By putting the *fun* into your *fundraisers* it will strengthen the bond between club members and the community, will encourage new members to join, and will be remembered by all with fondness, a smile and a chuckle! If feelings of satisfaction are our measure of a success, then fundraisers are successful if they provide the service-minded men and women with a sense of involvement in a satisfying project. If bettering our communities is our measure of a success, then fundraisers are successful if our Lions and our community can take pride in the results.

We Serve ...? Who? What? Where? When? Why? ... and How?

There is only one of three types of thought processes that every individual chooses for themselves: **cost**, **cause**, or **cure**. You either count the COST and it is always too high. You resolve it is not your CAUSE generally because of what it could cost you. You desire to be part of the CURE, and so you only look at the **How Can I**? In any case, your chosen thought process is the path you approach life. If you have never thought about this, please take some time this holiday season to do so, or rethink it, and start the New Year with a fresh outlook.

Counting the **cost** is a negative approach used by those who are looking for a way not to be able to do something. "I cannot do that because I do not have the time, or the money." "It could cost me my life, my reputation, my whatever." Counting the cost results in an ending that you have already chosen in your sub-conscious, either through your own training or another person's negative training. Anyone can come up with a cost that is too high. But, what about those who want to retain their positive outward persona while they back away respectfully?

The **cause** is another negative pathway; it allows us to do what we want to do, without us feeling selfish about ourselves. This is a path I think we learned in our teenage years and we just got stuck as adults in the old COP-OUT path. It's not my cause. I give at the office (LOL)! I cannot do that because: I'll lose sleep, I'm too small, I'm too big, I'm too fat, I'm too skinny, I'm not smart enough, I'm too dumb, I'm too

old, I'm too young, I'm not trained, I don't have the money (cost again), I don't have the time, BECAUSE I DON'T WANT TO! We can all come up with why we cannot do something we don't want to do.

So, if **cost** and **cause** are the thought processes that lead to a negative, what thought process path could anyone ever take that results in a positive outcome?

It is funny, when people really want to do something, they always ask themselves, how can I? I call this the CURE thought process. When we really want to do something we will find a way! You have heard this all of your life, so why would you ever choose to count the **cost** or the be-**cause** paths?

Start with **How can I?** How can I be part of the cure? How can I be part of a positive solution? How can I achieve success with my abilities? And then ask, "help me, please?" instead of spiraling down the negative process path of why I cannot do it.

Ask yourself, as an Oklahoma Lion, "How can I be part of the CURE?" And success is just an answer away. It really is that simple. With over 4,000 Lions in Oklahoma alone, I am sure **we** can come up with the positive answer.

Lions can serve, and so we do serve; the question is, have you forgotten who you are, who we are, and more importantly, what we can do together? This season, take time to reflect, time to renew, and time to recommit to "We Serve." For yourself, for your fellow Lions, and for our worldwide community!





I also visited the <u>Anadarko</u> and the <u>Anadarko Indian City</u> Lions Clubs, handing out chevrons to several Lions including recognition for 55 years to Don Clark of Anadarko and for 35 years as a Charter Member to Jim Bish of Indian City. I have several more official visits scheduled but still have time for more in the next few weeks before things get crazy.

Other reported 3-L Lions Club activities include: Anadarko Lions are selling pecans to raise funds for service projects. The Lawton Patriots Lions donated to the Lawton Food Bank Fishing for Food campaign. They also facilitated a kick-off meeting to form a Southwest Oklahoma Chapter of the Heartland Council for the Blind, and assisted the Lawton Noon club in manning the Y-Fry, a benefit dinner for the Armed Services YMCA at Fort Sill.

They will be ringing bells for the Salvation Army and helping the <u>Altus</u> Lions with their Breakfast with Santa on December 14. The Lions will ring bells on November 30, and are planning their "After Christmas" party in January as our friends and family activity for the quarter.

STATE POSITIONS

As per Oklahoma Lions Constitution and Governors Council Policy the First Vice District Governors will accept applications for the following State Positions for their year of Governorship 2014-2015: Council Chairperson, Vice Council Chairperson, State Secretary, State Treasurer and Parliamentarian. A letter of intent to serve and qualifications should be addressed to each First Vice District Governor, and to Council Chairperson Larry Wibben. Applicants for State Treasurer must be proficient with QuickBooks (current accounting program utilized). Applicants for State Secretary should also be familiar with QuickBooks. Letters of intent/qualification for State Secretary position should not be forwarded to 3-H Vice District Governor Dawn Miller. Final deadline for applications will be March 7, 2014. Interviews for said positions will be conducted by the then District Governors Elect at the conclusion of their training March 23, 2014. Final decisions will be announced at the closing of the State Convention April 26, 2014. The following is from State Constitution:

ARTICLE IV COUNCIL OF GOVERNORS SECTION 2. ORGANIZATION The District

Governors-elect shall meet during the Multiple District (State) Convention and organize by electing a Council Chairperson, Vice Council Chairperson, State Treasurer, State Secretary and conducting such other business as shall be necessary. The Council Chairperson, Vice Council Chair-person, State Secretary, State Treasurer, Office Secretary, and any additional state employees shall be given written job descriptions, which may be modified or updated by any Council of Governors. In the event the Council determines that the elected Council Chairperson is unable to perform his/her duties, the Council shall appoint the Vice Council Chairperson as the acting Co Chairperson. The Vice Council Chairperson has no official duties, responsibilities, authority or vote until the Council has declared him/ her to be Council Chairperson.

