Rental versus Ownership: Are You an "Owner" Lion?

I have been impressed with the urgency of doing. Knowing is not enough; we must apply. Being willing is not enough; we must do. Leonardo da Vinci

Let me start by saying that my first three-and-a-half months have been a whirlwind. I visited with clubs all over the state, attended conventions, sat in trainings, and accumulated a lot of windshield time. Through it all, my biggest pleasure has been the sense of pride that Lions have in their club, in their community, and most importantly, in their service.

3-H District Governor Lion Marvin Ainsworth has told the story of "renting" his Lions pin for a number of years before he finally got it and felt connected to Lionism and all of the good we do. I believe this is probably true for a lot of Lions; they join the club, but unless they have a strong sense of what it means to be a Lion, and what it means to have a servant's heart, they linger in that "rental" stage. So the question is, are you still renting, or have you bought in?

A while back, while visiting the Talihina club, Lion Jerry Pearce and his wife Jan went out of their way to take me on a tour of the town and the Talimena Scenic Byway before I headed back to the city. The views were astonishing, but the hospitality and the pride displayed by the local Lions was what really stuck with me. Having said that, as fantastic as the tour was, the most touching moment came the night before as I presented a Louis Lackey fellowship to Lions Don and Brenda Adams, who are so passionate about their service to Lions in any capacity possible. Lion Don told me repeatedly how much their annual fishing derby meant to the kids in the community; it was obvious it meant a lot to him as well!

Last week, I made my first trip to the panhandle, visiting the Hooker Lions and both Guymon clubs. After my final meeting with the Guymon Panhandle club, Lion Charles Michaels, Jr. took time out of his day to give me a tour of the Lions Park. Again, his hospitality and generosity were fantastic, but what really touched me was the passion he displayed for this project. He shared

with me the history of the park and all of the work that Lions in Guymon had done over the years to make the park a great attraction for visitors and locals alike. I had the opportunity to see the train that they operate, and watch them load one group of kids after another into paddleboats so they could enjoy a beautiful afternoon while paddling aimlessly around the lake. Again, the sense of pride in the community and the service was definitely on display!

These are just two examples of what I have seen in club after club. When given the opportunity to talk about what they do in the community, most Lions get a twinkle in their eye as they share their stories. It has been a great reminder of why I joined Lions. I feel very fortunate in that I felt the connection very early. As a member of the Stillwater Noon Lions who lived in Perkins, I had the opportunity to participate in a number of work-days at the Boys Ranch. I took that a step further and did a bit of tutoring at the ranch as well. I am very proud of all of the service our club offers to the community, but working with the boys at the Ranch was the activity that truly cemented my belief in our organization and the good that we do.

The moment that we convert from "renting" is different for everybody. A number of Lions had that moment while working with the Eye Bank, or witnessing the miracle of having a loved one, friend, or neighbor have their eyesight restored due to the tireless efforts of the Eye Bank in the arena of corneal transplants and processing. For others, it was a project at the local level that means a lot to the community. It does not matter how you got hooked; it just matters that you are!

At a Club Excellence training on Saturday a few items that were mentioned really jumped out. One of these was the importance of communication. The need to get the story of Lionism out in your community has been discussed many times. The need to get it to your membership is often overlooked. In the materials for the Extension Workshop, LCI states that "TODAY'S VOLUN-TEER is focused on the service that they provide and are less concerned with



administrative duties, titles, and history." Is your club sharing your story of service to new members and potential recruits? Or is your club relying on the past without looking to the future?

The bottom line (and one that you see frequently in this column) is that as Oklahoma Lions, we have a lot to be proud of in our service, not only in our individual communities, but especially at the state level. Both the Oklahoma Lions Eye Bank and the Oklahoma Lions Boys Ranch should be a source of pride to all of us. In turn, our support of these projects is incredibly important, and should be a source of pride as well. Do you feel connected? If not, have you considered making a trip to visit the Eye Bank or the Boys Ranch and see for

yourself the service that is provided because of the support of the Oklahoma Lions?

Whether it is one of our state projects or a local service project, let's make sure we are sharing our story both inside the club and out. Let's make sure we get our new members and potential recruits engaged immediately, and keep our tenured members excited about the great work that we do. Let's make sure that if any one of us is asked to share the story of our service as Lions, we get that same twinkle in our eyes. Let's make sure that we have all bought in to what it means to be a Lion, rather than just "renting" our pin. Let's make sure we understand what it means when we say "We Serve!"


