » Because service activities are scalable, one small service project can become the next global initiative of the organization. But Lions Clubs International is not aware of such projects unless they are reported.
- » Service data enables Lions Clubs International to identify best practices that can be shared globally.
- » Measurement leads to insight. Setting higher goals each year mobilizes the organization toward growth.
- » Service reports show how Lions and Leos around the world are using funds from Lions Clubs International Foundation grants to serve their communities. This visibility encourages Lions and Leos to think creatively about their own projects and apply for LCIF grants themselves.




- » Reporting is the final step in completing a service project. If it's not reported, it's not depol

- » Reporting is considered service in itself. The time clubs and districts spend reporting their service are considered volunteer hours, and can be reported in MyLion.





Snow storm can't stop Journey for Sight

The 34th Journey for Sight wrapped up Saturday, January 25, 2019 with a massive blizzard covering the final leg, making it difficult for participants to see.

But this poor visibility still didn't prevent 20 snowmobilers from pulling into the Commonwealth Air Training Plan Museum in Brandon at approximately 4:30 p.m., marking the end of a three-day excursion that originally began in Flin Flon.

After packing away their machines, each participant sought shelter inside the museum's canteen, where they received a hot meal and stiff drink courtesy of local Lions Club members.

Despite the odd frozen body part, these riders seemed to be in good spirits knowing that they had raised a hefty sum for the Lions Eye Bank, a program that aims to help the visually impaired.

Right before dinner, Lions Foundation of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario executive director Tammy Bach thanked this year's group for their support, especially since the Journey for Sight has raised more than \$2 million for the Eye Bank since it debuted in 1986.

"It means a lot to me personally," Bach told them on Saturday. "My uncle is blind and my mother passed away a few years ago, and she was legally blind, so this stuff is near and

dear to my heart."

Following Saturday's dinner, organizer Dave Mullin told the Sun that they managed to raise \$34,000 so far this year, although that number is to likely more than double once late pledges and a February raffle are taken into account.

Outside of this fundraising aspect, the annual marathon snow-mobiling trip also serves as an excuse for Westman snowmobiling enthusiasts to meet up every year and bond over their mutual love of the hobby.

"I think the main reason we keep coming back is the guys that do it," Mullin said. "There's a core group of us who have been there for 25, 27 years. There's another group that has been there for 10 or more and they're all good guys."

Even for a first-timer like Erickson's Andrea Pochinco, this sense of camaraderie was palpable.

"At the end of the night, we got together and we shared stories. They talk about their wives and their kids and we talk about moose meat," she said. "As for the ride itself ... we had -41 degree temperatures all the way to -20. We had a little bit of poor visibility today. But I would do it again, for sure."

Now that he has inherited the role of Journey for Sight chair from Brad Henderson, Mullin is looking to increase the event's participation rates, which have been lagging over the last couple of years.

To increase their annual haul, Mullin is hoping to work closely with Bach to make more connections with communities in the Portage la Prairie and Winnipeg area.

"We don't get a lot (of money) out of there, we don't have any kind of foot in the door," he said. "So we're looking to get something lined up ... because there were a couple years where we had well over \$100,000 raised and I'd sure like to get back up to that number."