SECTION 3. ELECTED POSITIONS (a). The Council Chairperson shall be a Past District Governor who has served within the past 5 years and shall be elected for a one-year term and shall not serve in that capacity again. (b). The Vice Council Chairperson shall be a Past District Governor who has served in that office within the past 5 years. A Vice Council Chairperson who has served for a majority of a term as Council Chairperson may not serve in that capacity again.



Hello, District 3H. I am dedicating this month to health. And I'm not talking about Obama Care! First, I turned 65 this month; yes, I know and I agree with you that I am much too young to be this old. So I have been dealing with terms like *supplements, gap, plan F, option A,* and well many of you know what I mean, but I am about to get it all figured out and implemented.

So, that leads me to the health of our district. What if I told you that our district has lost 2 clubs as we speak? What if I told you that one of these clubs had a person raising funds for the club that had an assumed name and was wanted by the Maryland authorities for escaping prison 30 years ago(OKC Belle Isle)? What if I told you one of the clubs was down on membership and tried to make a new start in a new area but just not able to make it go (Metro Lions)?

The average person might think that our district's health is in trouble, but that certainly is <u>NOT</u> the case. Sometime it's too easy to focus only on the problems. But let me tell you about the other 25+ clubs we have in District 3H. I have made official visits to just over half of our clubs. Each club is a little different but they all have that common thread: good people doing good service in their communities.

I have just gathered *Peace Poster* entries from 3 of our clubs (<u>Guthrie</u>, <u>Yale</u>, <u>Cushing</u>). We have made an impact with the students of these middle schools. The <u>Mulhall-Orlando</u> Lions had a Halloween party for local children. The <u>Perry</u> club awarded scholarships to 3 local seniors, purchased eyeglasses for a 10 year old boy, volunteered at high school football games and working "Meals on Wheels" for local senior citizens.

Our <u>Stillwater Noon</u> Lions purchased 2 pairs of eyeglasses, and sponsored the OK Lions Mobile Health Screening Unit (MHSU) recently for the community; they also assisted at their High School football games. <u>OKC Northwest</u> Lions collected 247 pairs of used eyeglasses for recycling, and worked the MHSU in their area. The <u>Midwest City</u> club assists the local food pantry and awards scholarships. The <u>Edmond</u> Lions furnished eyeglasses for 2 adults and 2 children just this month. <u>Cushing</u> Lions helped serve their community with toys and comfort blankets for needy children. And the list goes on and on every month. Our Lions in District 3-H are doing good things in their community and for state wide projects as well.

We continue working with tornado recovery in the Moore area, particularly with Briarwood Elementary School; after delivering 4 portable basketball goals, 3 tetherball kits, and an assortment of sports/play ball, MD-3 disaster relief committee members are working with LCIF to get the music education class stocked with musical instruments and accessories.

I really hate to lose Lions Clubs. But, in each of these cases, it was probably the best and right thing to do, and we will be back in each of these areas soon, with a new, strong club. Another good thing is that almost every one of the current members in these 3 clubs will be transferring to another club in the area, so we are not losing our good, experienced Lions. We need them to help train and interact with the new Lions our district is bringing in. Since July 1, we have brought in 54 new Lions. That's great. We've got to keep it going and I know of several clubs that have several good candidates they are working on right now. I've got more of the Governors 1 Team pins to award.

I was in <u>Yale</u> yesterday and we signed up the fifth member for that branch club sponsored by Cushing Lions. They plan to exhibit the Peace poster entries at one of their home basketball games to let all of Yale see that they have a club and hopefully to sign up more members. The Harrah Lions are sponsoring our new branch Choctaw/Nicoma Park Lions Club. They have 16 members currently and should have the other 4 members before the end of the year so be looking for the announcement of their Charter Party; and, yes, it's going to be a PARTY. Our Midwest City Lions are sponsoring our work in Moore on a new club. We hope to have the branch club going in the next 30 days and another Charter PARTY soon to follow.

So, we are losing clubs in District 3H. It happens occasionally. But, we must remember what happens each and every month in District 3-H: over 800 Lions work to make their communities better and more livable. And don't forget what we, as Lions, get out of it as well. That wonderful warm feeling of helping someone else that happens to need a hand up or a community project that can be shared and enjoyed by the whole community and knowing that you had a part in that. We aren't Lions because of that nice warm feeling we get ... but it's nice. We are Lions because WE SERVE. That's what we do. And no other district does it any better PERIOD. District 3-H's health is GREAT! Way to go DISTRICT 3-H LIONS!
